Incumbent's Report to the 2019 Vestry

"See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland." Isaiah 43:19

As I write this report, I am reminded of a year filled with the grace and blessings of God while anticipating the new path God has made for us. By the grace of God, we have made it to the 232nd year of ministry; through the faithfulness of God we will continue in the years to come.

I thank God for the honour of being your priest. It has been my joy to spend time with each one of you over the past year. It has been my privilege getting to know you deeper and walking along side you. Thank you for inviting me into your homes and into your lives. I am blessed by all of you.

As the body of Christ, we have been present in and recognized by the community. Many people have told me how amazed and how thankful they are for our church's contribution to the life of Bath. Matthew 5 says that a city built on a hill cannot be hidden. Our church on the hill, having its firm foundation in Christ, is shining; not only because of the new stucco, but because of the efforts of each one of you, to be the loving presence of Christ in our community. We have grown in love for God, for one another, and for our neighbours.

I am thankful for Reverend John's amazing diaconal ministry. He has been an asset to our church by taking up various ecumenical ministries in Bath and ministering at Briargate. It made it so personal and I am humbled.

The past year we lost some loved ones. We grieve for the loss of Steven Armstrong, Scott Laurin, Clara Thompson, Joan Petican, Hillary Taylor (nee Morrow) and Lorna Dundas. Deacon & Outreach Report to the 2019 Vestry

Your Outreach Committee consisting of Kathy ffolliott, Brenda Hobbs, Ella Hiller, Trish Morrison and Patricia Reid are a valued resource to our parish and react to calls for their participation in outreach initiatives. Our mission is to increase the visibility of St John the Evangelist Bath by providing services to all members of our community.

Our parish is responsible for the outreach ministry to the residents at the Brairgate Retirement Residence in Amherstview. St. John's now has a representative presence there approximately 10 days per month. This is spread between church services, bible studies, and personal visits. Special services are conducted for Church events such as Ash Wednesday, Easter and Christmas, and civic events such as Thanksgiving and Remembrance services. These special services see approximately forty residents in attendance. In addition, this past summer I was able to assist other parishes by doing church services at Trillium Ridge and the Helen Henderson Care Centre. These opportunities enable us to demonstrate our care for the seniors and shut-ins outside of our community of Bath.

I have also been very busy within the Napanee Hospital Hospice Group, as we conduct eight-week Grief Support Groups sessions and then conduct the monthly follow-on Post Grief Drop in Support. Within the Diocese I am a member of the Laity Education Committee that endeavours through outreach to bring workshops for the development of personals and group understanding of element of the Anglican Church.

Outreach is a method of reaching out and letting our community members know that we are there with both a community and Christian spirit. We did an excellent job of this throughout the year. To list a few major events, Brenda Hobbs manages our very successful Soup and Sandwich program for us. Deb Noiles organizes the Ladies of the Pin in preparing uncountable fruit and meats pies throughout the year. Once again, Joyce Leblanc organized our highly anticipated Christmas Bazaar. These initiatives enable our community to see just who we are at St. John's. To each of you and your exhaustive committee workers thank you.

I would like to once again express a special thank you to Karen and Roxane Taylor and her group of dedicated workers for the wonderful fifth annual Christmas Dinner they put on again this season. This annual event is designed to ensure that no one is dining alone on Christmas Day. It is now attended by 220 plus individuals.

As your Deacon my task, outside of support to Reverend Noel, the Wardens and our Sunday services, is to reach out to the community and bring their issues back to our Parish. Soup 'n Sandwich Report to the 2019 Vestry

Soup 'n Sandwich continues to be the life blood of St. John's fundraising endeavors. In 2018 we raised \$10,500 for St. John's. That is an improvement of 19% on 2017!

The community of Bath enthusiastically supports Soup 'n Sandwich throughout the winter months. Not only is it a valuable fundraiser but it also provides community outreach to our lovely village.

We made some changes, deciding to expand the number of participants and we changed the format making it less burdensome for our volunteers - - instead of providing all three menu items (soup, sandwich and baking) contributors can provide just one part. We now have a larger group of helpers and Soup 'n Sandwich works better. We still have many people who do all three and we thank them for their generosity!

Also, many non-parishioners, members of our community, have stepped forward to help at Soup 'n Sandwich. Some work in the kitchen and some donate soups and sandwiches to the cause. We are truly grateful. We are averaging 55 customers (unless the weather gets in the way). We have had on occasion, before Christmas, 70 guests!

It is either because it is a super lunch or because we are the only food place open on Monday in Bath!

Strategic Plan Report to the 2019 Vestry

We have now entered the fourth year of our Strategic Plan.

