Glimpses of the Past In San Diego's Life

The Union twenty years ago today (February 23, 1897,) said:

"A sailor, half-seas over, got aboard of a rig left standing near the First Congregational Church Sunday evening, and took a cruise that ended in Stingaree. The horse and buggy belonged to Charles A.
