

NEWS FROM THE DEACONS

This month the Deacons have been very busy with their annual clothing drive. Through the generous donations of our congregation members and their families and friends and other community members, we gathered 415 bags total - 350 bags of clothing, 58 bags of shoes, and 7 strollers, bikes, and toys. As a result, we earned \$766.20 for our mission outreach. Thanks to Bill and Mary Cors who sorted many of the bags prior to the arrival of the truck and to all who assisted with this event on Oct 21st.

In other news, our visits to members who are residing at the House of Good Shepherd continue. Grace Clegg will join Pastor Erin on these visitations. In addition, we continue to think of Joan Beddow and are staying in contact with other homebound members, including Alice Phoebus.

Our Little Pantry continues to be utilized by many in the community. Therefore, we are in need of many goods, especially personal care items, breakfast foods, and soups, and now that November is here, we will be seeking items for Thanksgiving Day dinner. In addition, Heaven Sent has collected and donated three boxes of healthy snacks for Halloween. They will also be collecting dinner items for Thanksgiving to be placed in the pantry during the month of November.

Lorinda Ravo is maintaining contact with our schools for ways to provide needed items for children who come from families that are on free and reduced lunch. To date, she has made and distributed 18 Kid Care Kits for 3 of the schools in Hackettstown and more have been requested. Ellen Bergman will start distribution at Great Meadows Middle School. In another mission outreach, Lorinda is inquiring about need for mittens and scarves at the schools. Please listen for more news about this during our announcements before services each Sunday.

Please see the article about the Yarn Girls ministry. We held a dedication n Sept 16th, and distributed 6 baby blankets, 6 shawls, 12 lap robes; since that dedication we have given out 21 shawls, 14 lap robes, 27 pocket crosses, and 1 baptismal blanket. Thank you, ladies for your gift of knitting and crocheting.

As always, we thank you for your continued support of our missions throughout the year. If you have any concerns, ideas, or recommendations for the Deacons, please reach out to us.



\$7,960.00 - Jensen Tree Experts, cemetery tree cleanup.

2. The September and Year To Date operating net income / (deficit) are (\$9,442.36) and (\$36,907.89) respectively.

The actual September operating expenses were **\$4,826** above the average monthly budgeted expenses.

The actual September operating income was **\$2,159** below the average monthly budgeted income.

Both the Year-To-Date operating incomes and expenses are above the budgeted amounts by **\$745** and **\$15,528** respectively.

3. In September, the value of the MassMutual Investment accounts decreased **\$11,619.01** to **\$296,246.89**

4. The total endowment fund on September 30, 2023, was **\$299,277.72**. This is below the **\$300,000 floor established in the church By-Laws which means funds can not be taken from the endowment to pay operating expenses**. The total endowment fund was down **\$11,844.04** since September 1, 2023, and down **\$9,497.04** since January 1, 2023.

5. The community dinner expenses for the September dinner were \$113.24. The donations collected at the dinner were \$141.00.

The 2023 Per Capita is \$42.50 for each of the 201 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2021.) The total amount due in 2023 is \$8,542.50 or \$711.88 monthly. In September, **\$0.00** was received for the Per Capita leaving the total received in 2023 at **\$2,831.50** or **33.1%**. No Per Capita payment was sent to the Presbytery of the Highlands of NJ in September leaving the total sent at **\$2,831.50** or **33.1%** of the total amount due.


December 3 - decorating the tree with the beloved Chrismons;



Sharing God's Bounty Can I Be Trusted with Much?

Oswald Chambers wrote, "Not every man can carry a full cup. Sudden elevation frequently leads to pride and a fall. The most exciting test of all to survive is prosperity." This quote provides a clear warning: Those who become prosperous are also very likely to become filled with pride. Pride can cause inflated egos and self-worthiness. Agur, a writer of proverbs, gave us this warning: ". . . give me neither poverty nor riches but give me only my daily bread. Otherwise, I may have too much and disown you and say, 'Who is the Lord?' or I may become poor and steal and so dishonor the name of my God" (Proverbs 30:8-9). When our bills are paid and we have money in the bank, we may feel secure and depend only on ourselves. In speaking about the curse of success, someone once said, "Ninety-nine people out of 100 can handle adversity whereas only one out of 100 can handle prosperity." The wealth that many seek can be more of a curse than a blessing.

God blesses us with work and the ability to earn our incomes. Unfortunately, we may foolishly begin to believe that we are solely responsible for the success we've achieved. As Moses wrote, "You may say to yourself, 'My power and the strength of my hands have produced this wealth for me.' But remember the Lord your God, for it is he who gives you the ability to produce wealth . . ." (Deuteronomy 8:18). We should understand that only by God's grace are we able to have a place to call home, a savings account, and a retirement plan. God's Word is clear that we are managers, not owners. "The earth is the Lord's and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it" (Psalm 24:1).

Even though it is difficult to pass the test with money, the Holy Spirit, working through the Word, enables us to understand that all we are and have are gifts from God. Joseph provides us a good example of stewardship. Separated from his home and family, he still trusted God and feared him, refusing to give in to the temptations that came with the position God enabled him to fill. As second in command in Egypt, one of the most powerful kingdoms of his day, he retained his humility, realizing that he was only the manager of Egypt's resources. But he managed those resources well, working at it *"with all [his] heart, as working for the Lord, not for men"* (Colossians 3:23). Just as God empowered Joseph in his stewardship, so he does for us today, whether our resources are vast, as were Joseph's, or small.
