



#### **Financial Comments / Observations:**

- 1. The five largest operating expenses in April were:
  - \$7,836.89 Pastoral expenses (payroll, Board of Pensions, etc.).



- \$4,337.71 Quarterly Liability Insurance.
- \$4,199.76 Staff payroll & payroll processing expenses.
- \$3,392.50 Grounds Care (snow plowing & salting).
- \$3,132.56 Facilities Expenses.
- 2.The April and Year To Date operating net income / (deficit) are (\$13,875.89) and (\$14,126.72) respectively.
- \*The actual April operating expenses were \$8,634 above the average monthly budgeted expenses. The reason the expenses were high is because 1.) the quarterly liability insurance was due (\$4,337.71), 2.) final snow and salting payments from March (\$3,392.50) and 3.) facilities expenses (\$3,131.56) primarily new lights in the youth room and
- church offices were paid.
- The actual April operating income was \$2,784 below the average monthly budgeted income.
- Both the Year-To-Date operating incomes and expenses are above the budgeted amounts.

- 3. In April, the value of the Mass Mutual Investments increased \$2,976.03 to \$320,387.74.
- 4. The total endowment fund on April 30, 2023, was \$323,734.75. The total endowment fund was up \$2,850.38 since April 1, 2023, and up \$14,959.99 since January 1, 2023.
- 5. There were no donations or expenses received from the Community Dinner in April.

The 2023 Per Capita is \$42.50 for each of the 201 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2021.) The total amount due in 2023 is \$8,542.50 or \$711.88 monthly. In April, \$255.00 was received for the Per Capita bringing the total received in 2023 to \$2,661.50 or 31.2%. There was \$525.87 sent to the Presbytery of the Highlands of NJ in April bringing the total sent to \$2,661.50 or 31.2% of the total amount due.

The Deacon Board was busy throughout the month of May.

The Simmons family and Kristin Taenzer, a college student earning community hours, as well as a few other congregation members, have been seeing to the upkeep of the Little Pantry. Lorinda Ravo has purchased \$174.99 worth of food and personal care items using funds from the Super Bowl of caring.

We held our clothing drive on May 20, 2023 from 8-9 am. For this collection, the Deacons provided two opportunities for people to drop off donations. They were at the garage on both Tuesday evening, May 16th, and Saturday morning, May 20th. We collected 385 bags.

Collection of stuffed animals is continuing and another bag has just been dropped off at the rescue squad building.

The Deacons are awaiting town approval for a book drop to be placed in our parking lot. Once that is approved, we hope our congregation members and other community residents will use it to drop off unwanted books so those books can find another home.

All Deacons were encouraged to help out for Maifest and the Memorial Day Parade in May. Friday, May 19, volunteers prepped and baked at the chapel from 10 am through the late afternoon for the Maifest fundraiser.

As you may be aware, an Eagle Scout is in the process of finalizing plans to revamp the Little Pantry. To that end, the Deacons contributed \$100.00 to her Eagle Scout Project.

Across the world, the Nairobi Project sent a thank you for our \$128 donation. They are currently helping 12 students with scholarships.

Finally, we approved funding for two table carts for the chapel dining hall.

If you are a parent or grandparent or even just an admirer of a young child, your refrigerator door may be the showcase of one or more paintings or drawings. To a visitor, that work of art may be just a mass of scribbles, but to the one who loves the child it is a masterpiece. We love the gift because of the person who made it and gave it to us. It is precious to us because it was a gift from the heart. The motive of the child was pure and loving.

Perhaps our gifts to God are similar. We're such amateurs, such babies. God could accomplish his work so much more efficiently by himself. Our works, even if monumental by human standards, are just scribbles if God would judge them in relation to his ability. Because he loves us, though – and loves us far more than a parent or grandparent loves a child – He looks at our works with eyes of love. He sees our hearts and knows we are motivated by love and faith, and he is pleased. He is so pleased that, if he had a refrigerator, he'd use it to display our works done for his glory.

