



#### **Financial Comments / Observations:**

1. The five largest operating expenses in May were:



- •1.) \$7,508.66 Pastoral expenses (payroll, Board of Pensions, etc.).
- \*2.) \$4,223.21 Staff payroll & payroll processing expenses.
- \*3.) \$1,422.15 Computer and Software.
- •4.) \$390.98 Electric expenses (3 buildings).
- \*5.) \$389.04 Water and sewer quarterly expenses (3 buildings).
- 2.The May and Year To Date operating net income / (deficit) are (\$2,340.69) and (\$16,467.41) respectively.
- \*The actual May operating expenses were \$2,522 below the average monthly budgeted expenses.
- \*The actual May operating income was \$2,405 below the average monthly budgeted income.
- Both the Year-To-Date operating incomes and expenses are above the budgeted amounts.
- 3. In May, the value of the Mass Mutual Investments decreased \$3,152.12 to \$317,235.62.
- 4. The total endowment fund on May 31, 2023, was \$320,531.64. The total endowment fund was down \$3,203.11 since May 1, 2023, and up \$11,756.88 since January 1, 2023.

The 2023 Per Capita amount is \$42.50 for each member of our congregation.

The 2023 Per Capita is \$42.50 for each of the 201 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2021.) The total amount due in 2023 is \$8,542.50 or \$711.88 monthly. In May, \$42.50 was received for the Per Capita bringing the total received in 2023 to \$2,704.00 or 31.7%. This amount was then sent to the Presbytery bringing the total to \$2,704.00 or 31.7%.


During the months of July and August, we will begin a new Bible study which focuses on the women of the Old Testament. This session's study will be centered on *From Widows to Warriors: Women's Stories from the Old Testament* by Rev. Dr. Lynn Japinga.

The Deacon Board met on June 13 and discussed many of its mission projects that have taken place over the past month and made plans for the month of July.

The Board is pleased to announce that it has spent 40 years working together with Kenya, hosting the water project. This partner-ship will continue.

During its semi-annual clothing drive on May 20, 2023, the congregation donated 3,568 pounds of clothing to the A&E Clothing Corporation. The church received \$713.60 payment - \$.15/pound for clothing and \$.17/pound for shoes. We also received \$4.00/per bike. We are requesting that the next drive take place on October 21, 2023, with an alternate date of October 28.

As you may recall, we have put in a request for town approval for a book drop to be placed in our parking lot. We are still waiting for that approval.

During the Maifest fundraising activity, we collected \$255.00 profit at the tent sale and \$46.00 from goodies which were sold at the church, making our total earnings \$301.00.

This summer, we are announcing our Summer Stewardship Project associated with the Little Pantry. We need more food and personal care items. Please see the article associated with this project on the previous pages. In addition, we are looking forward to the completion of the eagle scout cabinet project.

This past month we purchased table carts for use at the Chapel. The cost covered by the Deacons was \$277.20.

As you may recall, each year we work together with the local schools in the district to purchase items needed for students. However, there are changes in school administration and no needs have been reported at this time.

During the church grounds cleanup in May, the Prayer Garden was given a face lift. We are now looking at purchasing a Pergola with shrubs for privacy.

Finally, we have received donations in memory of Charles Lee. They will be used at the discretion of the Deacon Board members.

# Sharing God's Bounty Faithful in All Things

Jesus said, "Whoever can be trusted with very little can be trusted with much, and whoever is dishonest with very little will also be dishonest with much" (Luke 16:10). Jesus used the loaves and fish of a young boy to reveal how God can magnify a small gift. God commended their faith with small things, and he didn't overlook what faithful people did with small things.

Through God's Word, we understand that small things do count. Because we understand our need to be faithful with all things, we should ask ourselves how we are handling the seemingly small things in our lives. Are we handling small things well in our homes, jobs, and churches? Can non-Christians see a difference in us? With God's help, we can be faithful with ALL that we've been given. Through our faithfulness, God will be glorified.
