

## A NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR

## **Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,**

<sup>17</sup> Jesus said, "Do not hold on to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father. Go instead to my brothers and tell them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God."

<sup>18</sup> Mary Magdalene went to the disciples with the news: "I have seen the Lord!" And she told them that he had said these things to her. John 20:17-18

"Do not hold onto me." Jesus says this in His resurrected body. If I were Mary, I would want to hold onto and feel the proof that He was alive again. I would want to cling to him and say, "You are really alive!" Yet Jesus tells her not yet, for I have more holy work to do. How often do we want to cling to what God is working on for our behalf and the world? We want to cling to the wrong things, the wrong ideas, the wrong perspectives, the ones that no longer serve to give new life. It is human because we are like Mary and are often surprised by what God can do.

Find time to sit on the back deck, front porch, or just on your couch with your feet up and relax with one of these books in your hand.



The Oldest Living Things in the World by Rachel Sussman: Artist and scientist Rachel Sussman set out to photograph the old living things in the world. This stunning coffee table book reminds us how fleeting and precious a single human life is against the backdrop of mosses, lichen, and tree systems that have lived for centuries.



A City Inside by Tillie Warden: A story that shifts between the surreal and the everyday as a woman looks back on her child-hood and growing up, ultimately about discovering who we are and want to be in life while not having just one coming-of-age, but multiple in a lifetime. A beautiful reminder that who we are in this moment does not define who we can become.



Dear Children of the Earth by Schim Schimmel: Dear Children of the Earth begins a remarkable letter from Mother Earth asking for help from children everywhere. She writes to express her love for each and every child and asks for their love and appreciation in return. In her own words, and with all of her heart, Mother Earth enfolds children with love and entrusts them with her protection. The book contains a beautiful message with equally beautiful artwork. Schimmel's message is appropriate

for children of all ages. I might add, it is one of my favorite children's books.

## CHRISITAN MUSIC SUGGESTIONS

As some of you may know, I am a fan of Christian music. To that end, I thought I would make some recommendations for some of my favorite singers. When you see me in church, be sure to let me know your thoughts about these suggested musicians.

**AMY GRANT** is a famous Contemporary Christian Music (CCM)





singer turned pop. She has been singing since the age of 20 and is married to country singer Vince Gill. Grant made her debut as a teenager, gaining fame in Christian music during the 1980s with such hits as "Father's Eyes", "El Shaddai", and "Angels". In the mid-1980s, she began broadening

her audience and soon became one of the first CCM artists to cross over into mainstream pop on the heels of her successful albums *Unguarded* and *Lead Me On*. These albums, *Be Still and Know... Hymns of Faith*, and *Age to Age* are two of my favorites.





MICHAEL W. SMITH is an American musician who has captured hearts in both contemporary Christian and mainstream charts. His biggest success in mainstream music was in 1991 when "Place in This World" hit

No. 6 on the Billboard Hot 100. Over the course of his career, he has sold more than 18 million albums. On two occasions, Smith has collaborated with Amy Grant and served as her keyboardist for a time. I guess you can tell why I enjoy Smith's music. These two albums are *Worship* (2001) and *A New Hallelujah* (2008).

I hope you give these musicians a try. I enjoy their works very much and would love to hear your thoughts.

The Deacons continue to work diligently to maintain their missions. Below is a list of the items they discussed during their meeting in March.

The Little Pantry continues to be used daily. Oftentimes, we cannot keep enough food on the shelves as the food is picked up as soon as it is stocked. A special thank you to our congregation and outside community members who continue to assist with his critical community outreach. You are a blessing. We are exploring the opportunity to request donations from local businesses for the pantry. We will keep you updated when we receive news about this endeavor. We no longer stock personal care items in the pantry. However, we continue to distribute personal care bags at free community dinners each month for those who need them.

Kid Care Kits are still being distributed to the middle schools of Hackettstown and Great Meadows. The school nurses express their appreciation for the items we include in these kits.

