Woicik subsequently allowed Guy to testify, but at the conclusion of his testimony again found Guy guilty of crossing over the double line on the narrow, winding road and suspended the \$15 fine.

Guy claimed that the width of the road was insufficient to allow him to remain at normal speed and stay to the right of the line.

In another section of the trial transcript. Wojcik addressed Guy as if he was an attorney representing the defendant, asking him "You want to put him on trial, then?"

"I'm not putting anybody on trial," Guy replied. "I'm the defenant on trial here." "That is over with."

the defendant on trial any

more."

"I have a ticket with my name on it, and I'm the one who is alleged to have commited a crime," Guy replied. "My name is Arthur D. Guy, and I'm the defen-

dant." "Who is this man?" Woicik asked.

"He's the court report-

er," Guy replied. "Oh, for god's sake, My apology. Okay, you are representing yourself? . . . My apologies again. I didn't even know he (the court reporter) was here."
