Pastor's Reflection

Lent... We are Here. What do we do now? I began the start of Lent preaching, like most pastors, about Adam and Eve tempted in the garden by the serpent and Jesus being tested in the desert for 40 days by the tempter. Both passages seem strange yet familiar to us. We know what it is like to want what we do not have. To covet, yet we cannot imagine a time before covetousness was nowhere to be found. We cannot imagine how we could be like Jesus, resisting the tempter 3 times, giving up all the power and the glory in the world for solitude with God. Yet here we are on this Lenten journey. I urge you to start with the heart. The heart both physically and emotionally, is a critical system. Physically, the heart keeps us alive, it pumps the blood throughout the body to keep oxygen and nutrients flowing through our veins and into our tissues. A hardened heart is the result of unhealthy eating or a genetic condition. When heart muscles thicken, the heart can no longer pump properly, and blood flow is blocked. This is clinically called Hypertrophic Cardiomyopathy.

Emotionally, we can also have a hardened heart. Years of decades of disappointment, and loss or disconnection to our wider neighbors can prevent our feelings from going out to others or even ourselves. Our emotional hear, therefore, focuses on the immediate, our won needs, because we do not have the energy to send the compassion flowing elsewhere.

We ended the first Sunday of Lent with worry stones shaped as hearts. These stones remind us to loosen our hearts grip even as we loosen our grip on the stone. We need a metaphorical anchor point to grasp onto as we loosen our hearts grip.

This is because loosening makes us vulnerable. Yes, it allows us to show other a ministry of presence during good and bad times. But it also opens our own insecurities and worries. Will we have enough emotional blood flow for ourselves? The heart reminds us of who loved us first. Jesus, who was tested, tempted, and ultimately sacrificed his very life that we may know love abundantly. Even as our hearts might remain hardened, Jesus 'heart is always open to us. His heart is always open for us to cling and hold onto. We physically cling to our worry hearts as we spiritually cling to Christ this Lenten season.

This reminds me of the next step. The next step once we have opened our hearts and the veins have begun to flow again thanks to our gentle Savior, is to reach out. To reach out not only to God and the Spirit but also to others. After natural disasters, our first response is to reach out. This is also our response when it is fire or other community disaster. We know this through our own response as a church and a community, giving support through Rise Up to the family who lost their belongings and even a beloved dog to a fire in Lake Telemark. Reaching out is easy, it requires only an extended hand. We shake the hand of a neighbor; we embrace a close church friend. We might extend a wave to an acquaintance across the street. Yet, emotionally reaching out is more challenging. It requires vulnerability. It requires courage and trust. Trust not only towards who we are reaching out to but also towards ourselves and our own ability.

Openheartedness, however, is the beginning of blessings. When we loosen our grip and open our hears, we begin to be receptive to God's blessings. Not that they were not there all along. We just couldn't see them clearly with our hearts shut. When we do begin to see them, it is like cracking open a geode. Cracking open a geode and seeing the glorious amethyst crystals, the glory of our Redeemer. We begin to receive the truth disclosed not just as facts but a genuine encounter with the Christ of Holy Week, the Christ of Passion. When we do not resist, hard rock leads to soft radiant crystals. May we continually seek Jesus to transform us this Lenten journey as we continue to walk the path to the cross of Good Friday and the empty tomb of Easter morning.
