A Message from Pastor Mark -

#### Our 275th Anniversary celebration:

I am turning over this space in this month's newsletter to the Rev. Alfred Nevin. He wrote a book titled, <u>Churches of the Valley or An Historical Sketch of the Old Presbyterian Congregations of Cumberland and Franklin Counties, in Pennsylvania</u> which was published in 1852. He includes a chapter on the Lower Marsh Creek Church which begins with this paragraph:

About the years 1734-6, a band of emigrants from Scotland and the north of Ireland, more usually known in Pennsylvania as Scotch-Irish, settled on the "red lands" in the southeastern part of York County. Not long afterwards, and probably about the year 1740, a number of the same race made the first settlement in what is now Adams County, among the hills near the sources of Marsh Creek. These settlers were of the better order or peasantry, and brought with them the characteristics of their native land. They were moral, industrious, and intelligent, and for the most part were rigid Presbyterians, of "Seceders." They were frugal, as the Scotch always are - plain in their mode of living, but cordial and hospitable. They were universally men of undaunted courage, and high patriotic feeling, and when the alarm of the Revolution first rung through the land, it called no truer or more willing hearts than those of the Scotch-Irish Presbyterians. The manners and characters of the early settlers have been very generally inherited by their descendants - many of whom still cultivate the same farms, worship in the same old churches, and hold fast to the rigid and venerated "form of sound words" of the Presbyterian Church.

We have received a sacred heritage . . .



#### A "Li'I" HISTORY ABOUT Li'l Ripples

My first introduct ion to *Li'l Ripples* came when I received the July 1997 edit ion in Sasebo, Japan, where I served as a Navy Chaplain. I was nearing retirement from the Navy and had been extended an invitation by the Pulpit Nominating Committee at Lower Marsh Creek to be their candidate as Pastor. The letter I sent to Lower Marsh Creek was featured in the August 1997 edition and began: "Dear Friends at Lower Marsh Creek, I just received your July newsletter – *Li'l Ripples* – and was reminded that I promised Tim Myers [PNC Chair] I would write with more information about me and my family, and send a few pictures. *By the way, I and my family are very impressed with your newsletter and with the high level of act ivity you have maintained in the absence of a pastor..." From the time I began my ministry at LMC, up to the present, 10 years after my retirement in 2013, I have continued to be impressed by the LMC Church newsletter – both the quality and content!* 

At the time of my arrival, Gary Bechtel, Clerk of Session, was the editor of *Li'l Ripples*. Apparently, the church newsletter, in its present form, was begun by Rev. Spencer VanGulick, who served as Pastor of Lower Marsh Creek from 1982-1996. Gary took over when Rev. VanGulick left, and served as editor until 2003, when his wife Suetta retired, and they began to travel extensively. It is interesting to note, that Gary, who had taught Industrial Arts at Fairfield High School, was permitted to use the High School copy machine to print the monthly edition of the newsletter. From 2003 through 2005, Sandy Buhrman served as editor, and the newsletter was printed at Staples (then in Gettysburg). Hank Seamon followed, and served faithfully as editor for the next 9 years, continuing to use Staples to copy the newsletter. As Hank commented, folding and adding address labels to all those newsletters could be tedious at times! It is not known who first began to send out copies digitally. Today, the majority are sent out by email.

Hank turned "Li'l Ripples" over to College Student Stacy Ryan in 2014, and she served as editor until November, 2016, when Linda Hagee took over as editor. Linda maintained the high quality of *Li'l Ripples* through the end of 2022, when our current editor, Fay Hess, stepped in. I believe she has enjoyed the challenge, and is doing a great job!

Editing the church newsletter is hard work! However, through the years and changes in editors, the helpful content and impressive quality have been consistent covering the myriad of activities in our dynamic congregation. I am very appreciative to all who have devoted their time and talent to this valuable ministry resource over the years!