This month, we will participate in the Town-Wide Garage Sale, which will take place on April 27th. The Deacons are offering an opportunity for people in the church and in the public to rent a 6 foot table to sell their items. In addition, if anyone wishes to donate items to be sold at the event, we are gratefully accepting those items and will apply the proceeds from this sale toward the general church fund.

As witnessed on March 31st, the Deacons provided the carnations for the Easter cross. See the photo in the March Highlights and check out our Facebook page and the church website for more photos.

Our Clothing Drive is on May 4th; however, we will be collecting items on April 30th, from 6-8 PM in the church parking lot. Please be sure to bag your items and provide all shoes in separate bags.

Finally, the Deacons have set the date for the Free Market. This year it will be held on Saturday, September 21st from 9 AM - 5PM. Save the date for this community event.



- 3. In February, the value of the MassMutual Investment accounts increased \$8,252.23 to **\$334,206.46**.
- 4. The total endowment fund on February 29, 2024, was \$349,078.92. The total endowment fund was up \$8,321.75 since February 1, 2024, and up \$9,413.29 since January 1, 2024.
- 5. The community dinner expenses for February were \$200.78. The donations collected at the dinner were \$58.00.
- 6. The Men's breakfast expenses for February were \$22.20. The donations collected at the breakfast were \$101.00.

The 2024 Per Capita is \$42.50 for each of the 203 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2022.) The total amount due in 2024 is \$8,627.50 or \$718.96 monthly. In February, \$425.28 was received for Per Capita bringing the total received in 2024 to \$2,379.28 or 27.6% of the amount due. A Per Capita payment of \$718.96 was sent to the Presbytery of the Highlands of NJ in February making the total sent in 2024 \$1.437.92 or 16.7% of the total amount due.

## PHANTOMS HOCKEY GAME





# Sharing God's Bounty

## What's Your Gift?

Perhaps you haven't spent much time, if any, pondering that question. God has given each of us at least one gift, though, and if even one of us does not use that gift, the Body of Christ suffers. Paul, in Ephesians 4:16 writes, "From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and build itself up in love, as each part does its work."

Christian stewards tend to have a lower opinion of themselves than they ought, denigrating their abilities and talents and even their financial capabilities. When we keep in mind that it is God himself who has chosen our gifts and blessed us materially, we realize that to belittle these gifts is to question God's wisdom and generosity. Again we read Paul's words, now from Romans 12:5, ". . . in Christ, we who are many form one body, and each member belongs to all the others." He goes on to say that whatever our gifts are, we are to use them as effectively as we can.

Yes, it is the pastor's job to preach the Word and administer the Sacraments, but we, as stewards who have received the Great Commission from Matthew 28:19-20, are to be obedient also to Jesus' command to tell the Good News to the whole world.

Yes, there are those in your congregation who seem to have more abilities and talents than you, and there may be members who have more money than you – perhaps may even be very wealthy. Does that exempt you from the responsibility to serve or to give? By no means! In 2 Corinthians 9:7 we're commanded, "Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." Each one is to give and to give cheerfully – of his time, his talents, and his treasures. God looks at the size of the heart of the giver rather than at the size of his gift. "For if the willingness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has, not according to what he does not have" (2 Corinthians 8:12).

If you are not using your gifts, if you are not giving your money, if you are not sharing your time, the Body of Christ suffers. We need each other and our individual gifts in order that we might carry out our responsibilities as stewards to the end that the name of Christ might be made known.

Stewardship is not about large giving, but gifts in small ways. A child's gift, although small, gives glory to the Lord in many ways. Stewardship does not have to be in monetary ways. A gift of time to an elderly shut-in serves the Lord, too, A gift of a loaf of bread to a homeless family could mean the difference between going to bed hungry or going to bed satisfied.

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
## MEMORIAL DAY PARADE IS COMING
