


# Educational Learning Tools

One goal of the Foundation is to support the many different aspects of learning.

Learning tools provide an opportunity to reinforce learning at home and showcase the importance of education while encouraging development.

#### **Dolly Parton Imagination Library Books**

In our year-round partnership with the Dollywood Foundation, the *Imagination Library delivers* a new book each month to children from birth until five years old. The books are addressed to the children, which creates excitement when they get their own mail.

#### Keiki Summer Book Challenge

This program offers a set of five, grade specific books that are delivered to the student in May. The challenge is to complete all five books and the related worksheets to earn tickets for the Grand Prize Drawing held at the end of summer.

#### **Little Passports Monthly Mailer**

The Little Passport Program is offered to encourage keiki interest in geography, science and world discoveries. Each monthly set features a new location (state or country) and contains an assortment of activities, tasks and souvenirs designed to match age appropriate curriculum.

#### **Computer Award Give-a-way**

Geared for student households with limited technology resources this award provides our highest need families with a computer bundle.

Selected families receive a laptop computer, software package, virus protection with warranty and an all-in-one printer.

#### 'Ike Loa Academy

This year-long program was designed to provide students an opportunity to make good life choices and develop general life skills while preparing for college and/or a career.

Students meet once a month on scheduled public school break days. Sessions take place at Hualālai Resort and include mentorship and life skills; budget, finance, college preparedness, resume writing and mock-interviews.

Two off-property excursions take students on campus tours of Palamanui Community College, University of Hawaii at Hilo and The 'Imiloa Astronomy Center. In addition, students job shadow at Hualālai resort and perform community service.



# Medical Assistance

#### Serious Illness Award

Access to quality healthcare is limited on the Big Island. In the event of a serious illness employees and their family typically travel off-island to receive proper treatment and incur excessive medical expenses. When this occurs, the Foundation helps to ease the burden by assisting with patient co-pays, prescriptions, and travel related expenses.

Proudly, the Foundation has placed no cap on this award and supports employees throughout their time of need.

#### Surgical Assistance Award

Some medical conditions, though not life-threatening, still require necessary treatment. Due to the costs involved, some employees postpone the surgery until they are no longer able to work. To encourage earlier care for these types of non-urgent issues, the Foundation established this award to help with the out of pocket costs and travel expenses.

The Foundation awards up to \$3,000.00 to assist with the average cost of necessary routine and serious surgeries.

#### **Dental Assistance Award**

To help support the significant number of employees suffering from a wide range of dental issues, an award specific to dental care was created. Following similar guidelines to the Surgical Assistance Award, this helps with the high cost of urgent and necessary dental procedures.

The Foundation awards up to \$2,000.00 to address the growing cost of crucial dental treatments.



# Scholarships and Grants



#### Pre K - 12th Grade Scholarship Award

Awards are granted to eligible applicants for **private school tuition** on a sliding scale, which is based on gross income, financial need, size of household and overall academic merit. **Awards are made up to \$4,000.00**.

#### **Higher Education Scholarship Award**

The Higher Education scholarship Award follows the same sliding scale as the Prek-12th Grade Award and provides employee families with **college tuition assistance** for Bachelors, Masters and Doctoral programs. **Awards are made up to \$6,000.00**.

#### **Honor Roll Award & Ceremony**

This program recognizes the academic work of employee children in 6th-12th grade. Students must achieve a 3.0 GPA. Recipients and their ohana are invited to attend the carnival and awards ceremony. Award recipients and their siblings can redeem carnival tickets for school supplies and a drawing is held for a Mac Book Pro and an Ipad. Each award recipient receives a cash award of \$150.00 for middle school and \$250.00 for high school students.

#### **Academic Merit Award**

This award was established to reward students achieving academic excellence for the dedication shown in their studies.

Unique to this award, students do not have to have significant financial need. To be eligible a student must maintain a <u>cumulative</u> GPA of at least 3.5. Awards are made at the end of each school year. High school graduates can receive a one-time \$500.00 award, while Higher Education students are awarded \$2,500.00 for each year they qualify.

#### **Work For College Match**

This award was established to provide incentive to students who are in the summer workforce while attending a higher education institution. This award rewards their hard work and dedication toward their education and is not based on need or tuition cost. Full-time students can submit verifiable summer employment earnings for hours worked between May and September to receive a cash Match of up to \$1,500.00. The Match earnings will be paid directly to the student's college/university and credited towards students' tuition and fees.

#### **Educational Opportunities Award**

This program supports personal, professional and vocational development for children and adults. The intent of the program is to enrich the employees' families and through them, their community. The coursework is relevant to the employees' current or new career path; for the child curriculum based programs, camps or class field trips qualify. Adults and children can both apply this award toward classes that create a greater understanding of Hawaiian culture and our island community. An award for on-island programs has an annual cap of \$1,000.00 per recipient while the award for off-island programs additionally supports transportation and accommodation with an annual cap of \$3,000.00. The typical award amount is 50% of the cost to attend the program within the designated cap.




