275 Years - Honoring the Past, Faithful in the Present, Praying for the Future

Our goal is to fill 275 shoeboxes to send the Gospel message to the children of the future.

Operation Christmas Child National Collection Week, November 13-20, 2023

Operation Christmas Child is a project of Samaritan's Purse, an international relief organization. Their mission is to provide local partners around the world with shoeboxes filled with small toys, hygiene items, and school supplies and deliver them to children in need around the world, as a means of reaching out to children in their own communities with the Good News of Jesus Christ.

Each shoebox is a **Gospel opportunity** because it comes with a 96-page book called "The Greatest Journey." It contains 12 lessons to help children know Jesus. The 12 lessons are divided into the following 3 sections: Know the Gospel, Grow in the Gospel, and Share the Gospel. The book is printed in the child's language.

This year in celebration of LMCPC's 275th anniversary, **our goal is to pack 275 boxes**. The cost of shipping the shoeboxes has been paid for by our church's David Scott Youth Fund; therefore, you needn't enclose a shipping fee. Hopefully this will allow you to **pack an extra box!** Boxes will be collected in our Fellowship Hall during National Collection Week, November 13-20. More on the collection dates will be announced later.

- 1. Pack your shoebox yourself and return it to the church during National Collection Week.
- 2. <u>Follow Your Box</u>: Adhesive labels are available to attach to your shoebox. They contain a QR Code, which <u>has already been scanned by LMCPC</u> for tracking purposes. To follow your box and learn the destination, detach, and **keep the stub containing the 9-digit code**. Around March 2024, you can enter the 9-digit code on Samaritan's Purse website and see where your box was delivered. This information will also be made available to LMCPC.
- 3. <u>To Build a Box Online</u>: Go to https://www.samaritanspurse.org/operation-christmas-child/buildonline/ OR Google: Samaritanspurse.org, select "What We Do," select "Operation Christmas Child," and select 'Pack a Shoebox" and then, "Build a Shoebox Online."

You select items to fill your box. The donation for this service is \$25. Many shoebox gifts built online can be delivered to parts of the world where access to the Gospel is restricted or where strict customs regulations require a specially packed shoebox. If you choose this option, LMCPC will not be paying to ship your box. But please add you name to the chart in the narthex, so we can count your boxes towards our goal of 275 boxes.

Since the last issue, we have had two events highlighting our 275th anniversary—the Congregational Retreat on August 26th and the Ice Cream Social and Crank Off on September 10th. Both were a lot of fun!

The Congregational Retreat held a little of everything—good food, singing, teaching, crafts, a nature walk, and worship. Since you can read about these in more detail elsewhere in this Li'l Ripples, I'll leave it at that and extend a huge thanks to everyone who made it possible!

The Ice Cream Social was a fantastic time too! This year we featured an ice cream "crank-off" contest. Originally we were hoping to do things the old-fashioned way, but all the manual ice cream crank freezers we could find were broken! So we just held the contest with ice cream made at home by 3 teams: Molly's Folly (Gary and Cathy Michaliga) featured Chocolate Molly's Folly; the Teaberry Shufflers (Al and Lynn Miller) made Teaberry Shuffle; and Mark & Kris (Pastor Mark and his wife, Kris) brought Strawberry "Fruit of the Spirit." Gladhill's Godly Gelato (Rick and Terri Gladhill) also entered with Miracle Mint, a mint chocolate chip flavored ice cream, but since their ice cream maker failed on them, they were not eligible for the actual contest. Those who came for the contest tasted each flavor, then voted for their favorite with non-perishable food items to go to the Fairfield Food Pantry. We donated over 100 items to them, and the winners were... Pastor Mark and Kris Englund-Krieger !!! They received a basket with homemade ice cream toppings, courtesy of Denise Lockwood. After the contest was over, the ice cream social began! Yummy ice cream flavors were topped with homemade toppings of hot fudge, chocolate peanut butter, butter pecan, or strawberries—not to mention the whipped topping, sprinkles, etc.—and everyone agreed it was a wonderful way to have supper!

