Eastern Sierra Focus

Fishing Tip:

Beginning fly fishers might benefit from my list of flies for my area. It might help you in assembling your fly box or at least assist in your organization process. If you stay with 3 nymphs, 3 streamers, 3 terrestrials and 3 dries you can expand from there, into size and color range. This is not the "law", but this might save you some change in the beginning.

Three nymphs are long tail yellow sally, Zug Bug, WD40

Three wets/streamers soft hackle March brown with or without a bead, wooly bugger (Blk/grizzly or orange), Hornberg, western coachman. Ok, I know that is four but the one wet is a necessity.

Three terrestrials are black ant/red tag, #12 1x hopper taupe/pale yellow, and Griffith's Gnat (midge).

Three dry are olive elk hair caddis, brown bivisible and BWO Parachute or Adams parachute (the last 2 are indispensable and only the body color that is different).

One thing you need to consider when choosing your working flies is "try" and start off small with the type of fishing you enjoy and its location, these two things are the most important for success. I'm a dry fly fanatic, so my main dries are specific to the area I'm fishing and if it's familiar territory then I know what to take, but if unfamiliar I take 3 odd flies, and quite often very happy with the results.

Legislation:

Funding has started to come down from legislation signed by the Governor under AB7 and Fish Springs Hatchery hired 2 employees to fill their vacancies. Fish allotments for the hatcheries on the east side will be met and the AB7 plan is still being worked on and moving forward.

Lawsuit:

Environmental groups on Thursday filed a lawsuit against the CA Dept. of Fish and Game, saying DFG never studied whether stocking streams, with hatchery-raised trout, is harmful to native species already low in numbers. "There are a number of native fish that are potentially at risk because of this stocking," said Noah Greenwald, a conservation biologist with the Center for Biological Diversity, which filed the lawsuit with the Pacific Rivers Council.

Fishy News:

Susanville Browns hit a few flies, but nothing serious to speak of and these brutes are tough, only hope there are some fish left in the waters next spring.

Weather:

Mother Nature felt some sympathy from the inhumane weather she dealt us and gave us a few weeks of Indian Summer, a bit cooler than normal but still wonderful for trout and anglers. The water temps in most lakes are between 46° to 48°, and the Aspens peaked around the 3rd to 7th of October as expected at higher elevations, but they are still quite nice between 6 and 7,000 feet elevation. Cooler than normal evening/morning temps have been the norm for the past week, but the days are really great for early afternoon dry fly fishing.

Fishing Report:

ROCK CREEK has been doing great on beadhead wooly buggers in black and dark olive #12 or Doc's Twin Lakes

Special (DTLS), with standard dries hitting early and late on the stream. For some nice dry action in the Mosquito Flats area try using a #18 parachute caddis or Adams. No, I haven't caught the big brown (22") in Marsh Lake, yet but there is always next season. I hate the smell of skunk.

CROWLEY – Cold nights with wind cleaned up the algae and the fishing is much better. Try a Perch fry, Matuka, or a Hornberg and strip slowly for the best bite. Some midges are working, crystal, zebra, and tiger even a Z-wing. Try the slot at the north end of the lake, on either side near the weedy areas. This time of year its hit and miss so use your best tactics and something unexpected might hit your offering.

UPPER OWENS is doing well below the bridge towards the lake and use a hopper/dropper or nymphs. Use an Adams parachute, or Caddis in the early evening. San Juan worms, Copper midges, and a wet Western Coachman (hard to find) has been doing good, and buy your fly-tier-friend some feathers to keep you in these flies.

HOTCREEK is fishing good right now on baetis emergers, nymphs, Parachute Adams, and BWO parachute if you can get a good drift in the right spot. Anglers are everywhere trying to find that right spot.

CONVICT tubers continue tugging olive wooly buggers, leeches, and spruce flies around the inlet, so try some purple, white and olive wooly buggers with a prince nymph dropper that should drive the run in.

