We will have signup sheets for all of the tasks necessary for the race. There is some setup the night before and lots to get ready early on the day of the race. We need every Lion member as well as your friends! It definitely will take a village to man the race. Beginning in July, Lions have hit the streets to visit with local business to secure their support through ad sales/donations. We have begun earlier this year because we often find that we are in competition with many other organizations when school starts back. This year is no exception so please don't wait to get out and sell ads. Any new business will require Russ to design a sign with their logo so that Print Villains can print them.

Did you know?

253 million people are blind or have moderate to severe distance vision impairment (MSVI)

1.1 billion have near-vision impairment simply because they don't have a pair of glasses >75% of all blindness and MSVI is avoidable

89% of people of people with visual impairment live in developing countries

Screening Benton County Head Start

Three Lions Clubs from North Mississippi joined together to screen pre-school students at Hickory Flat Head Start Center and Ashland Head Start Center August 15, 2022. The team of four Lions using two PlusOpix vision screeners screened a total of 119 students. Twenty-three were referred to their family to seek additional testing and care by an optical professional.

Lions Russ Lamb, Booneville, Andy Kalinowski, Columbus, Jim Best, Tupelo and Jim Larson also from Tupelo Lions Club met at the Hickory Flat Head Start Center at 9:15 in the morning to set up for the screenings. One class at a time, the four and five year old children entered the multipurpose room and were directed to the two darkened screening positions. Most screenings took just a few seconds to determine if the child passed the screening with no detectable vision problems. Occasionally some referrals took a minute or two to record the necessary information to print out for the referral.

A small sticker was printed with specific codes indicating the vision anomalies detected and was handed to the teacher to forward to the family.

Almost all of the preschoolers breezed through the experience, but a few had some tears, fearing the four

unfamiliar faces they were seeing. A few tears make it hard for the PlusOptix to sense the pupils and make a definitive evaluation. However, Lions will be back next school year and retest all the same children then. Hopefully that will be soon enough to follow up, should any visions problems be detected then.


The staff at both centers were very appreciative of the Lions work and helped tremendously by lining up the students and sending them to the screening setups.

The final screenings finished about noon and the team headed to Ripley for a Mexican lunch out. All four commented what a "great day" it had been start to finish.
