Sandpaper Tree, Anacua Ehretia anacua



Once you feel the leaves on an Anacua, you'll know why they call it "Sandpaper Tree". It's a stand out with its large black-green oval leaves. White spring blossoms attract bees and butterflies. Like a live oak, it's not a "true evergreen" – new leaves will come every spring –earlier than most oaks. Small fruits are yellow-orange, sweet and eaten by birds and other small wildlife. It will need to be well watered to get established, but then it will be exceedingly droughttolerant. Anacuas grow well as understory when young, but eventually grow large enough to qualify as canopy trees. The trunk on an old Anacua is unusual - it's like several corky corded trunks all bound together and it has reddish, flaking bark. Native!
