a Message from Pastor Mark -

Who are your "Indians"?

Mary Jemison was 12 years old when she was abducted by a Shawnee raiding party in Adams County in the year 1755. Mary Campbell was 10 years old when she was abducted by a Lenape raiding party in the Western Reserve territory (Ohio) in 1758. These abductions, and others like them, would have terrified the early Presbyterians who gathered in our Church. This clash of civilizations between the newly arrived Europeans, including our Scots Irish folks, and the native Americans who already lived here was violent and hostile. Despite their strong Christian faith, their knowledge of the Bible and their commitment to the ways of Jesus as they understood it, our Presbyterian ancestors truly hated the "Indians". Devout Presbyterian Scots Irish, terrified by the possibility of Indian raiding parties aligned with the French military, were aggressive in their defense of their homes and communities. Rev. Paxton, a prominent Presbyterian pastor known throughout the Cumberland Valley, took the offense and organized a small militia of Scots Irish frontiersmen to attack Indian settlements. Looking back at this history from our modern perspective, it is hard to understand such vitriol and violence.

But are we really any different? Ponder in your own heart the people, types of people, groups of people, cultures of people that truly terrify you today. If we search deep and hard enough within our own heart, I guess there are such people, or groups of people, who are our "Indians". And right there, with those people or groups in mind, we have an important set of questions and issues to pray about! Who are our Indians? Who are our enemies? Of whom are we so afraid that true hatred rises up? Jesus had words for us on this question; are we listening?

275th Anniversary Update

Honoring the Past, Faithful in the Present, Praying for the Future

After all the busy-ness of May and June, the rest of the summer has been break time for the 275th Committee, as with most church activities. We've enjoyed a more leisurely pace since the picnic, but are gearing up to jump into fall!

By the time you read this, the Congregational Retreat on August 26th will be over. We hope you were able to attend; it looks like it will be a fun and engaging event! We have over 60 people signed up at this point. Look for a review in the next issue of Li'l Ripples!

Coming up very soon is our Ice Cream Social/Crank-Off on Sunday, Sept. 10th. We've enhanced the annual Ice Cream Social this year with the Crank-Off, an event similar to a Chili Cook-Off, but with ice cream! Several teams will submit batches of their flavor of ice cream for you to come taste at 5:00 PM that Sunday. We ask that instead of voting for your favorite(s) in the normal fashion, you bring non-perishable food items to be donated to the Fairfield Food Pantry. You can place your food items in front of your choice(s); the one that has the most items will get bragging rights! :) If you just want to come eat ice cream and socialize, we'll be serving it up beginning at 6 PM that evening. Please join us!

We are kicking off another event in September as well. Our 275th year anniversary celebration will close with a dinner held at the Adams County Historical Society's new Beyond the Battle museum on Sunday, November 5th. Tim Smith of the ACHS will present a talk on the Scots-Irish migration to this area in the 18th century at 4:00 pm. Dinner will follow and a presentation led by Dirk Grove on worship music through the centuries is also planned! More details on the dinner will be forthcoming as we get closer to the event.

In the early summer of 2017 our youngest son, Andrew, received word that his job was relocating him from Atlanta back to the Washington, DC area. When he first moved to Atlanta he was single and had no family. By the time the summer of 2017 rolled around he was married to Teresa, a lovely Georgia girl, they were the parents of Maddy (now 17) and Drew (now 14) and the caretaker apparent for us. After much soul searching Andrew realized he had to make the move. The big question was what were we going to do?

We had already made two other retirement moves. Were we up to another great adventure with one of us age 78 and the other age 81? The answer to that question, with a little nudge from God, was a resounding YES! Thus, in late November 2017 we were unpacking our earthly belongings in Gettysburg. This turned out to be very fortunate from a family point of view. Our daughter, Jennifer, and her Navy husband, David, were at the US Naval Academy in Annapolis and their three children, Joshua, Megan, and Jonah, were all relatively nearby in graduate school or college. Our oldest son, Bill, and wife, Carrie, were close by in Leesburg, VA, with children, Kelleigh and Ben. By this time Andrew and family had settled outside of Frederick, MD.

Since 1974 we had attended and been quite active in the Episcopal Churches close to our homes in Centreville, MD, Aiken, SC and Canton, GA. So we began to attend the local Episcopal Church in Gettysburg. Unfortunately it was not a good fit for us. We attended the Battlefield Church Services during the summer of 2018 to get a feel for the Christian worship life in the area.

Nothing was really moving us until the day we saw an advertisement in the paper for a trip to Greece sponsored by Lower Marsh Creek Church. Now Greece was on our "bucket list," so we attended a service at Lower Marsh Creek followed by the trip presentation. We went home that day pretty well decided to take the trip, but more importantly, both of us agreed that the little stone church in the country was the place we had been searching for that summer.

Since that time we've realized how much of spiritual life we have found in our church. It is truly the home where we found our family - a family which supports you, cares for you, and prays for you. And so, we would ask again, "How did you discover Lower Marsh Creek Church?"

Adams Christian Prison Ministries

In month of June, two female inmates decided to believe in Jesus Christ as their savior, redeemer, and restorer of their lives. The first salvation took place on a Monday morning while one of the local woman clergy provided pastoral care for one of the female inmates. The second one took place in the afternoon while the chaplain visited the housing unit for a one-on-one pastoral visit. While the chaplain was explaining God's plan for salvation, she interrupted him and exclaimed, "That is what I want!" The chaplain helped her to pray and ask God to forgive her, save her, and renew her. Both ladies have demonstrated a genuine desire to grow in their faith by attending the weekly Bible studies. The salvation of these two individuals is just a small testimony of what God is still doing inside the prison. The men who attend the weekly Bible studies have also demonstrated spiritual growth and an increase in their faith.

