



- D.) **\$375.78** Phone, internet & website.
- E.) **\$197.86** Gas expenses (3 buildings).
- 2. The July and Year To Date operating net income / (deficit) are (\$676.88) and (\$23,726.06) respectively.
- A.)The actual July operating expenses were **\$4,559** below the average monthly budgeted expenses.
- B.)The actual July operating income was **\$2,778** below the average monthly budgeted income.
- C.)Both the Year-To-Date operating incomes and expenses are above the budgeted amounts.
- 3. In July, the value of the MassMutual Invest-

ment accounts decreased **\$14,411.26** to **\$313,756.80** because \$20,000.00 was transferred to the Fulton Designated Donations account. The \$9,000.00 that was borrowed from the Designated Donations account in May and June to pay operating expenses was paid back. The remaining \$11,000.00 is in an Endowment fund in the Designated Donations account so it is easily accessible when needed to pay operating expenses.

- 4. The total endowment fund on July 31, 2023, was \$317,073.25. The total endowment fund was down \$14,402.16 since July 1, 2023, and up \$8,298.49 since January 1, 2023.
- 5. No community dinner expenses were submitted for the July dinner. Donations collected at the dinner were \$47.00.

The 2023 Per Capita is \$42.50 for each of the 201 members of our Church. (The number is the membership of FPCH on December 31, 2021.) The total amount due in 2023 is \$8,542.50 or \$711.88 monthly. In July, \$127.50 was received for the Per Capita bringing the total received in 2023 to \$2,831.50 or 33.1%. There was \$127.50 sent to the Presbytery of the Highlands of NJ in July bringing the total sent to \$2,831.50 or 33.1% of the total amount due.

# BIBLE STUDY SESSIONS TO CONTINUE



# Sharing God's Bounty Faith Empowers God's Stewards

The writer of Hebrews defines faith: "Now faith is being sure of what we hope for and certain of what we do not see" (Hebrews 11:1). Faith enables us to be God-pleasing stewards. "And without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him" (Hebrews 11:6). The eleventh chapter of Hebrews is knows as the "Faith Chapter." From Abel down through the ages, the writer names the heroes of faith, listing their accomplishments, preceding each one with "by faith."

Through faith, we understand that our stewardship is God working in and through us. It is not what we do, not what we give, not how we serve – but what God does, what God gives, how God serves, and our response to his love and gifts to us. God has shown us his plan for our lives. "For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do" (Ephesians 2:10). This is the definition of stewardship: doing the good works which God has prepared for us to do. God empowers and equips us to be faithful stewards. God has chosen us to carry out his work on earth. "You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit—fruit that will last" (John 15:16).

It is through faith that our pastor confidently enters the pulpit to speak forth the Word of the Lord. It is God's message, God's gift, and he is only the channel through which it flows. Through faith, the servant humbly steps forward to serve. His only motive is that God may receive the glory as he offers his hands, feet, lips, his whole body, soul, and mind in service. Through faith, the teacher diligently prepares the lessons, seeking the leading of the Holy Spirit, studying the Word of God, and looking into the hearts of the students. God creates the learning; his Spirit creates the faith. As stewards, we are the faithful vessels that God uses. Through faith, God can make us into his faithful stewards.


As you all are aware, our Little Pantry has been used quite fre-

# MANY MUSIC OPPORTUNITIES AVAILABLE FOR ALL AT FPCH

We love having our young congregation members learn about music and work together as a team as they participate in worship services. We have a number of ensembles for kids of all ages.

LITTLE LIGHTS SUNDAY SCHOOL CHOIR: This choir learns their music during the children's message portion of our service and then sings about once a month. This year, we'll again be traveling around the world as we learn about other countries, sing in their language, and understand that kids from many cultures world-wide praise God just as they do.
