# Block of the Month 2024 — Underground Railroad Submitted by The Mystery Quilter

This month we are going to make the Jacob's Ladder pattern. This is also known as the "Underground Railroad" block. The Jacob's Ladder pattern dates back to pre-Revolutionary War America and has been associated with the Underground Railroad Quilt stories. It first appeared in publication in 1884, so many doubt its association with the Underground Railroad. However, families would include this pattern because of its Biblical reference in their quilts, so despite the lack

of antebellum documentation, it was very likely around in the 1830s and 40s.

There are many ways to make this block. This way is one of them. When I made the central 4 patch blocks, I was not thinking like a quilter: I was thinking lazy, so I made them like you make half square triangles. I superimposed a dark and light 5 1/2 inch square, marked the center line and sewed 1/4 inch away. I cut the pieces

apart, I rotated the pieces, to get opposite orientation of the colors, marked the center and sewed away. After cutting down the center line, I had 2 four patches. You are probably laughing hysterically by now, since it would be much easier to do this with rectangular pieces of fabric (2 1/2 inches by 5 inches) or 2 1/2 inch squares and not do as much marking. I was in triangular thinking, what can I say?


## March 2024 Block — Jacob's Ladder

You will need:

7 dark 5 1/2 " squares 6 light 5 1/2" squares (one extra for possible errors)

4 1/2 inch square ruler
Cutting mat and rotary cutter

1. Lay a 5-1/2" dark square on a 5-1/2" light square and mark the diagonal. Sew 1/4" on either side of the line and cut along the center



line. Trim to 4". Make 4 half square triangles like this.

2. Make two four patches with alternating colors. I superimposed two 5 1/2 "squares, marked the center line and



sewed the blocks 1/4" away from the line. I then cut on the center line and rotated the blocks to alternate the colors. I repeated finding the center and sewing 1/4" away and cutting on the center line. That resulted in two 4 patches. Repeat for a total of 4 four patches.



Lining up the opposite colors.

3. Line up your ruler so that the 2" lines of the 4-1/2" ruler cross exactly at the center of the 4 patch and check that the 4 blocks will be

the same size (double measure if necessary) then trim so that the block measures 4".



4. You will have unused dark squares that you need to trim to 4". Press your pieces (seams to the dark side or open), then lay the pieces out as below:




5. Sew the vertical blocks together using a heavy 1/4 " seam first. In the right vertical will be a dark

square, followed by a HST, with the light side to the bottom right, and then a 4 patch, with light in the upper right and lower left.

The Center vertical has the top HST with the light side to the bottom right, a 4 patch with light in the upper right and lower left, and a HST, with the light side top left. The lighter sides of the HSTs will touch the light squares in the 4 patch.

The last vertical has a 4 patch, with the light in the upper right and lower left, a HST, with the light side top left and a dark square.

- 6. Press the overall block.
- 7. Trim to roughly 10 inches or the size you selected for your Log Cabin block from January. Voila!

During a recent visit to my mom, I stumbled upon a gem at Fabrics -N-Things in Leominster, MA that has revolutionized my sewing experience. Tucked away among the shelves, I found a tool I had never seen before: the Thread Picker.

As someone knee-deep in a project requiring meticulous pressing of small fabric pieces, this find couldn't have come at a better time. The innovative device was the perfect solution for tidying up my ironing table from pesky threads. Its efficiency didn't stop there; I discovered its versatility extended to cutting boards and design walls as well.

For anyone needing a solution to thread clutter or seeking efficiency in their sewing endeavors, I highly recommend giving this tool a try. Who knows, it might just become your new favorite sewing companion!



## Jo's Pumpkin Soup by Jo Tong

1 large onion, chopped 1/4 cup unsalted butter 1 tsp curry powder 29oz. can pumpkin 1 tsp salt 2 cups half & half 2 1/2 cups chicken broth 1/2 tsp cinnamon

Sour cream, fresh parsley, chopped apple, pumpkin or sunflower seeds could be used as garnishes.

Sauté onion in butter until tender; sprinkle with curry & sauté 2 more minutes. Stir in Pumpkin & salt. While continually stirring, add 1/2 & 1/2.

Mix in broth & cinnamon & thoroughly heat.

Use garnishes as desired.
