

Booneville Lions Club Established TWICE

The Booneville Lions Club was organized and held its first meeting May 12, 1939. The first meeting place for the club was Blue Moon Café which was located on the present sight of Cadence Bank and the weekly meeting date was Wednesday at 12:00 noon.

The formal presentation of the charter to the Booneville Lions Club was made at the Charter Night Celebration at 8:00 P.M. August 20, 1940, in the Dining Hall of the First Methodist Church Booneville with the charter being presented by District Governor Sam E. Lumpkin of Tupelo. The charter was accepted bv the newly elected president and master of ceremonies for the occasion, J. Arthur Downs.

World War II had an impact on the functioning of the Booneville Lions club due to the demands of the military. The membership roll of the club was almost depleted and for this reason the club suspended operations.

Fast forward to April 12, 1948 when the club was reactivated and a new charter authorized for the Booneville Lions Club with twenty-two new members and three reinstallments of former members.

The charter officers for the club organized April 12, 1948 were: Donald Franks, President; George W. Rutherford, Jr., Secretary. The weekly meetings were fixed at noon Thursday at Jim's Restaurant in Booneville. The club was sponsored by the Corinth Lions Club.

The club has been in continuous existence since 1948 and will celebrate its 75th Anniversary on May 4, 2023.

The community and the Booneville Lions Club Foundation, Inc., now a 501(c) 3 non-profit charity owe a tremendous debt of gratitude for both groups of men who chartered the Booneville Lions Club. Their vision has continued to shine a way for service to be rendered to our community, state, and world.

Prices have sure changed since 1948—the cost of a gallon of gasoline was 16 cents; a loaf of bread was just 14 cents; a movie ticket was 60 cents but here in town they were only a dime. The average cost of a new house was \$7,700.00 with the average wages per year of \$2,950.00.

Yes, times have changed but one important thing has stayed the same...and that is that where there's a need, there's a Lion!

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital is a pediatric treatment and research facility located in Memphis, TN. It was founded in 1962 by Danny Thomas and is a 501(c)(3) designated nonprofit medical corporation which focuses on children's catastrophic diseases, particularly leukemia and other cancers. In the 2021 fiscal year. St. Jude received \$2 billion in donations. Daily operating costs average \$1.7 million, but patients are not charged for their care. St. Jude treats patients up to age 21, and for some conditions, up to age

Booneville has had numerous children who were treated at St. Jude in recent years. How blessed we are to have this facility so close to our town.

Administrative offices are in Memphis, TN. Since 1942, Mid-South Lions Sight and Hearing Service has been restoring quality and independence to the lives of men, women and children.

Lions Sight Foundation of Mississippi is a charitable organization headquartered in Flowood, MS. The mission is to provide aid and assistance to the blind and hearing-impaired people in Mississippi. The Mississippi Lions Eye Bank is funded in part by the Lions Sight Foundation of Mississippi and provides corneal tissue for transplants in Mississippi and throughout the world.

LCIF DISASTER GRANTS FUND LIONS' RESPONSE TO TORNADOES

The forecast for bad weather had been predicted all week focused on Friday night, the 24th of March. Beginning at 8 pm a powerful EF4 tornado struck Rolling Fork, Mississippi and another struck just a few miles away in the tiny town of Silver City. From that point, the rest of night was an endless trail of tornado warnings and damage and death across the state. By 11 p.m. it was over, but the destruction was barely visible due to power failures along the path of the tornadoes.

As sunlight began to warm the morning air, the destruction was beyond comprehension. In Rolling Fork, Silver City, Winona, Wren, Amory, and Smithville, emergency teams worked to rescue survivors trapped in the ruble.

Lions began making calls and sending emails to mobilize assistance to all three areas. Leland Lions had just finished a Boston Butt Barbeque sale Friday and had seven left. Saturday morning, they turned that into pulled pork, added some beans and chips, loaded up a tent and tables and headed to Rolling Fork to serve lunch to workers and residents.

An email and several voice mails were sent to LCIF Saturday morning to start the work on

an Emergency Relief Grant. A response came quickly, and a team began writing the grant proposal, first gathering data from all the affected areas in our Lions district. It was completed with the final details of data and submitted Sunday morning. Sunday afternoon came the word the Emergency Grant had been approved for \$10,000.



Clubs were selected to lead the response in each of the three areas affected across a 200 mile span. Tupelo Evening Lions coordinated the response in the Monroe County area around Amory. Grenada Lions spearheaded the work around Winona and Carroll County. In the delta, Leland Lions, who served barbeque the morning after the disaster, led the response to Rolling Fork and Silver City.

Monday morning an email arrived that told district leaders that LCIF had awarded a second grant to the disaster. It was a \$50,000 Major Catastrophe Grant to help empower local Lions' service to the disaster zones.




BOOKS FOR MODERN WOODMEN Hospitality Arts Festival
