## A Message from the Helm

Hello Ebony Boat Club,

March is National Women's Month, and I would like to commemorate Retired United States Four-Star Admiral, Michelle Janine Howard. Admiral Howard served as Commander of **United States Naval Forces** Europe while concurrently commanding the United

States Naval Forces Africa and Allied Joint Force Command Naples, Italy. Prior to that she served as the 38th Vice Chief of Naval Operations.

Howard has an extensive resume filled with many historical firsts during her highly impressive naval career. She was the first African American woman to command a United States Navy ship, the USS Rushmore (1999), and the first to become a Two Star General and Three Star General. In 2006, she was selected for the rank of Rear Admiral, making her the first Admiral selected from her U S Naval Academy class of 1982 and the first female graduate of the United States Naval Academy selected to be a flag officer. Howard was appointed Vice Chief of Naval Operations, the second highest ranking officer in the navy July 1, 2014. After she was sworn in Howard became the highest-ranking woman in U S Military history, and the highest ranking African-American and woman in U S Navy history. Howard also became the first female four-star admiral to command operational forces, when she assumed command of United States Naval Forces Europe and Naval Forces Africa. She was also the first black woman to command an expeditionary strike group at sea, where she made her mark on a global stage.

In 2009, she led the Virginia Beach based Expeditionary Strike Group 2 when it was deployed off the coast of Africa. The Norfolk, Virginia based cargo ship Maersk Alabama had been boarded by Somali pirates who held its captain aboard a life raft for ransom. It was Howard's job to set the cargo ship captain free. That was an eye-opening event for her. She was in command of several groups including naval air, vessels and a Seal Team. Everyone in the world was focused on one American. Admiral Howard made sure he didn't end up on shore in Somalia. The dramatic film "Captain Phillips" starring Tom Hanks was made after the incident. Admiral Michelle Howard became the first woman to become a four-star admiral in the

Navy in 2014, and named Vice Chief of Naval Operations, which made her the second highest officer in the Navy. Howard retired from the Navy in 2017 after

completing her

last assignment as the Commander of Naval forces in Europe and Africa.

## THE PORT/FLEET CAPTAIN

Ahoy there Mates

I was recently asked if there was a standard procedure for communicating on the water. The two I would like to share in this issue are (1) standard procedure for nonemergency calls and (2) "request for bridge opening".

The standard procedure for a non-emergency call such as calling another vessel, marina, or restaurant to ask where to tie up for dinner, is as follows.

You should call the vessel, marina or restaurant on channel 9 or 16 in the following manner.

- Name of station being called, spoken three times.
- •. The words "THIS IS", spoken once.
- Name of your vessel and call sign (if you have a station license) or boat registration number, spoken once.
- The word "OVER".
- Then you wait for the station being called to answer

Their answer should be in the same manner as your call.

- Once answered you should suggest going to a working channel to carry on your conversation.
- Finish your statement with the word "OVER".
- Wait for reply or confirmation from the station being called, switch to the agreed working channel to complete your transmission.

**Calling Station:** "Please switch and listen channel 68, OVER."

**Responding Station:** "Switching channel 68, OVER." You would then switch to channel 68 and call vessel or marina using the same procedure and conduct your

business. All conversations whether on a hailing channel or a working channel should be kept short and to the point.

**Approaching a Draw Bridge** is simular with a few differences. Remember, you are requesting a bridge operator to stop traffic in both directions, long enough for you to cross under. Be polite to the bridge operator. Being rude and unpleasant could create a greater delay.

As you approach the bridge look for a blue sign with what looks like a telephone receiver with a lightning bolt through it. This will give you the radio frequencies that the bridge monitors (usually 16 and 13 or 9)

**Before calling in,** make sure you double check the name of the bridge you want to pass under. If you mix up the name of the bridge, the operator may not acknowledge you.

Use the procedure on the left to acknowledge the bridge operator. After being acknowledged by the bridge operator tell the operator you are requesting passage, OVER.

You may have to travel this way again so don't forget to thank the Bridge Operator. You also don't need to switch stations.

