- Use of volunteer earned vouchers and scholarships: Non-members are included in the spreadsheet drafted by Julie Hall to track volunteer hours. A \$10.00 voucher is issued upon accumulation of 8 hours. A copy of the spreadsheet was distributed to those in attendance, although difficult to read, it tracks all volunteer hours earned by individuals (including non-members) and when vouchers and scholarships are issued. There is a balance column and a YTD column which is helpful for year end award consideration. Carolyn Ordal will provide the secretary with volunteer hours for the fall schooling show and FFD. A discussion was had about providing information to the club secretary when a member has redeemed a voucher or coupon for tracking purposes.
- A discussion was had about the addition of Western/Gaited Dressage category to year end awards. It was agreed, pending additional review by Alece Ellis, the minimum percentage for Adult Amateur and Jr/YR awards would be 62% for Intro and Basic Level and 60% for Levels 1-4. The minimum percentage for Open Riders was tabled pending additional review by Alece Ellis. It was agreed the general rule regarding the number of test scores required would be consistent with English Dressage requirements 3 scores, 2 judges and 2 shows. Revised guidelines for 2022 will be drafted and circulated. A revised 2021 submittal form, adding Western/Gaited Dressage will be drafted and circulated prior to publication via email to the members, and posted on the website and in the newsletter. It was also agreed the minimum percentages for English Dressage should be addressed for 2022.
- Susan Machaud brought guest Cari Gleeson to introduce her to the board and discuss the needs of
 the club with regards to holding schooling shows which would include combined training classes at
 Winfield Oaks. Cari submitted a 2022 Professional/Business Membership Application. We appreciate her
 attendance at the board meeting.
- The CDCTS Spring Schooling Show will be held May 7, 2022 and will include combined training tests. It was requested we have a confirmed venue by the February 2022 meeting. Several options were discussed and will be pursued.

SIX PHASES OF A SECOND LEVEL RIDE WITH HILDA GURNEY

"DRESSAGE TODAY" July 2, 2019

FEI 'I' judge Hilda Gurney explains how to pull together the more advanced Second Level dressage movements and approach Second Level schooling sessions with planning and purpose. HILDA GURNEY

Second Level puts demands on the horse that he hasn't experienced before. Collected and medium paces ask for more engagement and thrust from his haunches, as well as development of the topline muscles over his neck, back, loins and croup. Lateral movements, shoulder-in, travers and renvers demand increased flexibility of the horse's body, as well as the ability to cross both his fore and hind legs over in front of one another. Because of these added demands, the use of stretching exercises in the warm-up and warm-down phases of the daily schooling sessions become more important.

My schooling sessions for Second Level and up have six phases:

- (1) Walk,
- (2) Stretching trot and canter,
- (3) Suppleness (developing collected paces),
- (4) Schooling (reviewing learned movements and schooling new ones),
- (5) Warm-down (similar to the second phase, but not as long) and
- (6) Walk (if possible out of the arena).

COACH'S CORNER - CONTINUED

Phase 1. I first like to warm-up my horse at the free walk. Whan I feel that my work is relaxed after an few minutes at the free walk I like to ask for a connection, developing a medium walk while making sure that the strides of the walk remain fairly long and energetic. While in the medium walk I like to ask for a few meters of shoulder-in, making sure that I keep the quality of the medium walk by moving the horse forward into the contact during the shoulder-in. I also like to perform a few strides of travers if I feel that my horse is able to maintain the longitudinl connection by marching into the contact with the bit while he bends around my inside leg and crosses his outside legs over his inside legs.

Phase 2. After ten or so minutes, depending on how long it takes for my horse to loosen and relax, I begin warming up at the trot. Large circles and changes of rein are good warm up patterns. I think of the dressage arena as an oval rather than a rectangle when warming up young or green horses. Corners are a lot to ask early in the schooling session. The goal of warm-up is to have my horse stretch down and out with his neck while he fills out my outside reign as a result of his bending around my inside leg. The horse should become softer in his contact with the inside rein. An energetic but not quick tempo of the trot is ideal.

When the horse establishes the correct connection in one direction, I change rein and work on the horse filling out the outside rein in the other direction. Most of this bending, stretching warm-up is best practiced on the 20-meter circle.

When my horse becomes rhythmic and supple in both directions at the trot I ask for canter. In canter most horses carry themselves more up hill and don't need to be stretched as far down as in trot to get the stretching over their topline (too deep of a stretch might put the horse on the forehand in the canter, since only horses with a good canter carry themselves uphill). It's important that he continues to fill out my outside rein to prevent him from falling on his inside shoulder and therefore on his forehand. When I feel the horse is using his back well and bending and stretching both longitudinally and laterally it's beneficial to practice transitions back and forth from trot to canter and back to trot again.

