Vernal Pool Monitoring

Citizen Science Wetland Monitoring Project Completed

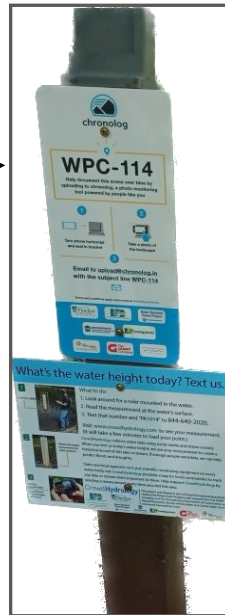
The Friends of Pinchot State Park (FOPSP) recently completed a project in partnership with the York County Master Watershed Stewards (MWS) to expand opportunities for citizen science monitoring of small vernal pool wetlands in the park. Trained volunteers and park staff will continue to monitor the

health of these wetlands as they have in the past, but their efforts will be enhanced with contributions from the new citizen science stations. **Any park visitor now has the opportunity to help care for these wetlands by interacting with the trailside monitoring stations as they explore the trails of the park!**

Eight **citizen science stations** were installed next to vernal pools located near hiking trails in the park. Each station consists of a wooden post with two informational signs explaining how to take a landscape photo and a water depth reading of the pool and submit them to our monitoring projects via text or email.

Additionally, a total of seventeen United States Geological Survey (USGS) **water level staff gauges** were installed; the gauges, which look like big rulers, have been placed in the deep end of each pool and will help to measure the depth of the water in each wetland as it changes throughout the year.

We would like to acknowledge our esteemed volunteers and partners who made this project possible...

Over the last six months, volunteers have contributed the following to the Gifford Pinchot State Park vernal pool monitoring and citizen science station projects:

- 131 volunteer equivalents (28 volunteers participating across 27 work days)
- 314 hours of effort and 1,777 miles of travel, donated through participation in work days at the park—a contribution valued at \$11,136.79!
- 2 community vernal pool walks—providing outdoor, hands-on education for 29 people

Remembering Jim Merlino, Founding FOPSP Board Member

We are saddened to announce the unexpected passing of Jim Merlino, a founding member of the Friends of Pinchot State Park. Jim served as our chairman for nine years from 2009 to 2017. After a one-year hiatus, he returned as a regular board member for an additional three years from 2019 to 2021.

During his years at the helm of the FOPSP, Jim worked with park management to install four new playgrounds, add new park benches, and replace aging picnic tables. He faithfully helped with a variety of FOPSP fundraisers and workdays, especially preparing firewood for sale in the campground. Jim helped organize and implement projects to improve trails



for hikers and habitats for wildlife. He supported the park's environmental education programming, our first native plant sale, and Pinchotween, the much-anticipated park event of the fall season.

In addition to his commitment to the local community, we remember Jim for his love and devotion to his family. Volunteerism in the park was often a Merlino family affair. Jim and his wife, Kim spent many summers hosting in the campground from campsite #293. Jim's older son, Kevin also served on the Friends of Pinchot board.

We will dearly miss Jim's sense of humor and the effortless way he had of putting people at ease! It was an honor to work with Jim and we are grateful for his contributions to the park, which will continue to enrich the lives of visitors for years to come.

As a veteran who served in the Vietnam War, Jim was laid to rest in the Indiantown Gap National Cemetery in Lebanon County, Pennsylvania.

Wild Pinchot

Wild Geranium and Its Personal Bee

As the heady rush of early spring wildflowers fade, the next wave of blooms arrives with the lush green of late spring and early summer. Wild geranium (*Geranium maculatum*) is a late spring flower that is commonly encountered in the woodlands of Gifford

Pinchot State Park. It is easily recognized by its showy pink flowers and palmate leaves with five deeply cleft lobes. This wildflower attracts a variety of native bees, flies, butterflies, moths, beetles, and true bugs, which are nourished by its nectar, pollen, or foliage.

The life of one native bee in particular is closely bound to wild geranium. The miner bee known by its scientific name *Andrena distans*, is a specialist pollinator that almost exclusively visits wild

geranium to gather nectar and pollen to feed itself and its young. **This uncommon bee is currently known from seven counties in Pennsylvania, but has not yet been reported for York County.**

So, if you see a little fuzzy black bee with white stripes on its abdomen visiting a wild geranium flower, get a close-up picture and share it with us, or post it on a site like iNaturalist!

