III. Approval Of Minutes From Last Meeting

Minutes from Annual General Meeting of February 12, 2019 was sent electronically to all members for their review. A motion to accept the minutes as read was submitted by Jill Strain and seconded by Carolyn Ordal. The Motion carried.

IV. Committee Reports

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>. Treasurer Jill Strain reported a beginning balance (since the previous February report) was \$20,923.16; deposits were \$257.35/withdrawals were \$370.99; resulting in an ending balance of \$20,809.52. An official budget is pending. Jill is preparing a form to track requests for funds to be used for clinics/functions, etc. Motion to approve the report by Jeannie Baggett, seconded by Janice Budd. Motion carried.

Show Committee.

a. <u>Dressage Committee</u>: Rita Dunn reported the Working Equitation Clinic March 10, 2019 at Topperhill Farm was a huge success! Taught by Maria Blackstone, the clinic was full. Due to the interest shown, a second Clinic (already full) will be held at Topperhill Farm, Sunday, March 17, 2019 (noon start). Auditors are welcome and encouraged. Bill Graves/River Glen are considering adding a Working Equitation show to their schedule/Louise von Clef stated she would be willing to entertain hosting a show/clinic at Mountain Meadow Equestrian Facility as well!

b. <u>Spring Schooling Show 2019</u>. Scheduled Saturday May 4, 2019, at Penrose Farm. Show bill/entry forms are available in the newsletter and on the website. Contact Jean Sullivan to volunteer. Carolyn Ordal will be handling concessions.

c. <u>Fall Schooling Show 2019</u>. Scheduled Sept. 28, 2019, at Winfield Oaks, 433 Meadow Road, Greenback, TN. Judge: Laura Wolfe, L Graduate with Distinction. Prize list pending.

<u>Eventing Committee</u>. Ashley Phillips will be conducting a clinic on showing for new eventing riders April 5, 2019, at Winfield Oaks (5 p.m.). Shaelynn Baggett is working to promote this to new youth riders.

<u>Membership Committee</u>. Jill Strain discussed the potential for ordering CDCTS shirts to sell. Discussion was conducted regarding the type and color that would be best received. Shaelynn Baggett suggested investigating RedBubble.com – an online company providing opportunity for an online "store" to be established where individual orders may be placed, the company makes/ships the product as needed, and after expenses, the organization receives any profit. Use of this company or a like one will be investigated by the Membership Committee.

<u>Young Riders Committee</u>. Shaelyn Baggett reported the committee continues to investigate potential clinic possibilities targeted specifically to youth riders. She has set up a group Facebook page for youth: Crossroads Dressage & Combined Training – Youth. \$350 in Youth Scholarship is available (\$250 of this came from the

The 4-H Regional Show is May 30 - June 1 (Memorial Weekend) at Roane State. It was suggested CDCTS consider having a booth there. The Baggett Family will check into this (area 4-H director is David Perrin and the Knox County Extension Agent is Sharon Davis). Shaelyn Baggett also suggested we consider advertising with the Smokey Mountain Horse Show Series.



Mindful Horsemanship

While picking up rocks in a client's arena, dressage-horse-in-training "Dueszy" did something I have never had another horse offer to do in all my years of picking up rocks in arenas. Dueszy began to pick up rocks too! He rolled the first one around in his mouth for a few seconds, looked at me as if to say, "I'm not sure what you want me to do with this now that I've got it in my mouth!" So he spit it out, picked up another, and repeated this a few times.

What an eager pupil! Horses are eager pupils. They are eager to copy the behavior of their leader and they are eager to please their leader. They all have different ways of showing their eagerness, however, and their willingness can be easily forgotten when we are trying to teach our horse something new and s/he is not catching on quickly.

I am a dressage trainer. Like any equine endeavor, on a day to day basis, dressage is a practice. Progress happens weekly when we're lucky, but more often monthly. Being mindful about our daily practice with horses cultivates this monthly progression. Just as important, it helps us keep the work in perspective. Mindfulness safeguards against unrealistic expectations that lead to feelings of failure. Mindfulness allows us to appreciate the honest daily efforts of both ourselves and our horses. Mindfulness reminds us to have compassion for our horses and ourselves during difficult work.