Tense horses often take more time to get them to relax and stretch their muscles. One of my FEI level horses, on some days, takes at least 20 minutes to relax enough so that he can stretch down and bend around my inside leg filling out my outside rein. When I finally feel him relax, stretching and bending on the circle, I alternate trot and canter transitions ont he circle. After cantering, this horse will often tense up again, hurrying his rhythm and tightening his body, so bending is difficult to achieve. I take the time to reestablish the rhythm, relaxation, stretching and bending. when this horse truly relaxes and supples his body, his gaits become long, springy and high off the ground. During the schooling session if I feel this horse tighten his back, I use the supple, stretching circle to again loosen his tight back muscles.

COACH'S CORNER - CONTINUED

Phase 3. Being supple becomes important at Second Level with the introduction of collected paces. It takes time to develop the uphill balance of cillection from the working paces at the second phase. Collected gaits need to be developed before I can begin to school the lateral movements required in Second Level as well as medium gaits. Half halts are the key to developing collected gaits. I often alternate some short lengthening of stride at either trot or canter, depending on how my horse reacts, with half halts to devleop the collected gaits. I try to use the half halts to engage my horses without making his strides too much shorter than in the light lenthening he is performing. As a result of the half halts the horse will elevate his shoulders, lighten and free his forehand, as well as elevate his shoulders. If my horse doesn't repond to the half halts, I may ask for a full halt. From the full halt, I ask for an immediate forward response from my leg and seat aids to go forward. If the horse doesn't immediately repond, I give a sharp push with my leg and if necessary, a light tap just behind my leg with the whip. As soon as the horse responds, I immediately lighten my driving aids as a reward. I always remind myself that on the reward (in this case, the lightening of the driving aids) trains the horse. Punishment (discomfort) only tells him what not to do. Reward (more comfort) tells him what I want him to do.

At least three strides of the transition are needed for a young or green horse to go from halt to trop. Hopping steps can result if I ask an undeveloped horse to take a few shorter strides, although the full trot should be acheived by the third or fourth stride from the halt with a Second Level horse.

Phase 4. Before I go into the schooling phase. I need to make sure I have developed the impulsion and uphill balance that results in collected gaits in both trot and canter. Now, in collected gaits, my horse will be able to successfully perform the lateral movement, difficult transitions, as well as balancing movements (counter canter) required in Second Level.

Phase 5. After I have completed my schooling session, which I always try to end with a successfully performed easier exercise, I again warm my horse down. This phase is important because it again supples and stretches out my horse's topline muscles.


Phase 6. When I feel my horse relaxed and nicely filling out my outside rein, its time for a nice hack outside on a long rein. Then back to the barn and carrots!

AB EQUINE THERAPY

Dysfunction In The Stifles!

More specifically when the horse 'loses' the hind end or feels 'hitchy' in their gait. You may have experienced this 'hitch' when riding. Have you ever felt like one of your horse's legs has given out and momentarily lagged behind them? We typically categorize this as a stifle weakness issue, so let's dig a little deeper into that.



The horse's stifle has a locking mechanism called the stay apparatus associated with it. This mechanism locks into place allowing the horse to rest for long periods of time with minimal muscular effort.

Dysfunction of the stifle occurs when the medial patellar ligament becomes temporarily caught on the trochlear ridge of the femur during movement. Essentially the locking mechanism is malfunctioning. In more advanced cases the term intermittent upward fixation of the patella or IUPF is used to describe the dysfunction.

A lot of times this is caused by weakness of the supporting musculature. There can also be conformational predispositions such as the horse being very straight through the hocks and having low heels.

Stifle dysfunction can also manifest itself in other ways such as:

- toe dragging
- resistance when cantering (short spread, bunny hopping)
- · difficulty going up or down hills
- difficulty backing up
- problems during gait transitions (especially apparent in downward transitions)
- you may find the problem is worse when the horse is not in work or has had a long break.
- hind limb lag or hitch
- · shortened stride of the hind limbs
- circumduction
- accompanying sacroiliac pain/discomfort

These signs are easy to catch early if you know what to look for! Next time you're watching your horse from the ground keep an eye on the stifle during transitions and see what you pick up on.

General Rules:

 Awards for Rated and Schooling Shows will be divided into the following categories: AA, JF/YR, and Open. At each level one award will be issued in each category. Minimum qualifying scores apply at each level (see chart above).

For Rated Shows: Intermediate I and II will be considered 1 level. Musical Freestyles 1st – 4th will be considered 1 level, and FEI Musical Freestyles will be considered 1 level for awards purposes. All other Levels, Training thru Grand Prix, will be considered separately for awards at Rated Shows.

For Schooling Shows: All FEI tests will be considered 1 level for awards purposes. All other levels, Intro thru 4th, will be considered separately for awards at Schooling Shows. Musical Freestyles from all levels will be considered 1 level for awards purposes.

- AA and JR/YR status MUST be stated on the front of the score sheet or it will otherwise be considered Open.
- Awards are base on percentage, not placing in the class.
- Awards are based on a horse/rider combination. The rider must have been a CDCTS member at the time of the show. Riders who submit a membership application on the date of the show will also be eligible for year-end awards.