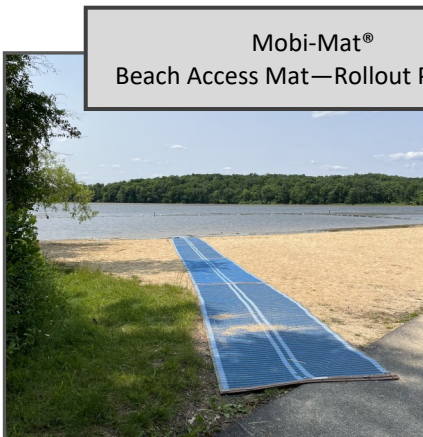
Membership contributions and donations along with sales from firewood and Friends of Pinchot merchandise have provided funding for these improvements.

Wildflower Walks

The Friends of Pinchot hosted several wildflower walks this past April and May. The 1-1/2 hour woodland strolls started at the Sunnyside Pavilion, located in Conewago Day Use Area, and continued along neighboring trails. (**Actual route is noted on the next page!**) Attendees were provided with a wildflower checklist for personal notes. Hike guides (Friends/volunteers) helped to identify wildflowers and also shared interesting information (fun facts!) helpful in the identification of Pinchot's wildflowers, trees, and plants.

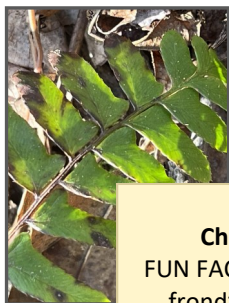
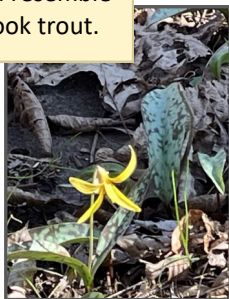
It was a gorgeous day for the first spring wildflower walk at GPSP for 2023. Early arrivals were greeted by the graceful flyover of a bald eagle whose white feathers glowed as the early morning sunlight highlighted them. Twelve visitors were presented with a wonderful display of colorful blooms. This year's first walk had a significant variety of flowers blooming, including the tail end of blooms of spicebush, bloodroot, and round-lobed hepatica. The full array of

blossoms were just starting and included spring beauties, early saxifrages, redbuds, rue anemones, Virginia bluebells, yellow trout lily, yellow/white/blue violets, pussytoes, Bluets (Quaker ladies), marsh marigolds, buttercups, Dutchmen's breeches, and trillium—including one dark red and one light red/pink. Along with these, we were greeted by some early emergence of wild pinks, field chickweed, Jacks-in-the-pulpit, and several different ferns

pushing their fronds. Our walk would not have been complete without the appearance of the only skunk cabbage on the walk. The Virginia bluebells were hosting a wide array of native pollinators including several bumble bees and European honey bees. We also observed some very active digger bees and several turtles sunning themselves on the turtle platforms in the cove at Boat Mooring #3.

FUN FACT: Named for the mottled leaves which resemble the markings on brook trout.

FUN FACT: Named for the frond's similarity to a Christmas stocking and its winterlong green hue.



Dutchman's Breeches

FUN FACT: Named for the flower's resemblance to (upside-down!) white trousers/pantaloon.

FUN FACT: Named for the blood-red sap found in the roots.



Trillium

FUN FACT: Named for 3 sets of 3: petals/sepals (petal-supports)/leaves.

The typical “Wildflower Walk” spring route starts in Conewago Day Use Area at the Sunnyside Pavilion and continues to Alpine Trail, follows east to Midland Trail, turns right onto Fern Trail and follows to the intersection with Lakeside Trail and heads northeast (left) to the junction with Boulder Point Trail and returns to Lakeside

Trail and heads west, back to Conewago Day Use Area. While traversing these trails in the spring, be sure to watch for “Blacky” the black snake at the top of the hill near the intersection of Midland and Fern Trails. “Blacky” has been spotted at this site during at least one wildflower walk for three consecutive years!

Souvenir Patch Contest

In 2021, the Friends added souvenir patches to the park merchandise available for purchase, to be redesigned annually for collectors. The Friends enlist community help in designing the yearly patch by hosting an annual photo contest.
