

WREATHS ACROSS AMERICA REMEMBERED

Each year, National Wreaths Across America Day occurs in December across the world. The focus point is on wreath laying at Arlington National Ceremony plus 3700 additional locations in all 50 US states, at sea, and abroad. Our very own scout troop has participated in this activity over the years, and this year was no exception.

On December 16, 2023, all of our Scout and Cub Troops partnered with the Blairstown Masonic Lodge for this activity. A ceremony at the Chapel first took place, then Mr. Charles Prestopine provided a speech giving an overview of the Revolutionary War and its significance in the Hackettstown area, and finally volunteers placed wreaths on the graves in The Old Burial Ground. Members of the Colonial Musketeers Fife and Drum Corp attended to the pomp and circumstance. As part of this year's ceremony, members of the Masonic Lodge and Scout and CubTroops donated canned and packaged goods to our Little Pantry. What a blessing to receive these offerings which will provide items for the food insecure in and around Hackettstown.

The mission of Wreaths Across America touches the lives of thousands of school, scout, civic and religious groups across the country through fundraising for wreath sponsorships. These groups help ensure that a wreath is placed on each hero's grave. In return, the groups receive fundraising dollars that assist in furthering their own goals and projects.

Next year's Wreaths Across America will take place on December 14, 2024. We hope to see you again at the Chapel and then at the Cemetery for the placing of the wreaths on the graves of the heroes who sacrificed their lives for our country.

NEWS FROM THE DEACONS

The monthly meeting of the deacons occurred on December 12, 2023. At that meeting, we welcomed Kathy Maier as our newest nominated Deacon member for a 3-year term, which she will begin in January.

Pastor Erin reported that she used money from Pastor's Discretionary Fund to cover an emergency situation. In addition, she notes that she will be setting up homebound visits. During the month of December, we sent out Christmas mailings to homebound members, including a book of carols and devotions called O Holy Night. Also during this past month, we established a new date for the bi-annual Clothing Drive: May 4, 2024. Please mark your calendars.

Our Little Pantry continues to thrive, especially with the assistance of our Scout Troop members. Although items are depleting quickly, Eagle Scout Autumn Hoover has graciously donated over 1,000 pounds of food, personal care, and pet supplies to the Little Pantry as part of her eagle scout project. Thank you, Autumn, for your generosity and kindness.

Since our personal care items go immediately upon stocking the shelves of the pantry, we are considering other options to make sure these toiletry items are available to as many people as possible.

We continue to create and provide Kid's Care Kits for elementary and middle schools in Hackettstown and in Great Meadows Middle School. Also, beginning in January, we will be collecting hats, scarves, and mittens for our elementary schools in Hackettstown and Great Meadows. See the article about this initiative.

In other news, decal magnets, being designed by James Tischler, will be ordered soon. We hope to sell these decals to the congregation in an effort to raise some money for our missions. Remaining Christmas ornaments were sold after church worship during the month of December.

Poinsettia sponsorship raised \$495 with 38 sponsors. White poinsettias are from Rose Green. Deacons were responsible for setup, removal, and cleanup of flowers.

Because no one has come forward with interest in food-handler certification, we are still seeking interested members to consider this opportunity.

The 2024 Per Capita amount at \$42.50 for each member of our congregation. This is the same amount as 2023.

The 2023 Per Capita is \$42.50 for each of the 201 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2021.) The total amount due in 2023 is \$8,542.50 or \$711.88 monthly. In November, \$42.50 was received for the Per Capita bringing the total received in 2023 to \$2,874.00 or 33.6%. A Per Capita payment of \$42.50 was sent to the Presbytery of the Highlands of NJ in November bringing the total sent to \$2,874.00 or 33.6% of the total amount due.

BUILDING ON GENEROSITY (BOG) CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

GOD'S LOVE ENDURES FOREVER

This month we regret to inform you of the passing of Roger G. George, a long time member of the church, who died peacefully on Christmas Eve at the home of his daughter, Gwenn Bartku, Hackettstown, NJ. Roger was 88 years old

Roger, born March 24, 1935 in Treichlers, PA, is the son of the late Howard and Carolyn Knecht George. He was the husband of the late Carolyn L. George who died in 2012. They were married fifty-five years. Roger earned a B.S. degree in Child Psychology and an M.A. degree in American History. Upon graduation, Roger served three years with the U.S. Army Security Agency in a special mobile intelligent unit in Germany. Upon



discharge from the army, he taught eight years at the Hackettstown Middle School and twenty seven years at the West Morris Central High School in the Social Studies Department. He also served as the Audio/Visual director and sponsored a fly fishing club at West Morris Central. Each May, the club took a trip to the Beaverkill River in New York's Catskill Mountains.

Roger was an Ordained Elder of the First Presbyterian Church, Hackettstown, NJ. He served on the board of Hackettstown Public Library, was a Board member and Chairman of the Hackettstown Recreation Commission in the 1970s and was instrumental in planning For Hackettstown's Public Swimming Pool. Roger was a Charter member of the Catskill Fly Fishing Center and Museum in Livingston Manor, NY.

Roger is survived by his children, Gwenn (Louis) Bartku, Philip (Wendy) George, Andrew (Rebecca) George, seven grandchildren, Lindsey, Gregory, Rachel, Sarah, Aaron, Alanah, Audrey, and eleven great grandchildren and brother Larry George.

Sharing God's Bounty Forgetting What Is Behind

"Forget about it." It's a phrase we may say to ourselves when we don't want to face up to something. Perhaps we give it in the form of advice to someone who's complaining about an offense he's received. According to Paul, it's a good thing to do. It's counsel he followed himself: "Forgetting what is behind and straining toward what is ahead, I press on toward the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenward in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:13b-14).

Paul had a past anyone would want to forget. In his Pharisaical zeal, he had caused the imprisonment, persecution, and even death of many who were followers of the Way. All that changed, we know, when he himself faced Jesus on the road to Damascus.

Yet, from our reading of Scripture, we know he didn't "forget what was behind." He brought it up many times as he explained the change that Jesus had brought about in his life to the other apostles and as he testified in the highest courts of the day.

Like Paul, we can't forget about our past sins – and maybe that's good, as long as we remember that Christ has forgotten them! Remembrance of our sins serves the purpose of keeping us humble and grateful, aware that we walk in God's ways only as we rely on him to lead us, thankful that he forgives all sin, past, present, and future. Then we are not encumbered by guilt (1 John 3:20). We can "[forget] what's behind" and "press on toward the goal" that Christ has lain out before us as we serve him with all the gifts he so graciously gives us.

We begin a new year in God's grace. We also begin each day, sometimes each moment, as newly forgiven, cleansed stewards equipped through Word and Sacrament to fulfill God's purposes for our lives.

Our own growth and the growth of our church depend on the willingness of us all to invest that talent for others. As a member of your church, you are called to share in all aspects of its life. Membership is responsibility - the response to the call to ministry, and service. To be a church member is to answer that call with time and talent.
