You may have noticed that at the top of this page it says that this is the 200<sup>th</sup> issue of the weekly newsletter. The present format—a two-paged single sheet as opposed to the old format of six pages folded in three parts—started with the outbreak of covid at the end of March 2020. It was originally intended to be merely a temporary replacement for the older newsletter and to provide weekly information about the Archdiocese of New York's response to the pandemic and, on the local level, about how our own parish was responding to it. Eventually, as the threat of covid seemed to diminish, I decided not to return to the previous format. Instead, I came to view the new-style newsletter as an opportunity for informing the parish about aspects of our Catholic faith and culture. For example, during the period 2020-2021 I devoted nearly a whole year to discussing the parts of the Mass, and this past year I spent several months on the topics of church architecture and the papacy. Of course, some newsletters are mostly just informational, like this one. In addition to whatever appears on the front page of the newsletter, the second page lists all the public Mass intentions, which have to be published. The drawback to the present two-page format is that there generally isn't room for anything else, like what is being offered in other parishes or in the archdiocese at large; but some of that information appears on the bulletin boards in the vestibules in the back of the church.

It takes a lot of time to come up with interesting topics to feature in the newsletter, and then to research and write about them. But it's a good exercise for me to reflect on some things that I already know and to discover some things that I didn't know. The response that I have received has been very positive, and I am grateful to those who have told me that they have learned something useful from my efforts. I'll keep at it as long as I can!

Not to forget: all the newsletters are available on our updated website.

This coming Monday, January 15<sup>th</sup>, is Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, a federal holiday. In observance of the holiday, the rectory will be closed all day, and the church will be closed soon after the 12:15 Mass.
