



Dogs on leashes are allowed in camp but not on the rides.



INFORMATIVE INFORMATION FROM THE KDHE REGARDING ALGAE BLOOMS

Harmful Algal Blooms, Horses, and You: Tips from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment

Algal blooms have been in the national news over the past year, creating more awareness on this subject than ever before. In particular, a persistent bloom affecting Lake Okeechobee, Fla.,

gained national attention as the toxic water was released from the lake into connected rivers and canal systems across southern Florida. Algal blooms impact not only the affected waterbodies, but also wildlife, tourism, and quality of life for those living on or near these waterways.

In Kansas, we also experience harmful algal blooms. During the 2018 recreation season, KDHE received validated complaints at 32 public lakes. Before taking the horses for a ride this summer, it is important to understand what a harmful algal bloom is, and how it can affect both you and your animals. In a recent article in *The Horse* magazine, Dr. Ensley from Kansas State University described how horses can be susceptible to harmful algal blooms¹.

As these notable instances of harmful algal blooms increase, you may be wondering what exactly they are and what impact they could have on you.

Cyanobacteria, also known as blue-green algae, are the culprit behind harmful algal

blooms (HABs) in Kansas. At times, cyanobacteria can reproduce very rapidly, creating a dense growth known as a bloom. These blooms primarily occur during the summer, where high temperatures and nutrient runoff from the land surrounding a waterbody can create the right conditions for a bloom. Some types of cyanobacteria produce toxins, which can be released when they become stressed and/or die. Some other types of algae can also produce harmful blooms; the famous marine "red tides," produced by overgrowth of red algae in oceans, are an important example.

Toxins from a HAB can affect the health of warm-blooded animals, including humans and our equine friends, pets, and livestock. In people, the symptoms of cyanobacteria poisoning depend upon the type of cyanobacteria toxin and route of exposure (e.g., swallowing water with the bloom, getting water on your skin, inhaling water while recreating). The clinical signs and symptoms of acute (sudden) cyanobacteria poisoning, in both animals and humans, are non-specific and can include: nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, cough, sore throat, rash, and liver damage². These toxins have been identified as the cause of several human illnesses, including two hospitalizations in 2011². These toxins have also been identified as the cause

of multiple animal deaths, mostly dogs, in the U.S. and Kansas³. Due to the large amount of water that larger animals like cows and horses consume, they are particularly at risk of exposure to high toxin levels. Ensure that your horses have access to a clean water source. Water affected by a harmful algal bloom will usually smell foul, and horses will typically not drink this water unless they have no other choice. Do not let any animal drink water or eat scum from a waterbody affected by a harmful algal bloom. If your horse or other animal has been in contact with a harmful algal bloom, immediately wash or rinse its body off with clean water, and call your veterinarian.

What can you do to protect your animals?

CHECK ADVISORIES

Before you head out to a public lake, check to see any current advisories at the Kansas HAB advisory website, http://www.kdheks.gov/algae-illness/, or call the harmful algal bloom hotline, 785-296-1664. KDHE operates a response-based program for public, recreational waters. When a member of the public suspects that a water body has a harmful algal bloom, an official complaint can be submitted on the website or the harmful algal bloom hotline. KDHE works with many partners – the Kansas Department of Wildlife, Parks, and Tourism, US Army Corps of Engineers, local lake managers, city utilities managers, and more, to investigate any complaints and to determine the need for advisory status.

BE AWARE

Because the state HAB program is response based, KDHE often relies on public information to help get the word out about harmful algal blooms. Detailed examples of harmful algal blooms and how to recognize them can be found on the KDHE HAB website. Generally, a harmful algal bloom will result in water that has a scummy, thick mat, is foamy, or looks like it has paint spilled on it. The water could be discolored red, pea-green, blue, blue-green, or brownish red, depending on the species of blue-green algae. If you are not sure whether it is a harmful algal bloom or not, it's best to follow the advice — "When in doubt, stay out!"

KEEP AN EYE ON PRIVATE PONDS

If your horses use a surface water source on private property, keep an eye out for the signs of a harmful algal bloom as described in the previous section. While KDHE does not monitor lakes on private properties, there are some measures you can take to monitor your own waterbody. If you are unsure whether a waterbody has a harmful algal bloom, you can perform a simple jar test. <u>Directions are on the KDHE HAB website</u>, but the idea behind the jar test is that most cyanobacteria float, while other forms of algae do not. For a small fee, water samples can also be tested at the <u>Kansas State Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory</u> for the presence of cyanobacteria. When a harmful algal bloom is present, the best course of action is to find an alternate source of water for your animals.

As the root cause of harmful algal blooms is excess nutrients, anything done to limit nutrient input will aid in the prevention of harmful algal blooms. These could include the addition of rain gardens and buffer strips to keep runoff from entering your waterbody. More information on the detection and prevention of harmful algal blooms can be found at the KDHE HAB website.

If your horse or other animal has been in contact with a harmful algal bloom, immediately wash or rinse its body off with clean water, and call your veterinarian.

TWO PARKS IN KANSAS DESIGNATED FOR EQUESTRIAN USE ONLY! WILD HORSE AT PERRY AND SADDLE RIDGE AT HILLSDALE!

For the horse campers out there, two Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks, State Parks are now designated for equestrian use, only. Meaning, non-equestrians may not reserve spots in Wild Horse Camp, Perry State Park (Lake Perry) or Saddle Ridge Campground, Hillsdale State Park (Hillsdale Lake). You must have a horse to camp in these areas as designated equestrian campground use only.

For reservations, please contact the respective park offices, Wild Horse Equestrian Camp is still listed on Reserve America.com.

You must contact the Hillsdale Park Office to reserve a campsite in the Saddle Ridge Equestrian Campground at Hillsdale State Park.

HILLSDALE STATE PARK INFORMATION HERE

Allowing only equestrians in these parks, is safer for everyone. Equestrians have limited, designated areas, and this helps to preserve them.

While visiting our State Parks, please don't litter on the trails. If you pack it in, pack it out.

And clean your pens prior to departing.