- Year 1 (2016) was about SURVIVING ... stopping the financial bleeding. And through a tremendous collective effort we did it ... we broke even.
- Year 2 (2017) was about STABILIZING ... putting in place processes and controls while continuing our march to financial health ... generating a surplus of \$23,000 ... enabling us to retire \$11,000 of our debt and to set aside funds for much needed repairs to the church.
- Year 3 (2018) was about GROWING ... to begin to position St John's to be sustainable for the foreseeable future. We began this leg of the journey by:
 (1) increasing parishioner participation in day-to-day operations of St John's
 (2) increasing parishioner stewardship (gifting) by \$24,000 over 2017 levels
 (3) increasing by three the number of households worshipping at St John's
 (4) increasing the parishioner participation in our various ministries


We rose once again to the challenge ... you made it happen!!! Here is how ...

- The governance structure performed well ... the members of the parish council and the executive office leveraged their time-in-position and experience to wisely guide the operations of St John's.
- Our financial health remained stable. The church did run a small deficit (less than \$2000) despite dealing with the full charges of a single point ministry. We were able to handle these charges by running down our cash reserves, though still managing at year-end to have some cash on-hand and without incurring any additional debt (we kept current on all of our obligations).
- Our request to the Diocese in <u>October 2016</u> to change St John's to a different model of ministry has finally been approved. The new shared ministry with St Alban's (Odessa) begins in March 2019 and will enable St John's to rebuild our reserves, continue our program of facilities repairs & refurbishments (reported on separately) <u>and</u> to retire some of our debt.
- We continued to invest in our working relationships with the Township, the RBC, the Diocese, hall renters, the Lions, our supply chain of service providers and the Bath community leaders ... continuing to build trust and integrity through regular and intentional engagement, communication and transparency.

Strategic Plan Report to the 2019 Vestry (continued)

Complementing the outreach activities mentioned by our clergy, St John's continued to fulfill its vision & mission to be a transformative influence in our community. We did this by leveraging our facilities to offer rent-free use of the hall to the Hospitality Group, the Township Child Art Attack classes, the VON's exercise classes for seniors, the Township Kids-in-the-Hall program, the Bath Canada Day Committee volunteer thank-you dinner, the Loyalist Township (1) all-candidates meeting and (2) Heritage Department open-house information meeting.

In summary, 2018 was a very full year and thanks to <u>you</u>, we enter 2019 in a strong position on both the Health and Mission dimensions of our Strategic Plan. We have come a long way ... together. However, our journey continues (please refer to the chart below).



Year 4 (2019) of our Strategic Plan will also be about GROWING ... to build on the same four growth dimensions of 2018 ... to position St John's for the long term.

Working toward these goals will help contribute to our purpose of being a transformative influence in our community through the sharing of the love of Jesus Christ. With continued trust in this vision, our mission and in our values, we are making a difference.

"Walls & Walkway" Campaign

Looking back on the past three years of our journey of renewal, the 2018 "Walls & Walkway" campaign was a watershed experience if not a defining triumph for modern day St John's. We pulled together as a congregation in the face of very daunting financial challenges to address long overdue repairs and upgrades to our facilities.

I think back to our parishioner forefathers at Easter time of 1925 when a grass fire engulfed the church and totally destroyed it. Pulling together, that congregation rebuilt the church and by December of that same year held their Christmas Eve worship service at St John's.

Skip forward nearly a century ... we raised \$69,000 in a very short span of time (January through May), had shovels in the ground and scaffolding raised by late July and the work on the walls and walkways complete by early September. And we were able to celebrate a momentous occasion in November - - the ordination of Reverend Noel, with Bishop Michael in attendance.

We should reflect on how fortunate and blessed we are at St John's and to give thanks to those who have helped us on our journey of renewal. In particular ... the Anglican Foundation of Canada and the Loyalist Township Heritage Department ... who recognized the ongoing commitment that we have made to be a transformative influence in our community.

Both of these organizations provided grants to St John's that when coupled with generous donations from community members, former parishioners, our contractors and of course you, our parishioners, enabled us to once again shine brightly as the "beacon on the hill" overlooking the Village of Bath.

We are truly blessed.

Facilities Report to the 2019 Vestry

In 2018 we continued our aggressive process of repairs and upgrades to our facilities ... some for reasons of necessity, others to improve efficiencies or to lower operating costs, some to increase the value received by parishioners and renters.

Though the Church "Walls & Walkway" repair/refurbishment was the "main event" and received most of the attention there was also a great deal of investment in a very quiet "behind-the-scenes" manner of the infrastructure of both the church and the hall.

Most importantly, our investment in facilities was complemented with financial help from newly found partners and their Grant programs ... the Anglican Foundation of Canada, the Loyalist Township Heritage Department and the Lennox & Addington County Development Corporation. They each found our history, our future plans and our dedication and commitment to the community so compelling that between them they awarded us a total of \$25,000.

