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Only a few spots left for the U.C. Davis property steelhead outing on the Yuba at Hwy. 20

As 2013 is quickly coming to a close, we are already preparing for our annual trek January 11 to the UC Davis property on the Yuba River. Bob Fujimura has agreed to be fishmeister for this very fun, and often times productive steelhead outing.

The UCD Foothill Research property is located in Browns Valley, CA at 7861 Scott Forbes Rd. DFF members should arrive at 7:00am sharp to meet Bob, as the gate to the property will be locked once the group enters. Bob will be driving either a silver Honda minivan or a silver Toyota 4Runner.

Lunch will be provided at 12:45pm under the gazebo---please let Bob know if you have any dietary restrictions. This is a great opportunity to meet members and discuss the fish stories of the day. Unfortunately,

only 20 member can attend this outing, so let Bob know ASAP if you want to go. Bob can be contacted at 209-329-1692 or at deltaflyfishers@gmail.com.

The club will be fishing the Lower Yuba tailwater above the Hwy 20 bridge. Bob recommends 6-7wt rods of 9-10ft. WF floating lines fished indicator style seems to work best, but you can also swing flies. Leaders should be 4-5ft of 12-15 lbs fluorocarbon, with tippets of 6-8 lbs fluoro.

Flies that can be productive are rubberlegs, stones, BWO and caddis nymphs, salmon fry, glo bugs, woolly buggers and streamers. On overcast days a BWO hatch is possible. Be sure to bring waders, a staff and good wading boots. Last year the water was quite high and limited shore fishing.

Bob is a well known and respected member of DFF. Over the years, he has fished this property 6 times. Though this can be technical fishing, Bob feels the property's limited access will give members a fair chance of connecting on a fish or two. Bob prefers indicator fishing or tight line nymphing, but if fishing is tough, he will swing or dead drift streamers.

Last year's trip was a blast. Fisher were caught, great food was eaten, and a lot of fish tales were swapped. DFF is looking forward to another great outing to the UCD property. Thanks to Bob Fujimura for stepping up to be fishmeister. We have other outings planned for the year that will need fishmeister. Cold weather and lack of a fishmeister cancels December 7, Paradise Point Outing

While the late fall weather has been mild to date, the sudden cold front hitting the valley on Wednesday night will plunge delta water temperatures below the fifty degree mark. The cold water generally makes for slow fishing, one good reason to cancel the planned outing at Paradise Point on December 7th.

The second reason is the lack of a fishmeister. Jerry Neuburger had planned to lead the outing but ran into plumbing problems with his main sewer line plugged. That has put him somewhat out of commis-

sion for the time being, since he's assisting in the excavation of 90 feet of old clay pipe and replacing it with ABS, a week long project because much of the old piping was buried under a concrete driveway.

The next two outings should make up for the cancellation with the traditional New Years Day outing on the Mokelumne and the third trip to the Yuba River gold fields both popular and well attended.

Delta Fly Fishers fishing the Mokelumne on New Years day is a tradition almost as old as the club itself

2014 is just around the corner! Ring in the New Year at our annual outing to the Moke on January 1st. This year's fishmeister, Joe Balderston, has been fly fishing for over 35 years and has fished the Moke numerous times. You will be targeting resident rainbows and steelhead this time of the year. Joe guarantees great "fishing" but not always great "catching." He makes the following suggestions: rods 4-7 wt, floating/intermediate lines, 9ft leaders tapered to 3x-5x, glo bugs and alevin patterns, attractor nymphs and mayfly nymphs in sizes 8-18, and olive and black buggers. Swinging flies and indicator fishing can be the most successful methods, but dry fly fishing is possible when conditions are right. The Moke may be fished from the

shore in Van Assen Park or you may like to float the river. In low water years you may encounter many river obstructions. In high water years it may just be too dangerous to float. Good judgment is always advised.