Please continue to pray for the people who are incarcerated and separated from families. It is a time when they do a lot of self-reflection, and we invite the Holy Spirit to nurture them and reveal to them the heart and mind of God.

ACPM has been coordinating with ACACC to reintroduce volunteers to conduct religious services. The opportunity is drawing closer with a tentative re-launch time of the end of September or the beginning of October. Please pray that there would be a spirit of unity as teams are being developed to lead weekend services. The inmates are looking forward to having times of worship and preaching of the gospel. A prayer rally is being coordinated for all who wish to join them to lift before the Lord the relaunch of the volunteer ministries in the prison. 

Without the right tools and support, organizations struggle, and workers become discouraged, exhausted, vulnerable, ineffective, or wounded – many simply quit. One Another is a team

of skilled helpers who equip global ministries to face these challenges for effective long-term ministry.

Thomas and Cheri's role at One Another will be to join with what God has been doing through them, bringing their own experience and resources, and helping build up the team in England. Having lived in Turkey for 23 years doing church planting and regional member care, they understand the complexities of living and serving on the mission field while raising Third Culture Kids. More specifically, they will help develop and care for workers through individual coaching, mentoring, and pastoral counseling. Together, they will mentor couples and singles through the 4-day Relational Care Intensive. All of that can be done at The White House ministry centre in Cannock, England, or on the worker's field of service, or virtually when necessary.

When asked "how long," Thomas and Cheri say that their calling compels them to serve the Lord in some context for as long as they are physically and mentally able. Their idea of "retirement" is not to one day stop. Rather, the limits of their humanity will slow them down to serve at a different pace, recognizing that their desires and priorities will slowly shift to serving their family. One year at a time.





A letter from Ryan and Alethia White, co-regional liaisons for Northern and Central Europe

Dear friends and supporters,

While summer is blazing across much of Europe, the Middle East, and the United States, we have similarly been warming up to our plans to spend this coming school year in the U.S. and have been busy finalizing our preparations. We will be in the U.S. starting in August and will be easier to reach

from those time zones for the next year! It has been hard to say goodbyes here in Berlin as we have been in a whirlwind of final gatherings among colleagues and friends. Our family was present during Ryan's final gathering with the International Konvent (network of migrant/international churches in Berlin) and with the church community that we have been working with for the past 10 years. We were warmly sent off by both of these communities as well as by friends. The girls have just had their last day of school and also been well celebrated and shown lots of love from teachers and friends. It is a bittersweet time for us with lots to look forward to and also to grieve as we put a pause on our family life in Berlin.

It has been a full season as well in our capacity as regional liaisons for Northern and Central Europe as we fit in partner visits while we are still on this side of the ocean. Although we will continue in this role during this next year from the U.S. thanks to Zoom and some trips back, we have tried to make face to face contact where possible before we leave Germany. In May, Alethia joined Area Coordinator for the Middle East and Europe Luciano Kovacs to meet with the Protestant Church of Switzerland. Apparently, many decades ago, there was a more active relationship between the PC(USA) and PCS, but this has been dormant in recent years. We were invited by the ecumenical officer to come to Bern and get a better sense of the work the PCS is involved with. It was encouraging to see how much and advocacy, gender and sexuality justice, refugee and migrant work, and congregational vitality initiatives.

Continued from the preceding page - It was said that Switzerland's federalist political structure, in its modern form, may have likely been inspired by the political experiment that became the United States in the 1700s. It is a complicated structure even today in which to work and pass social reforms. We came away from our visit with the sense that the PCS is engaged with good work and that there is a good foundation from which to build a further partnership together. Swiss Church Aid (HEKS) is also a partner that PC(USA) already interacts with through Presbyterian Disaster Assistance.

Just recently, Alethia returned from a week-long conference in beautiful Olomouc, Czech Republic where the Czech Partnership Network - the mission network of the PC(USA) and Evangelical Church of Czech Brethren (ECCB) – were meeting together as partner congregations from both countries. Alethia often joins the partnership network meetings, and it was good to meet members in person after some years together on Zoom. The theme of the conference was "Together on the Way," and we discussed ideas of how the church informs family concepts, congregational life, society and the world. There were agreements and disagreements, but always in the spirit of listening to the other's experience. We can always learn from each other. It was a wonderfully well-organized week, thanks to a great team from the hosting ECCB church in Olomouc and the result of many months of back and forth planning between the two countries. Alethia was happy to reconnect with ECCB partners from a previous visit and to make new connections with U.S. church congregations who were participating. It was inspiring to see how this transatlantic partnership has been kept alive with back-and-forth visits to each other, conferences (online and in person), and sharing ideas, recipes, songs and experiences. T-shirts worn by both Czech and American participants spoke to the back-and-forth visits. The Americans wore shirts with scenes from Prague, and the Czechs wore shirts promoting a particular football team or from Athens, Georgia or from the Washington, D.C./Maryland area. It was delightful to observe the camaraderie in the room during the week.

Does cross-cultural partnership and conversation and friendship appeal to you or your church community? The partnership network is interested in taking on new participating congregations to keep the spirit of friendship and exchange alive and moving forward. There is a website for the network (http://czechpres.net/) or feel free to send a message and we can put you in contact with leaders of the network for further information.

As we prepare to settle into life in the U.S. for the coming year, we look forward to being available for some visits with church communities. Feel free to be in touch if this is of interest.

As always, your support and encouragement are invaluable. Let's keep the conversation going together!
