PRESIDENT"S MESSAGE:




Good afternoon fellow members It saddens me a bit to have to start my president's report with a couple of grumbles.

As there was not enough members present to form a Quorum at the October General Meeting, proceedings took the form of an interesting open discussion on a variety of topics:

SECURITY UPDATE: Closing Up Procedure to be undertaken by the last person to leave the premises each day. Printed instructions are posted on the front door.

SIGNING IN: For insurance purposes, members have long been asked to sign the attendance book on entering the club premises, even for just a few minutes. We are now asked to note the time of our arrival, and also to sign out when we leave, again noting the time we depart. This is a safety measure to ensure the building is empty in case of emergency.

CNC MACHINE: The debate continues between the authenticity of woodwork created by computerised technology versus that of manual skill and should the club purchase a CNC machine or not. Club members may be asked to vote.

Those of us who are not sure what a CNC machine does can see a machine working at Chisholm Institute - Berwick TEC, 25 Kangan Drive, Berwick, between 4.00pm & 6.00pm on Wednesdays. **Chris Drysdale** has also offered to demonstrate his machine at his home.

LOCK UP PROCEDURE

Close and lock both Public Access doors in workshop.

Check that lights, air conditioner and exhaust fan in paint shop are turned off.

Turn off dust arrester and air filters in workshop.

Check that all lights - including lights over saws and lathes, and in breezeway are turned off.

Check that all roller doors are down.

Check that office air-conditioner is off.

Check that the office light is off, and door is locked.

Close all blinds in the lunch room.

Turn off all lights and air-conditioner in lunchroom.

Turn alarm on by inserting code.

Close and lock front door.

BAND SAW AID: From Simon Robbins.

"This is a Bandsaw Tip for Woodworking Members who may have a Bandsaw at home.

The photo is quite self explanatory. I would think mainly for straight logs. Once the sled is made to fit your Bandsaw all you have to do is drill some wood screws from the opposite side of the fence to help grip the wood & push gently.

Also I recently read that branch timber has more stress in it than trunk timber & is more likely to warp & move."



From the Finishing Room - By Peter Angwin.

I have been given the enviable task of controlling this room so can I remind the members some basic rules to abide by -

- 1. Any paint brush used **MUST** be cleaned after each use!
- 2. *CLEANED YOU SAY*? Yep, be it water or oil-based, it is not such a hard job to clean the brush! (Water for acrylic undercoats. Turps (not too much) for oil-based paints.
- 3. Dirty water must be thrown down the sink, and dirty turps can be collected in the bucket underneath the fresh turps can.
- 4. Brushes are then 'dried/wiped' on a rag and then, that rag, can be thrown out when it has reached 'its use by date'??

Too many cans are wasted by them being left to sit and, as the photo shows, this is what happens, ruining the brush for the next person.

TOO MANY BRUSHES AND CANS ARE WASTED so, please members, respect the rules and all painters will be much happier!

NOW.

AS TO THE PAINT TINS???

- 1. As the paint used now averages approximately \$90 for 4 litres it is important to respect the cost of paint waste.
- 2. To avoid the above mentioned waste, oil-based paint must be securely sealed between uses to prevent the paint from drying out, rendering it useless.
- 3. Paint tins have a channel round the top of the tins which accepts the can's lid, enabling the tin to be sealed. These channels must be kept clean to enable the lid to be closed firmly, thus achieving a firm seal. If the channels are full of dry paint the tin cannot be sealed and the remaining paint will dry out becoming unusable.
- 4. To help keep the channel clean, surplus paint can be **CAREFULLY** wiped off the brush using the inside edge at the top of the can. This allows excess paint to run back into the tin instead of the outer lid seal.
- 5. If by chance paint is 'spilled' into the channel, **PLEASE** clean it out before replacing the lid.
- 6. **One idea** is to have a wire across the tin so that you can wipe surplus paint off the brush before painting. This wire would then be cleaned upon completion of the task at hand. Of course, the wire would be removed before sealing the can!