From the AV Booth - Summer is ending and I have to give praise to Phyllis Doyle for filling in for me, allowing me to take vacation dates throughout the year. Phyllis is a Godsend for the entire congregation.

A MILESTONE HAS BEEN REACHED! LMCC's YouTube channel has obtained over 10,041 views as of the week of September 8th. Our channel has logged over 2,500 hours of watch time since its inception. 6,625 of those10,041 views were from non-subscribers for a total of 1,752 hours of watch time. This is something to take notice of and find away to attract non-subscribers to subscribe or join our congregation.

We have obtained 7 additional subscribers to our YouTube channel since last year for a total of 92 active subscribers. We average 6 to 9 active subscribers viewing the livestream in progress every week. Other non-subscribers may watch the livestream at the same time but they are not accounted for in the statistics.

Active views from U.S.A. cities include: Gettysburg and Littlestown, PA; New York, NY; Las Vegas, NV; Palm Coast, FL; and White Mountains, NH. Other views from Europe are active.

After donating and installing a smart TV for Pastor Mark to use to show *The Chosen* video series to the Wednesday study group, problems arose. When the components were checked, it was determined that most of the difficulties were due to conflicts with the different programs. Hopefully, these issues are now resolved and this setup will be operational for use with DVDs and laptop connections.

In July, 3 new mics, 3 mic stands, and 4 - 25' cables were purchased to be used for recorded online audio during musical and special presentations. Four couples donated the funds for this purchase. Also, the Home Ministry Team approved the purchase of another 4 mics, stands, and cords. This will enable us to mic an entire group of musicians during our services, enhancing both the in - church and online AV experience. (Nick Johnson)

DO YOU KNOW? Editor's note: This month, instead of a biography, the item below is offered:

An Idea to Consider When Giving to Our Church

During the year that you reach age 72, you must begin withdrawing from your regular IRA. That year, and each year thereafter, you must withdraw at least the amount specified by the IRS (called your *Required Minimum Distribution* or RMD).

If all your IRA contributions were *tax-deductible* when you made them, the full amount of the RMD will be treated as ordinary income for the year in which you withdraw it.

There is a legal way to avoid paying any tax on some or all of you RMD.

Account holders age 70½ or older may make a contribution *directly** from your IRA to a qualified charity, without it being considered a taxable distribution. The deduction also effectively lowers the donor's adjusted gross income (AGI), and this could put you in a lower tax bracket.

*Note: The bank or brokerage holding your IRA funds must make the withdrawal check out to the charity, not to you.

THE WOMEN OF THE BIBLE SPEAK, THE WISDOM OF 16 WOMEN AND THEIR LESSONS FOR TODAY by Shannon Bream, 2021, 192 pp.

When I attended Bible school classes, we never focused on women in Scripture, but thanks to Shannon Bream's New York Times bestseller, THE WOMEN OF THE BIBLE SPEAK, I learned that they were central figures in many Bible stories. For example, Queen Esther's bravery saved her entire people. There were warriors like Jael, judges like Deborah, and prophets like Miriam. Of course, the biggest name was Mary Magdalene who, as the first person to witness Jesus' resurrection, became the first Christian evangelist, eager to share the news that would forever change the world.

In this book, Shannon Bream focuses on 16 women of the Bible, and she uniquely arranges them in pairs and contrasts their jouurneys and does so to reflect on the meaning of each individual but at the same time portray how they relate to each other and to us. There's Esther's strength, Hannah's hope, Rahab's boldness, and Mary's faith. Author Bream tries to get us to understand each of them to gain insight and wisdom that will transform us as we see common struggles to resist bitterness, despair, and pride. Like them, we find our true selves in faith, hope, and love and also find wisdom and guidance for better navigating our own faith journeys.

