










Map of Gardens

Welcome to the Crocker House Garden. Please take a look at the variety of plants and flowers within the garden. Every year the garden grows more beautiful. There is a garden exhibit at the back made from the actual Interurban Railway track that was torn up from S.B. Gratiot. The Michigan Transit Museum helped us install this exhibit with their knowledge of how the track would have actually been set.

The Butterfly Garden that was planted on the west side of the garden near the gazebo is becoming more established. The garden also contains a grind-stone from an old mill that was once along the Clinton River, some stones from the old Medea Hotel, a cornice from the old sadiron building, and an outbuilding made from the old Clinton Grove caretakers cottage.

Notice the memorial brick walk. It notes our supporters, memorials and awards.

MSUE Demonstration Garden

21885 DUNHAM RD, CLINTON TWP, MI 48036



In 1995, the idea of creating a demonstration garden site on the grounds of the MSU Extension at the VerKuilen Building was discussed at a meeting of MSUE Master Gardeners. This garden would communicate

research-based information and demonstrate environmentally sound garden practices to the community through Master Gardeners volunteer interactions.

A plan was established, set in motion and site preparation began in the fall of 1996. After the removal of an extensive lawn area, the creation of the garden circle was begun with raised beds of culinary herbs and perennial plantings.

In 2003, the wooden raised beds were replaced with concrete stack walls, metal edging was installed and crushed granite pathways were added to the site and they remain to this day. A Remembrance Garden was added with benches, planters, a trellis and a stone pathway.

Currently, the MSUE Demo Garden consists of several separate areas having their own unique characteristics and cultures.

These garden areas consist of a wide range of flowering plants of diverse shapes and sizes, color, textures and bloom times to create an earth-friendly habitat to attract and support pollinators from bees to butterflies and other beneficial insects from April through October.

Entrance Circle Garden—Perennials predominate in this garden with the addition of bulbs, annuals and shrubs.

These are examples of nectar and pollinator friendly plants that can be used in a residential landscape site. This is a formal type display garden which is designed to be low maintenance, using techniques and strategies to reduce the amount needed for watering, weeding, deadheading, pruning and plant division.

Garden of Lana Vaughan

Built in 2019 by the Vaughans, this 24 by 24 labyrinth is composed of over 800 hand laid bricks and four tons of rock path fill. The labyrinth is a classic seven ring Chartres pattern used for meditation and prayer. Unlike a maze, a labyrinth is designed to have one clear path in and the same reverse path out. This labyrinth is 1/10 of a mile.

Goldie locks, balloon flower, bleeding hearts, beth blue lemon, lime olive trees.

Gerbera daisies, trumpet, gardenia, raspberry bush, strawberry, clematis, roses, honeysuckle, lavender, geraniums, Calla lily, pansies, peonies, tomato and pepper plants, hostas and many more.

Be sure to check out the large pond with koi fish at this garden.

GERBERAL DAISIES

The large flower heads of these daisies have ray-like petals around a center disk of tiny green or black flowers. There are four different classes of gerbera daisies: a single flower, semi-double flower, double flowers, and spider flowers. Each class delineates the number, position, and type of petals.

Mrs. Mares Garden is a shade garden, on Grand Avenue, along with an awning garden. Shade tolerant plants include Ohio Spiderwort, zinnias, pearly everlasting, Canada anemone, cardinal flower, common milkweed, swamp milkweed and cup flowers.

On Southbound Gratiot Avenue are the Flag and Monarch Waystation Gardens along the trapezoid garden long the sidewalk. In those gardens, plants are showered with morning sunshine most days. Plants there include golden alexander, zig zag goldenrod, purple coneflower, bee balm, butterfly weed, prairie phlox, little bluestem, Solomon's seal, wild columbine, and a fan favorite – Celandine Poppy.

CELANDINE POPPY

These flowers are commonly called wood poppy and is an herbaceous plant in the poppy family. It is native to North America, where it is found in the eastern United States and Ontario. Its typical natural habitat is moist forests over calcareous rock, particularly in ravines.