When approaching a bridge at night you will see three red lights in a triangular pattern. The two lower lights indicate the bridge opening just above water level and the center light hangs from the center of the bridge span. If you line up with the center light and keep the relative relationship of the lower lights equidistant on either side you can be assured that you are in the center.





## THE PARLIAMENTARIAN

Hello EBC,

Praying that this newsletter finds everyone in good spirits....no pun intended.

Here's this month's try it at home beverage "Sloe Gin Fizz." There's a variety of ways of making it. I decided to give you a little history along with the England way of making it. Enjoy!

Sloes are tiny berries that grow wild in hedgerows around England. Unpleasantly astringent on their own, they are popular in sweetened jams and preserves, and they develop a rich, tart flavor when infused in gin. Naturally, enterprising distillers have been incorporating them into liquor since the 17th century. The spirit takes on the essence and bright color of the berries, and then sugar is typically added to counter the fruits tartness. Whats left is not technically gin, but actually a gin based liqueur. To experience the authentic flavor of sloe berries, use a British style sloe gin, such as Plymouth, Hayman's or Sipsmith. Most sloe gins are less boozy than their unflavored counterparts, and it's common for them to clock in around 25% to 30% ABV.

The British traditionally used sloe gin in wintry drinks, but it's become most famous for its turn in America's refreshing Sloe Gin Fizz, where its paired with club soda, citrus and simple syrup. This synergistic combo yields a cocktail that is sharp and quaffable, with sloe gin's characteristic reddish purple hue. The Sloe Gin Fizz is a breezy take on the classic Gin Fizz, which uses a not sloe variety as its base.

While most Gin Fizzes employ egg white for a silky texture and creamy head, the sloe version often skips this protein packed ingredient. However, that doesn't mean you have to. If you'd like to add egg white to your drink, simply shake all the ingredients without ice to emulsify the egg with the liquids, then shake again with ice to chill the drink. You'll be left with the same refreshing cocktail you know and love, but one that's sporting a richer body and thicker head.

Another easy way to experiment with the cocktail is by splitting the base between sloe gin and dry gin. This results in a cocktail that walks the line between a Gin Fizz and Sloe Gin Fizz, with milder berry notes and a fainter color but one that still features the same easy drinking sensibility.



Sloe Gin Fizz

#### Ingredients & Steps


- 1 1/2 ounces sloe gin
- · 1 ounce lemon juice, freshly squeezed
- 3/4 ounce simple syrup
- · Club soda, to top
- · Garnish: lemon wedge
- Garnish: cherry
- Add the sloe gin, lemon juice and simple syrup into a cocktail shaker with ice, and shake until well-chilled.
- Fill a highball or Collins glass with ice, and strain the contents of the shaker into the glass.
- · Top with the club soda.
- · Garnish with a lemon wedge and a cherry.

By the time the corona virus is over, everyone will have the knowledge to be a bar tender. Please drink responsibly and never drink and drive.

Hello EBC and all the ships at sea,



# A Message From : SAFETY & TRAINNING OFFICER

Greetings EBC family, I hope that this message finds you well.

For the March newsletter safety topic, I would like to focus on the need for every boater to file a float plan before you begin a trip to wherever you need to go.

A float plan is an added measure of safety to let a reliable person that you can depend on, your intentions to where you're traveling to, your route, your estimated time of arrival to your destination and when you are to return. In the event that you do not return as stated in your float plan, the person holding your plans can then alert the appropriate rescue agencies needed to search for you.

It is also important to communicate to your designated person holding your float plans any change of plans or delays that may occur. You should also let that person know when you have returned to close your plan. If your plan holder reported to the rescue authorities that you are overdue, you should notify the rescue agencies of your safe return. ## New Boat Engine Cutoff Switch Law Goes Into Effect April 1, 2021

## Applies to boats less than 26 feet operating on plane or above displacement speed

SPRINGFIELD, Va., March 15, 2021 – There are new engine cutoff device wear requirements for recreational boat operators as part of the January 1, 2021, passage of National Defense Authorization Act that included a U.S. Coast Guard Reauthorization. These devices, commonly referred to as engine cutoff switches (ECOS), are designed to prevent a boat-strike injury if an operator is accidentally ejected overboard while underway.

