Major General Jerome Gary Cooper, USMC (Ret)

Major General Jerome Gary Cooper, USMC (Retired), was called to be with the Lord on the morning of April 27, 2024. Gary was born on October 2, 1936, in Lafayette, Louisiana to Algernon J. Cooper, Sr. and Gladys Mouton Cooper, and was the oldest of six children.

Gen Cooper received his B.S. degree in Finance from the University of Notre Dame and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Marine Corps upon graduation in June 1958. Following graduation from The Basic School, he initially reported for duty with the 1st Marine Brigade in Hawaii. General Cooper served on active duty for 12 years, commanding a number of units, including the Marine Detachment aboard the Guided Missile Cruiser Chicago. In 1967, he became the first black officer in the Marine Corps to lead an infantry company into combat which is noted in the historical calendar of the Corps.

In Vietnam, General Cooper earned a number of decorations for heroism including the Bronze Star, two Purple Hearts for wounds received in ground action, and the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry three times. His other military decorations include the Distinguished Service Medal and the Legion of Merit.

He joined the Individual Ready Reserve in January 1970. As a reservist, he has commanded the 13th Force Reconnaissance Company in Mobile, the 4th Battalion, 14th Marines, 4th Marine Division, and a number of other mobilization assignments including Commanding General, Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, N.C. In 1988, he was promoted to Major General and returned to active duty as Director of Personnel, Headquarters, United States Marine Corps. He retired from the Corps in 1996.

In 1974, General Cooper was elected to the Alabama House of Representatives. He was one of the first African-Americans since the Reconstruction era elected to the Legislature from South Alabama. He was reelected in 1978 but resigned to serve in the Governor's Cabinet as Commissioner of the Alabama Department of Human Resources. In this Cabinet position, Commissioner Cooper managed a staff of over 4,000 and the largest agency budget in the State of Alabama.

President Bush, in 1989 appointed, and the U.S. Senate confirmed Mr. Cooper as the Assistant Secretary of the Air Force for Manpower, Reserve Affairs, Installations and the Environment. He participated in the planning of Operation Desert Storm. He served throughout the Bush Administration.

In 1994, President Clinton selected Gen Cooper to serve as the United States Ambassador to Jamaica.

He was selected Patriot of the Year by the Mobile Bay Area Veterans Commission and has been on a wide range of boards including, locally, the Mobile Bay Area Veterans Commission, and Veterans Memorial Recovery Team. Mr. Cooper faithfully served as Chairman of CNB Bancorp, Inc. until his retirement in 2022. In addition, he served on numerous other boards including, The Community Foundation of South Alabama, the American Friends of Jamaica, U.S. Steel, Inc., PNC Financial Services, GenCorp., Protective Life Insurance Co., and the Air University Board of Visitors. He was very proud to serve as the Chairman of the Board of Directors for Commonwealth National Bank, the first minority-owned National Bank in Alabama.

He is a member of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, 100 Black Men of Greater Mobile, the Montford Point Marine Association, the NAACP - Unit 5044, and the Marine Corps League. In addition, he was active in numerous other community organizations, especially those serving youth such as the Hope Boxing Academy.

The oath of enlistment is something that every service member must promise and adhere to for their entire military career. If you are entering as an officer you'll instead take the military oath of office.

From the oath, you can see that you will be defending the Constitution -- not a person. Discipline and accepting orders is sworn to. Finally, you vow to face the UCMJ (Uniform Code of Military Justice) should any disputes arise.

"I, _____ (SSAN), having been appointed an officer in the _____ (Military Branch) of the United States, as indicated above in the grade of ______ do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign or domestic, that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties of the office upon which I am about to enter; So help me God."

Elbert Wingfield, USMC, Vietnam Veteran

Elbert enlisted in the Marine Corps when he was 18 because President Kennedy said, "Think not what your country can do for you, but what you can do for your country." That stuck with him. Kennedy was killed and President Johnson said he needed men to go to war.

He served in Vietnam for 13 months. During that time, he served with the 27th Marine Combat Action Group in Vietnam. For his service, Elbert was awarded the Presidential Unit Citation, the Meritorious Unit Citation, the Vietnam Service Ribbon with 3 Bronze Stars, and the Vietnam Campaign Medal.

"War is hell. Freedom is not free. Vietnam was one of the toughest wars you could fight and when we came home no one cared about us. They called us baby killers. That has changed and most people are thankful they didn't have to go to that war to fight for their freedom." Wingfield recalled.


Elbert is a founder and member of the Black Military Workers of America, a founder and member of Chapter 33 of the Montford Point Marines, and is also a member of the South Alabama Veterans Council. Among Wingfield's support of the Mobile Child Advocacy Center and as a Board Member of the Mobile Cerebral Palsy Association. In 2006 he received the Small Businessman of the Year for his business, Saucy-Q-Bar-B-Cue. Elbert is well known for his support of veterans and in particular the SAVC.

After the war, he planned to get married, buy a house, and settle down in Mobile. It was also hard to find a job in Mobile, his mother lived in Philadelphia, PA so they moved there, married, and started a family. He got a job as a shoe salesman, became the top salesman and was promoted to the manager of the department and then the store. Then they told him he had made it as high as he could go. He learned how to cook from his grandmother and on weekends in Philadelphia, he cooked ribs, chicken, fish, and potato salad and everyone came over.

He packed up his family and moved back to Mobile and his wife, Jacquelyn, got her nursing degree. He started selling barbeque sauce at the flea market in 1998. The name Saucy Q Bar B Que came from the song 'Suzy Q.'

Saucy Q BBQ Restaurant has been the meeting place of the South Alabama Veterans Council for several years. The restaurant is owned by barbecue aficionado and Alabama native Elbert Wingfield, who says his family—Jacquelyn, Jarret, and Darnell—had three things in mind when starting the business: good service, a good attitude, and good food.

Elbert is thankful for the support of Mobile and believes in giving back to the community and customers. He served on a few non-profit boards and learned so much from working with the Child Advocacy Center. Over 50 years later, he still has nightmares about Vietnam. "God and my family make each day worth living." -Elbert Wingfield

Baldwin County Memorial Day Flag Relay Run

We are 4 weeks away from the 16th annual Memorial Day Flag Relay Run! The relay is set to take place on Monday, May 27 @ 7:00 AM.

Two runs will start simultaneously in two locations (this is to accomplish the route quicker and earlier in the morning). Route 1 will begin in Gulf Shores where HWY 59 intersects HWY 182 @ 7:00 AM and travel North bound. Route 1 will finish in Foley @ 9:20 AM where Beach Express intersects HWY 59. Route 2 will begin in Foley where Beach Express intersects HWY 59 @ 7:00 AM and travel North bound. Route 2 will finish @ 9:20 AM at Loxley Municipal Park.

The relay totals roughly 28 miles from Gulf Shores to Loxley. Groups of 3 runners will carry the American Flag and the Armed forces flag, handing the flags off every 3 miles to the next group of staged runners. Memorial signs featuring fallen heroes will mark the start points for each group of runners.

Although we regularly inspect containers as they enter our ports for safety and security, conducting a Multi-Agency Strike Force Operation (MASFO) helps us take things to another level!

This year we coordinated with several other agencies including Mobile County Sheriff's Office, ALEA, AL State Patrol, DOT, Customs and Border Patrol, TSA, National Cargo Bureau, and CGIS. We were also joined by members from other CG units whose assistance was greatly appreciated.