God has given us gifts to use for this purpose – to glorify him by serving others. 
# **COLORING FUN**

## **GOD'S LOVE ENDURES FOREVER**

With a heavy heart, we announce the death of Charles M. Lee, a dear friend to many and a lifelong member of FPCH. He passed away peacefully with his family at his side at Morristown Memorial Hospital on May 10, 2023 at the age of 76.

Charles was an intelligent, well-spoken, funny, generous man. He graduated



from Hackettstown High School in 1965 and went on to graduate from Bucknell University in 1969 with a BA in both English and History. He was a member of the fraternity Phi Sigma Epsilon. In 1972 Charles completed a law degree at Dickinson School of Law in Carlisle, PA and was admitted to law practice in NJ & PA. Charles was a member of the Army ROTC while in law school. He started his law practice with the firm of Stover & Stover in Washington, NJ, later opening his own practice, Charles M Lee & Associates. Elected to a term on the Warren County Board of Freeholders from 1982-1984, serving as Director in 1984, Charles spearheaded & oversaw numerous critical Warren County projects, systems, and improvements. He was also active in the Rotary Club of Washington, NJ for many years.

Charles was a multi-talented and multi-faceted man. He earned his private pilot's license in the late 1970s and flew his own Cessna. He was a man of vast musical talent, proficient in singing, conducting, and playing the piano, organ, and saxophone. Charles had a love for Cavalier King Charles Spaniels, enjoyed home decorating, vacationing in his camper, reading, and staying attuned to law and politics. Devoted to his church, the First Presbyterian Church of Hackettstown, Charles added his rich baritone to the church choir and served as the church's attorney, a ruling Elder, Moderator of the Board of Deacons, substitute organist, and preached and led worship when the church was between ministers. Charles had the ability to connect to others with humor and sincere companionship within moments of meeting him and will be sincerely missed by many.

Charles is survived by his son Brian Lee, daughter Jennifer (Lee) Knittel and her husband Jonathan W Knittel, stepdaughter Karen Staada and her husband Thomas Staada, stepson Joseph Giacomini and his wife Rebecca Giacomini, a grandson Jonathan S Knittel, 3 step-grandchildren Nicholas Staada, Natalie Staada, & Thomas Spencer, a sister Lorraine (Lee) Hoskins, brother James D Lee, and many cousins, nieces, and nephews. He was predeceased by his wife, Victoria G Lee and his parents, Mary Kate Lee & Chester W Lee of Hackettstown, NJ.



Visitation was held at Cochran's Funeral Home, Hackettstown, NJ on Tuesday, May 16 from 4-8 pm and the funeral service occurred on Wednesday, May 17 at the First Presbyterian Church of Hackettstown at 11am with burial following at Union Cemetery, Hackettstown.

# OUR LITTLE PANTRY THRIVES FROM MANY COMMUNITY VOLUNTEERS

As you all are aware, our Little Pantry was started in the spring of 2020 when the COVID 19 pandemic shut downs were making it harder to provide food for people and their families who were food insecure. Many mass transportation systems shut down as did a number of "inside" pantries. If that did not happen, those pantries cut their hours, making it difficult for people to access food due to loss of work or a lack of funds, or both.

At that time, our interim pastor, Brian Merritt, took this news and decided to take an old bookcase which was in the basement of the manse, paint it green, and place it on the porch of the chapel. He added some canned goods to the shelves and the ministry of our "Pay it Forward Little Pantry" was born.

Fast forward to 2023 and you now see many of our congregation members and other community residents contributing food donations at our porch shelves. The newly established youth group has also assisted with the stocking of the shelves at various times when they met for youth activities, and recently we had a college student, Kristin Taenzer, volunteer to suggest nutritional choices for the food insecure.

As a nutrition major at the College of Saint Elizabeth, Kristin believes "people can still have snacks and canned goods, but they need to have good options available to them. We can provide that for them through your Little Pantry." To that end, she met with MaryAnn Simmons to shop, stock, and organize the items for the pantry so that our community of food insecure can have access to good nutritional foods. She spent two hours assisting and promised to drop off additional items during the summer.

Thank you, Kristin, for your desire to help our community project. And thank you to our entire congregation for your generous donations over these past three years.


# CONGRATULATIONS, BARBARA COUR-TRIGHT AND PAT AND GEOF GOHLICH
