This fire destroyed a \$500,000 home on the Arterberry Ranch in De Luz Canyon. Flames left only a chimney made of rock. The fire also destroyed a \$100,000 racing car and some outbuildings

The 830-acre ranch is

owned by Dr. William Arterberry of Los Angeles. Mrs. Arterberry left the

ranch home with nine other people late Tuesday night and when she returned only the rock chimney was standing on the premises. The racing car was charred wreckage.

The fire has burned over 10,000 acres of brush and

grass and is now burning

within 11 miles of Lake Elsinore in Riverside County. In all, nine structures have burned and numerous citrus trees in groves located within the fire area have been

lost.

More than 1,000 men are on the fire line, according to John Thurman of the state Forestry Division, who is su-

Equipment on the fire lines included 47 trucks, three helicopters and 17 bulldozers cutting out fire breaks.

Yesterday 10 aerial tankers bombed the fire with chemical retardants at the rate of 20,000 gallons an hour, a state forestry information officer said.

The spokesman said there appeared to be about five miles of open fire line and that the most westerly section was burning near the Margarita lookout station on the San Diego County side.

out that the fire fighters were hampered by Santa Ana winds gusting from 15 to 20 miles an hour, humidity of 15 per cent and over 100 degree daytime temperatures.

He estimated the fire as about 45 per cent contained with full containment esti-

mated at around 6 p.m. tomorrow. 2 PENDLETON FIRES

Two other brush and grass fires were burning out of control on the Marine base at Camp Pendleton.

One fire started Monday afternoon on the northwest section of the base and has burned about 12,000 acres. Information officers at the base said the fire was started by a flare used in a training exercise. No structures have been burned and no buildings are in the vicinity.

The other fire on the Pen-

dleton base started yesterday afternoon at Camp Las Pulgas. It was started when a generator exploded. No one was injured. The number of acres burned over has not been determined and containment is expected early today, a Marine spokesman said. Both fires were being fought by civilian firemen at the base.

FIRE CONTAINED

Still another brushfire that started Monday afternoon in San Pasqual Valley has been contained after burning more than 4,000 acres, a state forestry information officer said.

The fire was contained after it burned over 4,000 acres and damaged some groves in the area.