Some examples of ways to be mindful are:

- Take a break from work to walk your horse on a loose rein or line once around the arena. Use this time to contemplate how you can better communicate the lesson to your horse.
- Take a deep breath and be sure you are responding to your horse how you would want to be treated if the roles were reversed.
- Mentally list 3 things that have gone well in your training session, giving both you and your horse credit for these achievements.
- Try to break down whatever difficulty you are having with your horse to the most basic misunderstanding. When you start work again, approach the lesson step by step, starting with the most basic component of the exercise.
- At the end of your work session, describe in one or two sentences the most effective thing you did to get a positive response from your horse. Write it down on an index card and read it right before you work with your horse tomorrow so you can bring today's success into your next session.

We are lucky to have these powerful creatures by our sides. At the end of the day, it is only fair for our horses to know we are truly grateful for their presence in our lives. Happy horsing!

Arena:

All Dressage Tests will be ridden in the Covered outdoor arena. Footing is sand and GGT. Warm up area will be in an outdoor sand ring and will be marked.

Dressage tests Intro, A, B, C and CT dressage tests "Green As Grass," "Elementary Novice," and Preliminary Test A will be ridden in a 20 m x 40 m arena. All other dressage tests, including the following CT tests—Preliminary Test B and Intermediate A and B—will be ridden in a 20 m x 60 m arena.

Jumping will be in a fenced-in outdoor arena. Footing is sand.

Attire:

Appropriate informal schooling attire is required. ASTM-SEI approved helmets and appropriate footwear is required and must be worn at all times when mounted.

Parking:

Cars may be parked separately from trailers, depending on numbers. Trailers will be parked in a signed area. Volunteers will be on hand to assist with parking. Please follow the guidance of the volunteers, park only in designated areas.

Ride Times:

Official ride times will be posted on the CDCTS website and FaceBook page on Thursday May 2, 2019 after 6 p.m.

CDCTS SCHOOLING SHOWS: General Rules and Etiquette

General Rules

- All shows are run under the general rules of USEF, unless otherwise specified.
- Approved protective headgear and footwear with appropriate heels must be worn whenever mounted.
- All schooling shows offer current: USDF Introductory Levels, USEF Training through Fourth Level, FEI levels, Rider tests, USEA Eventing tests, Pas de Deux and Musical Freestyles (all levels).
- It is expected that riders take pride in their turnout. Coats are encouraged, but not required. Plain white riding shirts or polo-style shirts with dark breeches are also appropriate. T-shirts or tank tops are not permitted. Note: during hot weather, riders are encouraged to show without coats in the interest of their health.
- Please go to the following websites to ensure that your attire and equipment is aligned with your discipline:

- Braiding the mane is encouraged, but not required.
- The following equipment is forbidden at a dressage show: martingales of any kind; bearing, side or running reins; seat covers; and any form of blinkers.
 - The following equipment is permitted in warm-up areas: running martingales, bandages, boots and side reins.
 - All equipment, including whips, bits and spurs must comply with USEF rules.
 - Ear nets are permitted; fly masks are not allowed.
- No bareback riding is allowed.
- A rider should not be judged by anyone who has instructed him/her within the last 30 days (exception: attending clinics). If you arrive at the show and find that your instructor has been substituted for the judge, notify the show manager and ask to ride hors concours, or don't ride and receive a full credit for your entry fees.
- If you are riding a musical freestyle, please bring your own music and boom box.
- Check your score before you leave the show grounds. Any scoring errors must be reported and corrected before you leave the show grounds. After that time, no corrections can be made.
- Please note that classes do not always go in order of lowest to highest. Classes at shows may be scheduled in any order throughout the day.
- Classes may be split or combined, depending on the number and distribution of entries.
- If you intend to bring a horse that is not competing onto the show grounds, this decision must be cleared with the show manager prior to the show date, and will be at his/her discretion. If permitted by the manager, you must bring a current negative Coggins test to the show grounds and present it to the manager upon your arrival, before you unload your horse and also pay the non-competition fee. Please see the entry form for details.

Show Etiquette

- Be considerate of other riders in the warm-up area. Pass left-shoulder to left-shoulder and yield to those who are moving at faster gaits.
- Arrive outside the ring approximately one minute before your ride time, having already warmed up your horse. You will have 45 seconds to enter the ring once the judge has rung the bell.
- If your ride is not next, please do not congregate with your horse around the arena entrance.
- Lunging is prohibited in the warm-up area; check with the show manager or warm-up ring steward about where lunging is permitted on the show grounds.
- Be courteous to the judge and show volunteers.
- Should you need to excuse yourself from the ring during your test for any reason, be sure to ask for the judge's permission prior to exiting the ring.
- Leave your trailer site clean; pick up all trash and manure and dispose of it or take it with you.
- Obey all rules of the facility where the show is held. (For example: where to park, no smoking, no dogs, etc)