Engine cutoff devices can be located at the helm of the boat or on the tiller or body of an outboard engine and typically connect a boat's operator to the cutoff switch with a lanyard. Some ECOS devices eliminate the lanyard and rely on wireless proximity devices to shut down an engine if the operator goes overboard. Effective April 1, 2021, the new law requires vessel operator to use either a helm or outbor lanyard or wireless ECOS on certain vessels lethan 26 feet when traveling on plane or abordisplacement speed. These vessels include (1) borthat have a functioning engine cutoff device install at the helm or on an outboard engine or has wireless ECOS, or (2) boats manufactured beginni January 2020. The Coast Guard increased to number of boats required to have ECOS install after this date in an effort to reduce boating accider and fatalities.

Exceptions to the ECOS requirement include if t main helm of the vessel is in an enclosed cabin or t vessel is not operating on plane or at displacement speed. Low-speed activities such as fishing docking do not require use of an ECOS. The vest operator is also exempt if the boat's motor product less than 115 lbs. of static thrust – or about the si of a 2-hp engine.

The new law applies to all federally navigal waterways. As this is a federal law, states do r have the ability to enforce the new ECOS regulati — though seven states (Alabama, Arkansas, Illino Louisiana, Nevada, New Jersey and Texas) curren have their own ECOS laws. BoatUS expects mostates to amend their regulations to match fede law over the coming years. While boat operate who fail to follow the new requirement could face \$100 civil penalty for the first offense, BoatI expects the U.S. Coast Guard's initial focus will education. Boaters are encouraged to check the U.Coast Guard website for additional information this new use requirement and other safety regulatic and recommendations.

"BoatUS supports responsible use of cutoff device and wants to get the word out to boaters to be away of this new requirement so they can prepare," so BoatUS Manager of Government Affairs Day Kennedy. "We believe the new requirement allow recreational boaters to operate their vessels in practical manner while increasing boating safety." Kennedy suggests that boat operators double che to see that their engine cutoff switch is working a begin the season by getting into a good habit wearing it.

The roots of many phrases and words we use every day can be traced to a life afloat. Here's a smattering of nautical sayings that have come ashore over the years.

## A cup of Joe

The nickname for coffee came about due to the reforms initiated in 1913 by Josephus Daniels, then secretary of the United States Navy under President Woodrow Wilson.

One such reform was the elimination of the officers' wine mess, a policy received less than enthusiastically by many. Since that time a cup of the strongest drink allowed on board U.S. naval ships has been referred to as "a cup of Joe."

## <u>Bigwigs</u>

Strangely enough, this is one bit of seafaring lingo that pretty much means what it says. Senior officers of Britain's Royal Navy at one time actually did wear bodaciously large wigs after the style of the day.



#### **Bootleg**

This term for the smuggling of illegal liquor was derived from the sailors' ruse of bringing in contraband by hiding it in the tops of the sea boots.

### Carry a bone in her teeth

Phrase used to describe a ship sailing fast enough to foam the water in front of her bow.

#### Crow's nest

Name for the highest lookout station aloft, a term most likely derived from the old Norse practice of bringing cages of ravens aboard to assist in navigation. If the navigator was in doubt as to the direction of the nearest landfall, the cage was hoisted aloft, and a raven released. The bird invariably headed for land, the navigator noted the direction of flight, and plotted accordingly. Best guess is the lookout stationed aloft likely shared his perch with the feathered members of the crew from time to time, thus the name!

#### Duffel

A sailor's personal belongings (normally referring to his clothing) as well as the sea bag of coarse woolen fabric used to carry and stow them in. The name probably originated from the Flemish town of Duffel (near Antwerp) where the cloth was made.

#### **Footloose**

Uninhibited or spontaneous. The bottom of a triangular sail is called the foot, and a "loose-footed sail" is one attached fore and aft, but unsecured along the boom itself and able to dance freely in the wind if the clew (aft end) is freed.