DO YOU KNOW - Dirk & Pam Grove? Dirk is an Elder & a member of Wires & Wood. Pam is a Deacon.

We are both natives of Chambersburg. After stints in Delaware and Virginia, we moved to Adams County (close enough to our old Franklin County stomping grounds) in 2020. So, it feels like we've come back home. At least our southcentral Pennsylvania accents sound normal here. Along with Dirk's mom Marcia, we became members of Lower Marsh Creek Church in 2019. Since 2021, Dirk has served on Session, and Pam has been a Deacon.

We didn't know one another, growing up, although our families attended the same church, and Pam's dad was a Certified Public Accountant for Dirk's family's business. But Pam was a good friend of Dirk's sister Daria, who thought we might make a good match. Our first date in 1981 was blind...but, apparently, Daria had good instincts. We were married on July 9, 1983 – 40 years ago! Shortly after we married, we joined the McConnellsburg United Presbyterian Church, where Dirk had played music since he was 14 years old. (From age 14-17, Dirk played lead guitar in a working rock band, along with keyboard player Richard Rotz – who is a fine musician, and a long time elder and music director at the McConnellsburg Church. Richard was "instrumental"—pun intended—in both our faith journeys, because, through numerous invitations to play music at the church, he introduced us to Presbyterianism.)

We have two sons - Tyler, an attorney, is 39, and he's married to Emilia. They have three sons: Jacob (8), David (7) and William (6). Our second son Cale, a private equity executive, is 35. He is married to Julie, and they are parents to three sons: Samson (10), Eli (8) and Huxley (6).

Dirk graduated from Temple University with a B.F.A. in graphic design, and Pam holds a B.A. in Public Relations from Shippensburg University. Before we were married, Dirk worked for the J. Walter Thompson advertising agency in Washington, D.C., working on USAir newspaper ads. After we married, we moved to Alexandria, and Dirk changed jobs to work at Morgan Burchette Associates, where he created graphics for the Amtrak Auto Train.

When we decided to start a family, we agreed that the city was not the ideal place for us to raise our kids. So, we moved back to Chambersburg. Dirk's family owned and operated a large sawmill, and, after graduating from the National Hardwood Lumber Association's grading school, he went to work at the mill as a lumber inspector and dry kiln operator, until the mill closed in 1992. During that time, Pam worked in sales for WHAG-TV, and later, she was a marketing assistant for Nitterhouse Concrete Products.

At that time, our boys were very young and we were interested in giving them quality educational toys to help them learn. But, when we found ourselves driving all the way to Washington, D.C. and Philadelphia, PA to find the kind of toys we wanted, we reasoned that the Chambersburg area might provide a good business opportunity for us. So, in 1990, we started Terrific Toys, Inc., a 2,000 sq. ft. specialty/educational toy store in a strip mall on Wayne Avenue.

In 1995, we had an opportunity to move our store to a large outlet mall in Rehoboth Beach, Delaware. We moved our family there, and expanded the business to include a brick-and-mortar store, an annual printed catalog with nationwide circulation and two ecommerce websites. And we were very active members of the congregation at Westminster Presbyterian Church, two blocks from the beach. There, Dirk served on Session, and Pam served on the Hospitality Committee. And, Dirk played a little music, too.

In 2008, while we were deeply involved in expanding our warehouse in Delaware, we began to see signs that pointed to an impending recession (which quickly became an unfortunate, long-lasting reality). We made the decision to close our business at that time. Dirk found a job managing the retail operations of the National Rifle Association, and he moved to the Fairfax, VA area while Pam stayed in Delaware and worked to wind down the business. Pam moved to Virginia as soon as she could, and she decided to retire at that time. We lived in Virginia for 13 years. Then, happily, Dirk was able to retire in 2021.

We moved to our cabin on Bear Mountain in Aspers, PA. And, thanks to the fact that we had met Dale Williams when he was interim pastor at McConnellsburg, we joined Lower Marsh Creek Presbyterian Church. (At Dirk's request, both Pastor Dale and Pastor Mark visited and ministered to Dirk's dad before he passed. We are forever grateful, and we've always considered their kindness to represent the love that is abundant at Lower Marsh Creek.)