The group will meet in the parking lot of Van Assen Park at 8:00am, rain or shine. Look for the DFF banner and Joe's black Avalanche. Coffee and doughnuts will be served in the morning. Plan on bringing your own lunch for the afternoon gathering. Start the new year off right, with a tight line and bent rod--not a headache!!!!

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Hunting and fishing the Big Sky Country in the fall

Not much luck up here. Was limited to two brief outings, one on the the Yellowstone River and one on the Big Horn. I am not here with my own vehicle. Got to Ft Smith next to the Big Horn in the late afternoon, noticing that Ft Smith consisted of a gas station, a bar, a few residential streets, a church, and two fly shops. You think the fishing might be good here? Ft Smith is on the Crow Indian Reservation, so above the town was a major dam (I believe it's called the Yellowtail Dam, which drains into a Forebay, which has a spillway at the edge of town that is controlled by the tribe and requires a \$5 dollar parking or boat launch fee. Excellent for entering with a pontoon. I waded out from the near-by shore into a current that was at 2000 cfm if the chalk board at the fly shop was accurate. The BH River was easily seventy yards wide and about waist deep all the way across. Based on the fly shop info, I used a dual bugger set up and in the short time I was able to fish, I managed to get a couple good tugs! The tug is the drug! I would have like to had more time, but the sun was going down and the wind had really kicked up. I saw a guy come into the parking lot with a truck and pulling a trailer pontoon and unchaining his Yamaha scooter from the sign post. He then loaded it onto the rack hanging from his front bumper. So he was a one man float shuttle operation. He dropped his boat into the water, then drove his rig to the

exit spot on the River, got on his scooter and road it back to where his pontoon awaits. Then chained his scooter to the sign post. Clever. He had a pretty good day. Nobody else on the water, everyone is hunting or working. And actually this time of the year is excellent for fishing. So I am told.

The fishing came to a halt when we woke up the next morning to a temperature of 2 degrees and breezy with snow flurries. Steady sub zero weather for next couple days until today, leaving for home in the AM. On this trip, I have crossed the Snake, the Salmon and others in Idaho, the Beaverhead, the Big Hole, the Blackfoot, the Clark fork, the exit to Rock Creek, the Jocko, the Flathead, the Gallatin, the Madison, the Yellowstone and both the Little and the Big Horn rivers. These waters are so famous that it makes Hemingways' character Nick come to life. Sheridan, Wy, was one day road trip with a stop off at the Custer National Monument on a cold solemnly morning. In my mind, I am already planning a return trip late in the fall next year, pulling my fifth wheel and fishing when the notion should call me to do so!

West to east this state is a jewel for natural beauty. The other day we took a gravel road to seek hunting permission and the directions had us take this road to the second pump house, turn right and follow for two miles, then look for a small white sign (no words, just a white

sign), turn right again and follow that road for 14 miles. Then a mile off the right side of that road was a ranch and ask for Swede. We were so far from humanity that during the 14 mile stretch of road I didn't see a fence line. Ask for Swede, if that is not a little slice of Americana and the American West, I am not sure you can find it! The bigness of it all, is rich with a unique beauty. I love this place.

A bearable weather has returned (30 to 40 highs with freezes at night). Our hunting was restricted to a specific district and suffering from a major die off of White-tail deer. Apparently, Montana had a rare wet summer with 8 inches in two consecutive months leaving many standing ponds and a midge like insect was swallowed by the white tails causing a disease called blue tongue. The only tag available was a B and applied to Whitetail does only. Too late to buy an A tag which includes elk and mules. Mean while we are staying on a very large cattle ranch in the bench country (with many low profile mesas with wooded ravines) and every morning we are entertained by bands of mule deer both does and bucks. My brother-in-law is the hunter but I spotted two deer on a ridge this evening and challenge myself to stalk them to see how close I could get. Stalking two deer is much tougher than just one, since one is always alert to danger. Got within 40 yards.

the morning to set up the canteen and help register the contestants.


The number of anglers was lower than recent years probably due to less publicity on this event. In contrast, club participation was high and everyone enjoyed the socializing and sharing fishing stories.