#### **Dungaree**

Webster's Dictionary once defined dungaree as "a coarse kind of fabric worn by the poorer class of people and also used for tents and sail." While we probably couldn't picture our favorite pair of jeans hanging from the yardarm, discarded sailcloth (which was not dyed blue, nor was as well-woven as today's fabric) was often utilized by sailors to make items such as work clothes and hammocks. In fact, it was standard practice for captains in both the

American and British navies to exaggerate the amount of sail lost during a battle in order to provide the crew with material. The cloth was called dungaree (from the Hindi word dungri), and the name became synonymous with the clothes themselves.

#### **Gamming**

A "gam" was a mutual visit between the crews of whaling ships when they happened to meet abroad. It was there the latest news and gossip was exchanged and yarns were spun amid plenty of song, dance, food, and drink. The word "gam" came from whaleman slang for a pod of whales.

### Hard up

Destitute, fallen on hard or trying times, this is derived from "hard up the helm," an order to place the tiller as far to windward as possible during difficult weather, thus turning the ship's head away from the wind so she might ride easier.

#### But Why Is It Called The 'Head'?

The forward-most part of the ship was originally known as the "bows" or "beakhead" after the ram on the bow of a fighting galley (think beak as in bird of prey). During the Medieval period, the bows evolved into a raised castle-like structure from which archers (and later fighting musketeers) could fire down upon the enemy during battle, which is where the name forecastle (or fo'c'sle) is derived.

Over time, the forecastle devolved into basically a work platform covered with open grating. Due to the continuous flushing action of the sea and its location (which allowed the wind coming forward to carry the smell forward, too, away from the ship), this is where the lavatories or "seats of ease" came to be located, these being nothing more than benches built over holes cut into the grating.

Those who used them were fully exposed to both the elements and the ship's company with at least one Spanish traveler describing with mock sentiment the lovely views afforded the crew of the moon and planets, as well as the tarred ropes (which serve the same purpose as the corncob in rural America) and those impromptu washings provided by the waves. Thoughtful captains often had safety netting strung around the entire area, as it was not uncommon for patrons caught off guard to be washed overboard by larger seas. They could be busy places too, as a typical 18th century man-of-war possessed only six seats of ease for a crew of roughly 800.

#### Hunki dori

Commodore Matthew Perry's historic visit to Japan in July 1853 began an era of openness and commercial intercourse between east and west. Yokohama was one of Japan's busiest ports at the time, and the main street of the waterfront district, Honki-dori, became famous for its ability to provide an abundance of pleasures to sailors while in port.


While Honki-dori was relatively straightforward and easy to navigate, the winding side streets and back roads were not only confusing but potentially dangerous to unwary sailors (particularly those of the inebriated persuasion) who often fell victim to robbery or worse. Advice was if you stayed on Honki-dori you could probably find everything you desired in relative safety, hence the street name association with everything being OK.

## IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR EBC MEMBERS



As COVID-19 continues to devastate our community here in the East Bay, many families are also struggling to pay funeral costs for loved ones lost during this pandemic.

I have good news to share—after almost a year of inaction from the Trump administration, we are finally able to deliver critical relief for families in need.

FEMA is now authorized to grant up \$2 billion in funeral expenses. Families who have lost a loved one to COVID-19 can be reimbursed up to \$7,000 in funeral assistance retroactively to January 2020. This relief is available to anyone in the country regardless of immigration status.

Those interested in participating in the program will need expense documentation, a death certificate, and other personal information documents.

I'm proud to have partnered with Congresswoman Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez on this crucial relief measure for families in California and across the country already beset by unimaginable grief.

No one should struggle to afford a proper funeral for a loved one. During this time of unprecedented pain and economic hardship, it's a moral imperative that the federal government step in and provide relief. While the details for this plan are still evolving, I will be reaching out with more information as it becomes available.

We have received several orders and we will be working very hard to get those out to you as soon as possible. So if you need something from the boatique please let us know.



