


Eastern Sierra Focus

Although the majority of fly fishers prefer dry fly action, a good portion of the time your flies will require scuba gear. Caddis has a cycle that will “treat” you to some exciting dry action. This stage is called oviposting, where female caddis deposit or lays their eggs in swarms that are low over the water surface. Different species of Caddis deposit their eggs in several ways so it’s important to be observant to see if trout are sipping or slow rising. Also, there are specific methods of casting to both. This is worth a bit of investigation and probably the best read I’ve found on this is by Gary LaFontaine, Caddisflies.

Early July produced cooler than normal temps then right into warmer than normal the rest of the month with daily clouds building into thunder storms, but not much moisture. This is the 6th year of drought, and we are 20% of normal.

Fishing Report

ROCK CREEK Lake is producing some nice fish with a full sink using olive and black wooly buggers #6, 8 over a bead head midge #18-20. Try Stimulator’s over olive zebra midge 18-20. Try the stream for some wild action.

LOWER OWENS is running about 150cfs, and afternoon caddis hatch has been great. Wait until cooler air for the best action so early a.m. on small PMD’s, and an adult Caddis for the afternoon take.

CROWLEY LAKE algae has diminished a lot and cutts and browns are in the 12-16 foot range so troll the weedy areas on a perch fry, and look for some 20 plus inchers. Chironomid’s are also producing over tiger or zebra midges.

CONVICT LAKE has seen some good action on streamers #8-14 in olive and black on medium sink tip.

MAMMOTH LAKES has had some good action trolling full sink with a streamer and bead head midge. Alpers are hanging near debris in lake.

SAN JOAQUIN results will depend on how much walking you want to do. Due to DFG budget cuts they fork. Alpers is stocking Sotcher and Starkweather and DFG is stocking Sotcher. Loads of small wild fish, and the dry action is good on Caddis and mayfly imitations.

JUNE LAKE loop is doing very good on black and olive wooly buggers #8-10, rainbow hornbergs, carey buggers over midges #16-18.

GULL LAKE has been great with a full sink line also with a tandem rig and loads of Alpers are on the take.

LUNDY Lake has been breezy to windy, so try the south side near the inlet using olive matukas, olive/black woolly’s and pistol Pete’s over midges.

VIRGINIA LAKES has been fair to good with olive matukas, with and without red throats. Single fly rig will be easier to cast and the best bet. Big Virginia water temp is better all day due to the depth of the lake. The best evening action is on small grey hackle peacock, Griffith’s Gnat, and olive elk hair caddis (my special trimmed edition).

EAST WALKER flow is at 173cfs, and it’s recommended you stay out of the water. Mostly midges getting the action, crystal, zebra, gillies, fox poopah, WD-40, and sparkle pupa under an attractor. Some dry fly action in the afternoon (spotty) with #12 elk hair caddis, or PMD’s. Water temp holding around 65-66 degrees, so early and late is the best.

WEST WALKER is clear and flow has improved, so fish the water near the bridge north up to one mile is the best spot. Lots of dry action on caddis, hoppers, and mayfly imitations. I fished Lane and Roosevelt with dries and zero hits, seemed to be only taking “meat”. Skunk was in the air that day.

Please DON’T WADE without cleaning your gear for the next water, and keep fido out of the water so he doesn’t transport the snails either. Cleaning methods; go to flyline.com or contact your local Fish and Game office.

Ralph Cutter’s latest article Slate Wipers in the last issue of Fly Fisherman states the best method to stop the spread of the invasive mud snail is NOT to wade.

Umpqua River Outing

UMPQUA RIVER - JULY, 2004

About 30 club members made the long trip north to the Umpqua River RV Park for another drift down the river on everything but air mattresses and bath tubs to catch smallmouth bass. Thursday was set as the day to drift the river either from the RV park or a couple miles downstream at the bridge to the Big K Ranch about 7 miles away catching smallmouth bass from 8 to 18 inches or more along the way. A majority of the

My son Larry who lives in Lincoln City, Oregon, was to arrive hopefully before noon so we could join the drift, but, alas, he was not able to arrive until

late afternoon so we joined the other members who didn't drift all day, along with those who did, at the Big K that evening for dinner that had been prearranged with the ranch so those who did drift could take their floating devices out of the river on the ranch. Those attending were not disappointed as Big K put on an excellent smorgasbord in a room separated from the

other guests of the ranch. I'm sure it wasn't because of the smell emanating from all the fishy clothes, right?

It was at that dinner that my son and myself arranged a drift Saturday to take out on the Big K, minus the great dinner of course. As it turned out, my son and I were not disappointed at all as were the other club members who did the drift on Thursday. My son and I didn't keep count, but we easily boated and released close to a hundred fish that day all within the 8 to 18 inch range. In fact we stayed so long in some "good holes" earlier in the day that we had to row over some of the better water on the Big K just to get out before dark. Of course the

wind had to start blowing upstream the last mile and a half and my son and I spent a good almost two hours rowing to our take-out spot on the Big K. Despite the exercise at the end of the day, the trip was well worth



it. Steve made sure all attending had enough of the flies that caught the fish to use on the drift. Several do break off or the fly comes apart after so many fish "slobber" all over it.

For those of you who didn't attend, you missed a fantastic outing as the weather was not quite as hot as last year plus there was even entertainment provided by Mitch Kay and Steve Cooper on the guitar. I don't think they're ready for a tour yet, however. After our own club dinner Friday evening of barbecued tri-tip steak and other fine dishes prepared by members and their wives, including a blackberry dish prepared by Grady freshly picked in the RV park, Walt Kotecki entertained us over a campfire reminiscing his Alaskan adventure he and Ed Sill took last year during July out of the back of an old Nissan pickup truck pulling a trailer. Conservation



The New Zealand Mud Snail has invaded both the Mokelumne and the Calaveras Rivers as well as Putah Creek and the Owens River. The Department of Fish and Game is testing methods to clean waders and equipment and has received donations from equipment manufacturers and fly fishing clubs and organizations including: the Northern California Council - Federation of Fly Fishers, Cal Trout, the Granite Bay Fly Fishing Club and the Delta Fly Fishers. DFG currently recommends spraying gear with Clorox Formula 409, then scrub with a stiff brush to remove all visible snails. Then rinse with tap water. Snails can collect under laces and in the felt soles of wading boots. Placing gear in water maintained at 130 degrees for 5 minutes is an alternate method of removal.