CDCTS YEAR END AWARDS PACKET - CONTINUED

Year-End Awards Program

- The horse/rider combination must submit at least 3 scores from 2 different judges at 2 different shows. At least 1 score must be derived from the highest test of that level.
- Tabulation of scores shall be based on an average of the scores submitted for each level.
- All riders are responsible for mailing or emailing in copies of their tests.
 Original tests will not be returned. Photo copies of tests must be received by November 30, and copies MUST SHOW TEST WAS SIGNED BY THE JUDGE.
- At Combined Test competitions, only horses designated "Dressage Only" will be allowed to send in scores.
- Horse and rider combinations showing at more than one level during the awards year will only be eligible for awards at one level. The rider may choose which level they would like to be eligible for awards, and only submit scores for that level. If scores are submitted for more than one level, only those scores earned at the highest level will be considered for year-end awards purposes.
- Horse/rider combinations are not eligible to win an award at the same level in consecutive or subsequent years with the exception of the FEI levels (Prix St. Georges thru Grand Prix) which will allow eligibility to win an award at the same level more than one time in consecutive or subsequent years.
- Only scores from the current competition year (Dec. 1 Nov. 30) will count towards year-end awards.
- A member must have four volunteer hours to qualify for CDCTS Awards.
 There will be a sign-in sheet at each event that has volunteer
 opportunities. You will have already been contacted to volunteer at an
 event, but it is up to the individual to sign in and out on that particular
 event's volunteer roster to get the required four hours.
- Combined Training Awards will be presented at each level, Novice through Prelim, for both schooling shows and rated events to a rider in each category: Open, Adult Amateur, and Junior/Young Rider. General rules apply.

NON-RIDING AWARDS

MERRY HOUR AWARD – created to honor Carol Grau, as the founding member of the club and her legacy of service to our equestrian community. This award is intended to recognize an outstanding, long-time CDCTS member who has embodied the mission statement of the club, with a long history of service to the club.

LAUREL ANN CROWE AWARD – a perpetual trophy presented each year to the club member with the lowest combined training score at a schooling show.

JACK FOSTER PERPETUAL AWARD – given each year to the club member with the highest point score at Training Level or above from a schooling show sanctioned by CDCTS. The Jack Foster Award was conceived by the club in the 1990s as a memorial to the husband of Karen Foster, a past president of the club. At one time the club put on 3-4 rated shows in Harriman. Jack volunteered to announce all day long at every one of them. He died suddenly of a heart attack in his mid-forties. It is a perpetual trophy, and each year a new plaque is added to the base to display the name of that year's award winner. The winner keeps the trophy until the following year, when another plaque is added and another winner takes the trophy home for the year.

VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR AWARD – designed to recognize the member who has helped the club by volunteering personal time and talent throughout the year.

All awards will be announced at the Year-End Awards Banquet, held annually in January.

The Volunteer of the Year Award is designed to recognize the member who has helped the club out by volunteering personal time and talent to help the club throughout the year.

Awards will be offered for Schooling Shows and Recognized Shows for both Dressage and Eventing in all levels and the following divisions:

Open

Perpetual Trophies

Laurel Ann Crowe Award – awarded to the rider with the best score in a Combined Test at a Schooling Show

Jack Foster Perpetual Award – awarded to the rider with the highest dressage score from (Training level or above) a schooling show.

Year-End Award Rules

Adult Amateur or JR/YR status MUST be stated or it will otherwise be considered Open.

Awards are based on percentage (dressage), or low score (combined tests); not the position placing in the class.

<u>Each rider must be a member of CDCTS</u> prior to the time of the show in order to be eligible for year-end awards.

Dressage

RECOGNIZED SHOWS: A horse and rider combination must submit at least 3 scores for the award level. The scores submitted must be from at least 2 different judges and can result from one or more shows. At least 1 score must be derived from the highest test of that level.

SCHOOLING SHOWS: A horse and rider combination must submit at least 3 scores from 2 different judges for the award level. The scores must be attained from at least two shows with 2 different judges. At least 1 score must be derived from the highest test of that level.

Eventing

Rated Shows: A horse and rider combination must submit 2 scores from 2 different shows with 2 different dressage judges.

Schooling Shows: A horse and rider combination must submit 2 scores from 2 different shows with 2 different judges.

All shows: A horse and rider combination may submit scores for multiple levels however they will only be eligible to win at one level.

Horse and rider combinations are not eligible to win an award at the same level in consecutive or subsequent years with the exception of the FEI levels (Prix St-Georges through Grand Prix) which will allow eligibility to win an award at the same level more than one time in consecutive or subsequent years.

Only scores from the current competition year (December 1 – November 30) will count towards year-end awards.

A minimum of 4 volunteer hours must be completed during the current competition year (December 1 – November 30) in order to be eligible for year-end awards. If you haven't earned your volunteer hours, you may pay a \$50 fee to waive them or another member may donate their hours to you.***please see below for the MANY ways you may earn your volunteer hours***

All riders are responsible submitting the Score Submittal form and any required paperwork and returned by the due date to be considered for year end awards.

***Volunteer hours can be earned by helping at any CDCTS event, writing for the newsletter, serving on the board, donating lessons or services to the silent auction, etc.