MAMMOTH BASIN – Twin and Mamie are doing great on olive Docs Twin Lake Special (DTLS), Olive Matuka, red throat olive Matuka, with a nymph dropper #16 or #18.

SAN JOAQUIN RIVER has been excellent and consistent using small standard dries like an Adams or parachute caddis patterns with and hares ear, pheasant tail or prince nymph at the drop.

JUNE LOOP ~ The Lakes have been doing well on olive and black wooly buggers, green or olive matukas, and the streams are showing good success with pheasant tail nymphs, prince nymphs, male adams, yellow humpy and there are some stoneflies in the water, but haven't seen any action on them.

LUNDY has been fishing great, and the water level is still very high. Great action on black and olive wooly buggers, rust, dark brown with a bit of orange in the tail with a lot of flash, also try Pistol Pete's in grizzly. Hornbergs are still working well, and still falling apart. I guess I'm gonna have to rob my piggy bank for some real jungle-cock feathers.

VIRGINIA LAKES has been slower due to the cooling temps of the water, but when the action starts, use olive DTL Special #12, Grey Hackle Peacock #14, or #16 brown bivisible.

EAST WALKER is at 138cfs, and is fishing excellent mainly on nymphs, and mayfly nymphs, LaFontaine pupa, Fox Poopah, Micro mayflies, and streamers early morning and late afternoon have been working well. For the dry use a yellow Stimulator, yellow/gray hopper, and a Prince, PT, chamois, Z-wing or swimming caddis for the drop. Flows are low but it hasn't bothered the crowds on the weekends but mid-week has been excellent for elbow room.

WEST WALKER flow is 86cfs but looked mighty meager yesterday when I drove down to fish it. Small mosquitoes, Grizzly Adams, or parachute Adams was ok, but nothing great, as the water is really low. But it was fun.

The problem that I see with a lawsuit against DFG for stocking hatchery raised trout is that the future will be bleak without hatchery fish. Where will the "other" anglers go to fish, this isn't brain surgery. Most likely the lawsuit will not hold up but that is dependent on where the lawsuit was filed and the Judge hearing the case. CalTrout was behind the AB7 legislation, as their crystal ball says the same thing I'm thinking, anglers walking out of the backcountry with stringers of natives in all sizes.

Conservation - By Ron Forbes

After much discussion and legal advice, the members of the board have voted to become involved as interveners in the suit against NOAA's National Marine Fisheries Service by the Modesto Water District. As you will recall the MWD wants to challenge the way NMFS counts the fish in determining whether the salmon and steelhead should be considered endangered or threatened species. NMFS draws a difference between wild fish and hatchery fish. MWD wants them lumped into a single group thereby increasing the numbers so they aren't required to follow the requirements for endangered species. This is the same or very similar to suit they filed and lost in 2004. The same judge will hear this case as heard the 2004 suit. Earthjustice asked us to be interveners again, because of the considerable help Steve Cooper and Bob Souza provided Earthjustice in the last case. Frankly, we should be pleased to be taking our mission statement in conservation as Delta Fly Fishers seriously. It seems some of the other clubs declined to help.

Ecological groups including FFF are becoming increasingly concerned about another nuisance species making its presence felt. The problem is caused by a small diatom algae know as *Didymosphenia geminata* (commonly called "Didymo" or "rock snot"). It forms stalks and large colonies and covers rocks. Its ecological impact is that it increases the decline in aquatic larval insects (mayflies, stone flies, and caddis flies). Where it has been found there seems to be a decrease in large adult fish. Didymo tends to form very large growths in low, but stable water flows with water depths from 3" to 6' deep. It is usually found below the outlets of lakes or reservoirs and in sunny open streams. The diatom has always been in the northern parts of the US but for some reason when introduced to new areas it "blooms." It is dense and moss-like when covering rocks in streams and it feels rough and cotton-like to the touch. Some describes the touch as wool-like. Its color is from white to light brown tuffs. At this point the DFG isn't doing anything about the problem. If you want more information about Didymo, contact Sarah Spaulding at the USGS at 303-312-6216 or at spaulding.sarah@epa.gov. Evidentially we have given Didymo to New Zealand where it has closed 10 rivers and the government has declared an emergency. To prevent Didymo spread, wash your boots and waders in a 2% bleach solution, or in a 5% saltwater solution, or in common dishwater detergent soap. Scrub all items for at least one minute.