<u>The church</u>, in addition to the walls & walkway repairs, had a new projector installed and the associated electrical wiring replaced and brought-up to code ... and made ready for the installation of an LED screen for the choir.

<u>The hall</u> also received investments for repairs and upgrades. The kitchen renovations were completed with the installation of a dishwasher, the replacement of two countertops and the counter door. A new furnace and a new air conditioner were installed (joining the two units installed in 2017) ... all correctly sized to the space and load factors of the hall. We now have the 'latest technology' HVAC system that consumes less energy thereby lowering our operating costs.

The old fluorescent light fixtures in the main hall, kitchen, hallways and washrooms were replaced with new LED light arrays that provide better and more constant lighting while also using less energy.

The various rooms of the lower floor have been purged of years-worth of accumulated furniture and bric-a-brac such that we now have a well-organized storage area, a functional foodbank room and we have reclaimed the former Sunday School room and converted it into a bright small meeting room.

Facilities Report to the 2019 Vestry (continued)

This year, 2019, will see continued investment in our facilities. We have now moved on from the "Need-to-Do" category of projects to the "Nice-to-Do" category.

<u>The church</u> will again be the center of attention as we turn our focus on the beautiful stained-glass windows that adorn our walls.

- After an extensive examination of the condition of the windows, the frames and the lead, it has been determined that the best long-term solution for St John's is to not only replace the brittle protective plexi-glass (also without breather vents and yellowed to the point of being opaque) but to also refurbish/repair the windows and frames themselves.

St John's has contracted with Traditional Glassworks (Westport, Ontario) for the repair/refurbishment/protection of the existing thirteen (13) stained glass windows. For affordability and cash flow reasons we are spreading the scope of works, quoted at \$128,000, <u>across five years</u> starting in April this year. This commitment is captured in our budget for 2019.

A word about Traditional Glassworks ... they specialize in the restoration of heritage stained glass as well as in the design and creation of new stained-glass windows. They have just been awarded a ten-year project for all the glass-works for the new Centre Block, Parliament Hill, Ottawa. Our windows will be in be very capable hands.

To improve the "working conditions" of the choir, the organists and the clergy we will be installing (1) a second pew for the choir, (2) improved ceiling lighting for the Chancel and (3) an LED monitor on the south wall for the choir's better viewing of the prayers & hymns. Funding for these mini-projects will come from a gift (St Thomas, Belleville), gifts-in-kind from friendly contractors and from our capital fund.

<u>The hall</u> will incur less investment this year after two years of significant refurbishments. We will be upgrading the electrical wiring and breakers for the cloak room and the lower floor to handle the expanded refrigeration capacity that has been donated to St John's.



Stewardship Report to the 2019 Vestry

St John's is self-supporting and self-sustaining. We have been truly blessed over our 231-year history by generations of predecessors who supported St John's through the good as well as the difficult times.

We are pleased to report that in 2018 our parishioner offertory (including gift-inkind) grew by 6% (\$4.5k) over 2017 levels. When the donations for the "Walls & Walkway" are added to the mix, the 2018 offertory grew by 32% (\$24k) over 2017 levels ... affirmation of the dedication and care that you and your fellow parishioners hold for St John's. In addition, though we gained seven (7) households over the year, we sadly said farewell to four (4) fellow travelers ... bringing our year-end parishioner family to 50 households.

The charts below are visual and numeric displays of the Gifting Profile to St John's Church and its operations over the past three years. Please review them, with the comments below, as you reflect on your gifting for 2019.



So as to not overlook the tremendous response that we had to the "Walls & Walkway" (W&W) pledge campaign (reported on separately), the chart above displays two columns for 2018 in each of the gifting brackets ... the gray column excludes the W&W donations, the gold column includes the W&W donations.

Stewardship Report to the 2018 Vestry (continued)

The chart confirms which gifting brackets drove the overall increase as well as the positive shift in parishioner donations between the \$ brackets of gifting (2017 vs 2018, orange to gray (or gold)). This trend (the shift to the right) is a good thing and reflects the generosity of those households that responded to the stewardship appeal made last year at this time.

The second chart above shows that <u>the average annual</u>, <u>monthly and weekly giftings</u> <u>all increased</u>, year-on-year, for all but the lowest gifting bracket. This trend is a very good thing! Thank you for your generosity.

Another important take-away from this chart is that seven (7) households contributed 50% of the total giftings. Though nice, it does not make for a sustainable future. We must all be grateful for and thank these few households for their generosity and support of St John's. And ... consider following their lead in graceful giving.

We recognize that everyone has different life circumstances and different financial situations. Regular intentional giving is key to the financial well-being of St John's and helps us as individuals to express our call to Christian Stewardship.

