Stigmatine Father Robert White, pastor of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Parish in Springfield, celebrates 50 years in the priesthood, 22 years here with Mt. Carmel and his 70<sup>th</sup> birthday.

He arrived at Mt Carmel Church, in Springfield back in 2001. Spending his earlier years growing in in the Eastern part of Mass (Malden, Boston) he had little if any knowledge of the Springfield area. "I didn't know a soul when I first got here. The first person I actually met and actually befriended me was Nick DeCesare. Father Russo took me golfing to get involved in the community and Nick welcomed me warmly and made me feel comfortable right away. " As Father White came to know more and more parishioners and neighborhood residents, he found that they all shared the same open and welcoming character that Nick showed. Folks would come up to me after Mass and in the community and introduce themselves to me and offer to assist support in any way that was needed. "When I tell visiting priests to expect that interactions, they all look at me and that doesn't really happen, to which I assure them it really does. They are soon surprised as that very thing unfolds in front them and they marvel at the open embrace of the community.

During his early years father White as assigned to the Stigmatine offices in Rome. From that station he traveled to South Africa and witnessing Apartheid firsthand. Then on to Chile where he found himself in the middle of the attempted ouster of President Pinochet !

Recently he was honored at the opening of the Western Massachusetts Consulate of Italy Office at Monarch Place in Springfield, Monday, April 24. "We are thrilled to be able to present this letter which we decided to write on behalf of the Italian community," said Arnaldo Minuti, counsel general of Italy in the Boston office, who gave the letter to Father White. He thanked Father White for his dedication to the Italian-American community in Springfield. Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Parish was built by Italian immigrants in 1907. "Father, I am sure to interpret the sentiment of the Italian-American community here in Springfield and I would like to acknowledge your presence and your service in the last 22 years to the Italian community, helping them, of course in the religious side of the soul, but not only in that part of people's lives, but in the service," Minuti said. "We are so honored Father White has been a spiritual leader in the Italian-American community. For many, many years, he was an advocate for Italian-Americans," said Springfield Mayor Sarno.

"The original immigrant community, and now the children and grandchildren of those original immigrants, maintain that relationship with Italy. Many return back there. They visit, they have family relationships. It's important culturally," Father White said. Father went on to say that "while many of the original Italian community have moved away, from the South End, many maintain ties to Mt.Carmel Church. They come back for christenings, baptisms, confirmations, weddings and funerals."

A Mass and celebration will be held for Father White's anniversary at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Parish May 28.

# Never Trust a Skinny Italian

#### What You Need

- 1/3 cup olive oil
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 5 large tomatoes, cut into 1-inch chunks
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1 (14-ounce) can artichoke hearts, drained, cut in half
- 1 (2.5-ounce) can sliced black olives, drained
- 1/4 cup sliced fresh basil
- 1 pound angel hair pasta

#### What to Do

- In a large skillet over medium-high heat, heat oil; cook onion 5 minutes. Add tomatoes, garlic, salt, and pepper and cook 8 to 10 minutes, or until tomatoes are broken down, stirring occasionally. Add artichokes, olives, and basil and cook 3 to 5 minutes, or until heated through.
- 2. Meanwhile, in a large pot of boiling water, cook pasta 4 to 5 minutes, or until tender; drain. Place pasta on large platter, top with tomato mixture, and serve.

Notes

- Sprinkle with grated Parmesan cheese just before serving.
- Here's some warm and crusty garlic bread to sop up all the extra springtime goodness!

- 1. The Italian flag is green, white, and red, symbolizing hope, faith, and charity.

- 3. The name 'Italy' ('Italia') most likely means 'calf land'. Originally it was spelled 'Vitalia', originating from the Latin 'vitulus', meaning 'a one-year-old calf'.
- 4. The first bank in the world started in Italy in 1149. The first real bank was created during the Middle Ages in Italy thanks to the fast expansion of the Maritime Republics. One of these was Genoa, where the Banco San Giorgio in Genoa was founded in 1149.