Both of us, AND Dirk's mom Marcia, love being a part of this wonderful community church. Thank you!

#### **Adams Christian Prison Ministries**

On September 18 over 30 people attended the Relaunch Prayer Rally which was hosted by First Baptist Church of Gettysburg.

Once a month ACPM provides a basket full of goodies and snacks for the correctional officers and staff to express gratitude for their service "to protect and serve the residents of Adams County and the general public by providing progressive and comprehensive correctional and rehabilitative services." First Baptist contributed for September. If it is approved for us to support this ministry, I will contact Chaplain Perez and then publicize a collection of snacks for a future month.

Five teams of volunteers returned to the prison to provide weekend chapel services beginning October 1. Teams from both protestant and Catholic communities provide a once-a-month service.

ACPM Financial update: As of September 9, there was \$34,341 cash on hand. Contributions are at 98.5% of budgeted amounts and from individuals are at 82% of budgeted amounts. Expenses have exceeded income by \$16,050.

## SAT-7

Throughout the Middle East and North Africa, many Christians don't have a community of believers to rely on, especially in times of crises. And for many countries in this region – including Yemen and Sudan – the crises are beyond discouraging . . . war and violence, extreme poverty, malnourishment, rampant disease, displacement, and many more daily dangers. In both countries, there is an added threat for Isolated Believers that creates a perfect storm of turmoil. Publicly professing the Christian faith is punishable by persecution, imprisonment, or even execution in Yemen. In Sudan, recent changes to apostasy laws have not freed believers from harassment and targeted violence. In the face of country-wide darkness, many Yemeni and Sudanese Christians cannot gather with other believers.

Here is a testimony from a SAT-7 viewer in Yemen: "I need to know the real God." A Counselor explained to Nadi who Jesus is and how God loves him and redeemed him through His Son's death on the cross. "If Jesus is God, why did he have to die? How could He be human and divine at the same time? What are the Gospels and the differences between them?" Thanks to support from us and others, a SAT-7 team

was available to answer all of Nadi's questions. After talking with him and sending him a digital Bible, Nadi said, "I am convinced that Jesus is God and died on the cross to atone for my sins!"

In the midst of the Taliban takeover in Afghanistan, the SAT-7 viewer support team received a call from Jalal, an Afghan man hungry for hope and truth. He described the unsettling reality of his family's circumstances . . . The Taliban took advantage of an opportunity to take Afghanistan and subject it to their religious mischief. They assaulted the defenseless people of Afghanistan, and my family and I lost hope. But in the midst of darkness and conflict, Jalal and his family discovered the hope they were searching for in SAT-7's programs on their living room television. As the family watched SAT -7's Christian channels, a curiosity began to stir up in Jalal. He knew this was the something "more" he had been missing in his life, so he connected with a member from the SAT-7 viewer support team through a video call. On that call, Jalal gave his life to the Lord. When we followed up with him, he said, "So many things have changed in my life, and my family and I are very happy."

Throughout the years of conflict in Afghanistan, SAT-7 has seen many men, women, and children – people who've never heard the name of Jesus before – discover His love and devote their lives to him. Up to 50 people have even crammed into one person's home before to hear the good news SAT-7 streams! A male viewer said that the Christians on his TV screen weren't at all like he had been taught. They spoke his language, were loving, truthful, hopeful – not evil and deceiving – and had a joy and peace about them that he found strangely attractive.

For more than 25 years, SAT-7 has supported believers in the Middle East in their spiritual growth and Christian witness.

#### **Young Life**

Dan Zychal of Young Life asks for prayers that they find more leaders and committee members. He reports that they have already met 45 new teenagers in the last couple of months. Dan also asks that we add to our prayers a request of the Lord for a bus driver. 