Think about it, pray about it, evaluate your resources. We invite you to intentionally and reflectively consider how you will respond in generosity in 2019.

Review of 2018 Operations (see attached financial summary documents)

Church (2018 versus 2017)

- Once again, congratulations and heartfelt thanks are in order to all members of the parish for the generosity of their time, talents and treasure. These actions enabled St John's to weather the full burden and costs of a single point ministry (162% of 2017 clergy charges) plus the impact of the 20% increase in our CMM apportionment.

- Your robust gifting and donations plus your efforts devoted to fundraising and with the help of a Diocese grant allowed St John's to achieve a 5% increase in revenues versus those of 2017.

- The net result was another great year for St John's ... though it was a deficit of \$1,656, it will still be regarded as a "win" the third positive or 'near positive' year in a row after fourteen consecutive years of significant deficits. Well done!!

Hall (2018 versus 2017)

- While experiencing an increase in hall utilization and without compromising the value received by the many and varied users of St John's Hall, we were able to squeeze another 4% from our costs.

- Revenues rose by 16% despite holding our rental rates constant from 2017. The increased hall utilization was the driver for the increased revenues.

- The result was a very healthy surplus of \$3,679 ... our second consecutive year of surplus.

Cemetery (2018 versus 2017)

- Revenues were down 27% (\$5,600) year-on-year as 2018 did not see nearly the number of interments as in 2017.

- Costs were significantly lower (at 51% of 2017 levels) driven in large part by the one-time-only settlement/adjustment in 2017 to the Perpetual Care Fund.

- The result was a large positive swing to a surplus of \$4,403.

Financial Footing (see attached statement of current assets & liabilities)

- Year-end cash balances are significantly lower than year-end 2017 by nearly \$28,000 - due to the redemption of the GIC's ... the values of which were used to pay for the repair work on the Church walls and walkway.

- Funds are sufficient in the accounts of the hall and cemetery to meet the daily operational needs (3 months-worth) and to address any unforeseen events. Cash reserves for the Church have dropped to 2 months-worth of operational needs ... being used to fund the burden of the clergy costs and to offset the deficit. Cash preservation protocols are in place for the first half of 2019.

- The funds held in our investment accounts at the TD Trust Company remained constant.

- Our liabilities decreased by \$2,500 as a working capital loan to the Hall was paid off.

- Our accumulated debt to the Diocese remains unchanged at just under \$56,000.

- The combined result of all these changes was a decrease in our Current Ratio (assets to liabilities) from 3.1 to 2.8 ... still double our credit-worthiness at the end of 2015.

Proposed 2019 Budget (see highlighted columns of financial summary documents)

Church (versus 2018 actual results)

- The costs of operation for the church will drop significantly in 2019 to 65% of the 2018 level - - - driven almost entirely by lower clergy costs as we move into the shared ministry model with St. Alban's (Odessa). We will benefit from ten (10) months of lower stipends and the related social charges & benefits.

- We will also incur a lower (\$2,500) CMM apportionment in 2019 due to the effect on the CMM calculation of the \$11,000 of debt that we retired in 2017.

- The Diocese has extended the "debt holiday" to St John's through 2019. As a result, we will not be incurring any interest charges.

- Our revenues are forecast to fall to 85% of 2018 revenues due to ... (1) a continuation of the trend of the last half of 2018 of declining gifting (2) a decrease in the Ministry grant from the Diocese as it will now be shared with St. Alban's (3) an intentional scaling back of our fundraising activities.

- Since the drop of revenues is so much less than the decrease in our costs, the Church is forecast to generate a surplus of nearly \$22,000 ... a wonderful "problem" to have!! We will also be able to rebuild our cash reserves to 3 months-worth of operations costs.

- Your Executive and your Parish council have agreed to put the surplus to good use ... to retire \$5,000 of debt <u>and</u> to fund \$15,000 of the 2019 tranche of the repair/refurbishment of the stained-glass windows. Pledges have already been received for another \$10,000.

- The net result is a surplus budget of just under \$1,500 for 2019 ... a continuation of our string of healthy financial results.

Hall (versus 2018 actual results)

- Another surplus year is forecast for the hall in 2019 ... as rentals will be similar to the levels achieved in 2018. Two new groups have expressed an interest in regularly renting the hall ... though they have not been factored into the budget.

- Costs are predicted to rise ever so slightly as escalation of utility charges are anticipated.

Cemetery (versus 2018 actual results)

- A healthy surplus is forecast for the cemetery in 2019 though slightly less than in 2018.

- A forecast of four (4) interments is the basis for the positive results in 2019. Our variable costs are forecast to be lower as a result of fewer interments.

- Signage denoting the presence in our cemetery of first and second generation UEL's has been contracted for and will be unveiled during the Canada Day celebrations.