That was one of her few luxuries. We may not have had the best clothes or car but we ate well. Below is a southern dessert that was a special treat. There are several ways to make this. 
## SOUTHERN BUTTER ROLLS

2 Crescent dough rolls
½ cup sugar
1 tablespoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice
1 cup soft butter
1 pint half and half
1 cup sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 tablespoon rum or bourbon

Heat oven to 360 degrees. Roll the pastry out being careful to keep in one piece. Spread one half of the soft butter over the dough. Mix spices in a small bowl. Sprinkle one half over the buttered dough. Roll the dough into a log and cut into 1 inch slices. Repeat with second package of dough. Butter a 13x9x3 baking dish place slices in a single layer. Heat the milk add sugar stir until sugar dissolves add vanilla and rum or bourbon. Mix well Pour over rolls. Cook for 30-40 minutes. Cool before serving. The aroma in the house is amazing, warm and so inviting. Enjoy.



ASU senior LeeAndra Matthews has been involved with the Nonprofit Leadership Alliance Student Association since the first semester she transferred here from a college in California.

Along with fellow NLA student Meredith Clements, Matthews was recently awarded a 2021 Career Development Award from the national Nonprofit Leadership Alliance. The award pays for some of her living expenses while she completes an internship this summer, the final component of the program. "In my last semester I took a leap and I applied for the internship scholarship, just because I know I have financial needs and I don't really know what my outcome may be for my internship, whether it'll be paid or not," she said. "I was really blessed to be awarded that scholarship." Matthews has completed all of her requirements for her Certified Nonprofit Professional certification except for the internship, which she has plans to complete this summer after she graduates from ASU. During her time with NLA, Matthews has been a part of countless workshops and seminars that have grown her as a future nonprofit professional.

A community, she said, "is really what I needed when I transferred here. I was really seeking a community that I felt comfortable with and identified with and I was really blessed to join this program." I've learned amazing things as far as like networking... and even when we went to our Alliance Management Institute, the AMI campaign, was honestly one of my greatest accomplishments and memories from my experience with the NLA."

The ongoing AMI fundraising campaign provides NLA students with hands-on experience as they raise money to attend a national conference, pitching donors directly on the investment in their futures. It can be nerve-wracking at first, but pushes students to grow outside of their comfort zone and gives them practical tools to fundraise for nonprofits.

The campaign is just another way that the NLA helps to prepare students for success in the nonprofit world as soon as they graduate. The campaign has raised up to \$30,000 in some years - all raised by students. "I cry every time I talk about it, but honestly I don't know where my educational journey would be if I wasn't involved." Matthews has also taken an interest in the personal finance classes offered by the program, and she said they have helped her a lot.

"The knowledge I've gained from this program is amazing... I can honestly say the greatest takeaway I have from this program is the hands-on experiences, like going to a nonprofit and actually participating in either volunteering or a program." After graduating, she plans to return to California and pursue her passion in the nonprofit sector: helping formerly incarcerated people get back on their feet.



## **Ebony Youth Foundation Scholarship**



The objective of the scholarship program is to encourage and assist talented students. The awards are aimed at providing a source of financial support for graduating high school students OR students currently enrolled in an accredited post-secondary institution. Relatives and associates of Ebony Boat Club members are also eligible for an Ebony Youth Foundation (EYF) scholarship if they meet the following requirements:

- Applicant must be a high school senior, have applied or have been accepted at a qualifying post-secondary institution (accredited college or university) or currently attending a qualifying post-secondary institution, and must have at a minimum a 2.00 (C) GPA.
- All applicants must submit a typed (all questions answered and signed)
   COMPLETE EYF application and include the following in your packet:
  - 1. Letter of acceptance from a qualifying post-secondary institution (accredited college or university);
  - 2. At least two (2) letters of recommendation describing the applicant's personality, integrity and leadership potential;
    - 1 must be from an Ebony Boat Club member
    - o 1 school official or community leader
  - Applicant must submit an <u>OFFICIAL</u> transcript in a sealed envelope.
  - 4. A photograph suitable for Inaugural Ball Program. If you are selected as a recipient of an Ebony Youth Foundation Scholarship Award your picture will only be used in the Inaugural Ball Program and the Ebony Boat Club's Beacon Newsletter.
- Completed application must be POSTMARKED BY JUNE 1, 2021
- All <u>FINALIST(S)</u> must participate in an oral interview with the Scholarship Selection Committee.