Although the problems in south's flooding are still making news, the city of Oakley has come up with a plan to increase Delta urbanization. They want to fill in 57 acres of Delta wetlands to establish a community of 4,000 homes and 3 public schools on an island that is 5 ft under sea level. The Army Corps of Engineers has issued a 404 permit application for the project and has asked for public input. The public input hasn't been widely advertised so few people realize what's happening. There are two major problems with this project. First, 12,000 people and the students at the three schools are put at risk in the event of delta flooding. Second, even though the Delta's pelagic organisms are at high risk, Oakley plans to dump stormwater from the site directly into the delta. The effects on the Delta and the drinking water of 23 million people haven't been addressed at all. At this point the Corps hasn't addressed the requirements for an Environmental Impact Statement of the National Environmental Protection Act. And it hasn't seemed to be an issue of which they have much concern. This issue seems to be low key at this point but needs answers to the questions it raises. Day & time: Nov. 4th Saturday meeting at 6:00 a.m. Eagles Nest restaurant in Marysville

Recommended tackle: 7-9wt rods, good reel, with 8, 10 and 15# tippet material to make leaders. You will need some kind of strike indicators in large size. If you use yarn type indicators have a comb and floatant for them.

Fishing glasses, Hat, Waders, Wading shoes with felt soles and a wading shaft of some kind this is recommend for wading safety in any river water. (If you have an inflatable PFD's it is recommended that you use it.)

Flies: most large and medium size nymphs and egg pattern flies in sizes 6-12.

Weight: misc. sizes of split shot.

This is a teaching clinic. If you are new, come and learn on how to fish for Steelhead. We will instruct you on how to rig, cast and fish this type of tackle. We will show you how to wade this type of water safely.

T.B.H.STEELHEAD STONE #2, with RUBBER LEGS

Fly type Attractor

Originator Bob Souza

Tied by Bob Souza

Hook: 2457 heavy wire size 6 – 10

Thread: Black or Fire orange size 6/0

Tail: Black or Brown round rubber leg

Ribbing: Copper wire

Body under wrap: lead wire .025

Body: Orange Lite-Brite Dubbing

Wing Case: Flashabou Gold and Pearl mixed

Thorax: Brown chenille small or orange.

Legs: Black or Brown round rubber leg material

Bead Head: Tungsten Bead in Gold

Marking pen: Brown

Misc: Zap a Gap Glue

1. Debarb hook and dress with gold bead to size of hook.
2. Add 6 – 8 tight wraps of .025 wire behind bead head, cement in place.
3. Start thread behind wire and wrap to middle of bend in hook.
4. Tie in copper wire under hook shank. This will not cause bump at tail area.
5. Tie in rubber leg material as forked split type tail.
6. Make dubbing loop, add dubbing and twist to make taper body with Lite-Brite standouts. Wrap ribbing in 4 – 5 wraps to thorax area and tie off.
7. Mark top of body with Brown marking pen.
8. Add Flashabou wingcase, tie in brown chenille for thorax, tie in one set of rubber legs at rear of thorax and one set of legs behind bead head, make large thorax and tie off.
9. Then bring wing case over top and tie off at bead head.
10. Tie off thread and coat thread with super glue to set whip finish.
11. Coat wing case top with 5-minute epoxy and let set.

Fish this fly as your lead fly under the strike indicator. Add a smaller fly about 12- 16" on a trail leader setup. I tie on at the bend of the top hook. When fishing this set up use a dead drift in holding top of water 2- 3' deep.