And author Bream is honest about her own faith journey as she's Fox News Channel Chief legal correspondent and was the host of Fox News @ Night from 2007 until 2022. A Florida native, she started her career as a sexual harrassment attorney and now covers politics and the U.S. Supreme Court. She's run a marathan, competed in the Miss America pageant and was even fired from her first reporting job as they considered her "just not right." But she doesn't take "No" for an answer, even as she fought the medical establishment to find a way to cope with her own crippling chronic pain condition. She found her own faith to be a source of comfort, hope, and optimism. Readers find this book to be well written and a great source of material for group Bible study. The 16 women from both the New and Old Testaments who Bream profiles highlight their life experiences, their faith, and their relevance to us women today. At the end of each section of the book, there are qestions for discussion where it is obvious that Bream uses her journalistic skills to give the book facts, history, content, and scripture from the first chapter on Sarah and Hagar to the warrior Deborah to the situation of Leah and Rachel and Jacob. She also includes Scripture references to back up the facts and now, many readers are asking her to write stories of the disciples, stories of siblings like Cain and Abel, and stories of those who came back from the dead, especially in the gospel of Matthew. In times and cultures where women aren't valued, the book demonstrates their impact on history. And even when some were flawed, sinful, humble, and considered "outsiders," all played a role in accomplishing God's purpose. Their choices, circumstances and journeys make for compelling reading and offer encouragement to us all, as women have been dealing with the same struggles for hundreds of years as we play a role in our families, communities and our nation because God uses us no matter where we are in life. Author Bream offers an accompanying workbook and audiobook that readers find insightful, encouraging and empowering, especially to know how much women were loved and respected by our Lord. Most importantly, the book gives women today role models for being heroes of faith and action.

HAVE YOU HEARD . . . ?

I smile whenever a birthday is announced in church because then our beloved organist whips into a rendition of "Happy Birthday" and the congregation joyfully sings the lyrics to the honoree. But what most don't know about this most popular song in the world is that it was written in 1893 in Louisville, KY by two middle-aged sisters, both kindergarten and Sunday school teachers, Patty Hill and Mildred J. Hill who decided to to write a book of "song stories" for their students. The book entitled *Song Stories for the Sunday School* was distributed in the spring of 1893 and contained the nursery rhyme "Good Morning to You." Mildred wrote the music and Patty wrote the words:

"Good morning to you,

Good morning to you,

Good morning, dear children,

Good morning to all."

In the early 1900's, the Hill sisters, for some reason, added the birthday words. The first published account of the song appeared in 1924, but without the mention of the Hill sisters, in the book *Harvest* Hymns, edited by Robert H. Coleman who probably came upon the songs in his travels as a publisher. It then found its way to Broadway where it was sung in the musical, A Thousand Cheers, still without the Hill sisters' permission so they sued the producer of the show, Sam Harris, and in 1934, the New York Times reported that the Hill sisters won their case, and the song received copyright protection for 75 years. Since then, the song's ownership has changed many times but the Hill sisters' heirs receive the authors' shares of the gross profits. The song was owned by Warner Communications for years but is now in the public domain. No doubt its world wide popularity has been due to its appearance in some early movies and it was programmed in toys, watches and music boxes. And even though we all sing it so often and enthusiastically, I bet few know of the Hill sisters, the song's age, or the legal wrangling it took to get it into the public domain since Warner Communications fought to keep the song under copyright until 2030 because it was expected to reap \$16.5 million until then. Fortunately, the song belongs to us all and I hope when next you sing it in church, you'll think of the Hill sisters and their Sunday school connection. (Kathy A. Megyeri)

REPORTING ON OUR MISSIONARIES

Thomas and Cheri Henry (England)

The Henrys are working on raising the financial resources needed for them to head back into the mission field (with One Another Ministries based in Cannock, England). They have a one-time launch fund need of \$50,000 to cover their 3-year religious worker Visas and UK Health Care, travel to England and Turkey, transportation of a storage pod from Turkey to England, housing setup, vehicle purchase and technology upgrades.

