#### Conservation

The New Zealand Mud Snail has invaded both the Mokelumne and the Calaveras Rivers as well as Putah Creek and the Owens River. The Department of Fish and Game is testing methods to clean waders and equipmentand has received donations from equipment manufacturers and fly fishing clubs and organizations including: the Northern California Council - Federation of Fly Fishers, Cal Trout, the Granite Bay Fly Fishing Club and the Delta Fly Fishers. DFG currently recommends spraying gear with Clorox Formula 409, then scrub with a stiff brush to remove all visible snails. Then rinse with tap water. snails can collect under laces and in the felt soles of wading boots. Placing gear in water maintained at 130 degrees for 5 minutes is an altermnte method of removal. ## Henderson Springs Outing by Ron Pettit

March 8th. 9th and 10th

Mon-Tues-Wed

Henderson Springs is a private water fly fishing resort located about 5 hours north of Stockton and east of Redding on Hwy. 299 east. There are four spectacular lakes, one large pond and a 1/2 mile meandering spring creek, all filled with trophy trout. This is excellent wet and dry fishing! The catch & release barbless hook waters are open only to guests of the ranch which it limits to 10-12 anglers, ensuring a very private and unpressured fishery. The fish are mostly Pit River rainbows ranging in the 3-6 pound range, with Browns to 8 pounds. Anglers have taken fish up to 15 pounds in Clear Lake.I have fished at Henderson Springs twice a year for 6 years and have never caught a fish under 18 inches.

The pristine setting of the drive-to lakes offers float tubers hours of outstanding fishing. Stream anglers like using light tackle for big fish and are limited to only a few hours a day to reduce pressure on the fish, as the catch rate is high.

The lodge is spacious and comfortable featuring 7 bedrooms, 4 bathrooms, fireplaces and a big screen satellite TV. A huge deck overlooks a gorgeous meadow excellent for viewing soaring Eagles, honkers, wild turkey, quail, otter, dear and an occasional bear. In addition to the main lodge, there is a unique cabin with a wood stove, fully appointed kitchen and gas BBQ. It sleeps up to 6 people for those who want to be on their own.

Gourmet meals are served each morning and evening in the lodge dining room. Made to order lunches are prepared daily for guests to take to their fishing sites. The management and staff are GREAT!. Very friendly and knowledgeable. Staying there is a good experience.

Henderson Springs is open FEB through MAY, closed JUNE, JULY & AUGUST,

open again SEPT, OCT. & NOV, closed DEC & JAN. Early booking is necessary.

Rates for the lodge or cabin, all meals and fishing are \$252. per person, per day.

Rate for the cabin, without meals, is \$160. per day, per person.

Non-angler guests are \$120. per person, per day

The ranch has float tube rentals and limited supplies such as leaders and flies.

Due to the response from members at the December meeting, I have

reserved lodging and fishing accommodations for 8 people at Henderson

Springs, the private water fly fishing resort east of Redding. If we are a group of 8, the resort could be exclusively ours. We will arrive on Monday, March 8 around 1pm and leave Thursday, March 11 around noon. This is an excellent time for float tubing and stream fishing using wet and dry flies. Cost for lodging, all meals and fishing is \$252.pp per day for a total of \$756. I am offering my services to guide those who would like some assistance. ## **Our Mission**

Delta Fly Fishers is a community organization whose members are dedicated to the furtherance of the art of fly fishing. To accomplish this, we actively participate in educational programs to teach anglers the techniques of fly fishing, fly tying, fishing ethics and the practice of "catch and release". We place great emphasis on conservation issues as they relate to streams and lakes with a focus on protection, preservation and restoration. We have assumed the responsibility to monitor local waters and bring to the attention of the public and governmental agencies issues which threaten conservation. We encourage families and anglers of all ages to participate in the club's activities.

## **Community Events**

We recognize that as a community organization we have a professional obligation to provide information and activities relating to fly fishing for the non-member fishing public, with emphasis on children. Each year we participate in conservation projects in 17 of our elementary schools where a team of members obtain fresh fish eggs (either Salmon or Trout) and in conjunction with the classroom teacher, present a program to the children, leaving the eggs with them to hatch in their classroom tank. Once the fry are old enough, we accompany the children to the Mokelumne River and assist them in releasing the fish. We strongly encourage the children to practice "catch & release".

Club members in Partnership with San Joaquin Count Park and Recreation present Trout Bout in November, the Catfish Derby in June for youth 5 to 15 years old and parents and seniors at Oak Grove Regional Parks. Casting Classes are presented from 6:00 pm to dark every Wednesday evening during daylight savings time at Oak Grove Regional Park.

We also support Conservation and Stream restoration project locally and throughout the State.

We also provide, and staff, an informational booth at the Asparagus Festival where we have exhibits and demonstrate fly tying and casting while talking to folks about the benefits of joining our club and the pleasures of fly fishing.

## The Bob McMillen Memorial Fishing Tournament

The County Parks and Recreation Department held a memorial "Trout Bout" Saturday, February 7th in memory of Bob McMillen, the county's recreation department director who passed away suddenly last June. Bob was the moving force in creating the county's Trout Bouts held each year and Delta Fly Fishers joined in to provide food and drinks for the public who come to participate in the event.



Pictures of Bob were posted outside around the clubhouse, and his family was in attendance, including his mother and brother and their families. Balloons were released before sunup and the first "commemorative cast" into the lake was made by Bob's grandson. Just before weigh-in and prizes were awarded, the Boy Scouts presented a flag color guard to Bob's family and his wife with a plaque commemorating the event that Bob started.



DFG closes the park the Friday before each trout bout and plants around 2,000 pounds of rainbow trout, some with tags worth money that can be redeemed through the Parks and Recreation



Department. Prizes are awarded for the various categories of children, young and old, who catch the heaviest trout before final weigh-in. Many arrive before sunup to get their favorite spot. Several DFF members also arrived by 6:00 a.m. to set up their "food service" that help make the event a success. This is DFF's



contribution to the parks department for allowing us free rent of the Nature Center to hold our Board meetings and fly tying events. This event is a very satisfying experience for those DFF members who participate.