In their September 9 newsletter they reported that \$25,000 was raised in the first month, but the remainder needs to be raised before their airline tickets can be purchased and details of the move can be planned. The Mission Committee has sent \$1,000 from the mission discretionary line towards this fund. We pray that in the next issue of Li'l Ripples we can report that the full amount has been raised.

Dori Hjalmarson (PCUSA/Honduras)

A recent email from Kathy Wells to members of the Honduras Partnership Committee of the Presbytery of Carlisle indicates tentative plans for a follow-up to last year's mission celebration, this one to be held in Honduras. They are hoping to have this at the end of January, but no specific dates have been chosen. They would probably attend part of the Presbytery of Honduras's plenary session of their Presbytery, visit a few churches, and maybe spend a few days at either Villa de Gracia or a hotel continuing the conversations from last January about how to move the partnership forward. Dori is on vacation and when she gets back, towards the end of September, they plan to have a zoom meeting with the partnership committee and Dori sometime after the first of October. Specifics of the trip and how many might be interested in going will be discussed during the zoom meeting.

Bob and Kristi Rice (PCUSA/South Sudan)

Bob and Krisi arrived in the U.S. in early June with plans for spending a few months visiting churches, attending conferences, and being with family. Bob wasn't feeling well when they arrived, and the sickness dragged on for several weeks. Medical tests and doctor visits seem to indicate a resurgence of the Epstein Barr Virus that Bob experienced in 2017 and explain why Bob continues to feel unusually tired and weak. Visits with churches and friends were cancelled and they returned to Illinois in late June for Bob to recover. Bob's energy is improving, although it appears that it is a rather slow process. Bob's motto these days is "Walk slowly and carry a grateful heart."

Regarding the civil war in Sudan, they report that more than 100,000 people have fled from Khartoum into South Sudan in addition to other refugees who have fled to other neighboring countries. South Sudan was already stretched thin with severe food insecurity and economic crisis, so accommodating these refugees has been a slow process with many suffering without food or water. The families and relatives of many of Bob and Kristi's colleagues in Juba live in Khartoum, and they have struggled to find safe passage out of the country. Church partners in South Sudan are providing some food and supplies to these people fleeing the war. Bob and Krisi ask for our prayers that the violence would end, and that God would protect and provide for civilians.

Bob and Kristi are grateful to the Good Shepherd for walking with them on their journey, particularly in the uncertainty and discouragement of not feeling well. They welcome our prayers for healing for Bob and for God to continue to give discernment and wisdom.

Rvan and Alethia White (PCUSA/Germany)

Last month's issue of Li'l Ripples included a letter from the Whites in which they indicated plans to settle in the U.S. for the coming school year. They mentioned that they were looking forward to being available for some visits with church communities, and an invitation has been issued to them to visit us. We will let you know when a visit is scheduled.

Chaplain's Corner:

The classic scene of a child being alone with a cookie jar reflects the human struggle to maintain integrity. A moral dilemma ensues within our hearts and minds. It is the test or the turmoil that goes on inside of us while debating whether or not to take the cookie, knowing full well we are not supposed to.

In Proverbs 11, it states, "The integrity of the upright guides them, but the crookedness of the treacherous destroys them." (vs. 3). The standard of our integrity is based on God's law, statutes, and principles. Our pursuit to honor God empowers us to do what is right and do what is pleasing in His sight. The proverb clearly indicates that it will guide us to do the right thing.

Integrity is "doing the right thing when no one is watching." What happens if we decide to do the wrong thing when no one is looking? The same proverb states that the unfaithful are destroyed by their duplicity. The idea is that we are provided guidance and instruction on how to walk the moral path. When deciding not to follow the word of God, the path becomes crooked (out of alignment). Using the principle of a wheel alignment for a car, when the car is out of alignment, it impacts the tread on the wheels, the suspension, and steering components. Our lack of integrity triggers a domino effect which will influence the other areas of our lives.

Let's encourage one another to stay aligned with God's ways. Continue growing in integrity by following God's word and walking by the Holy Spirit. While experiencing the ebbs and flows of our spiritual journey, pursue integrity as a child of God, saved by grace.
