

first floor forming the easternly building corner which is recessed. The entry is shielded by a hooded console which is positioned below the roof slope. A hipped roof dormer extends out from the roof slope. The walls are decorated with half-timbering. A small arched window is positioned in the center of this bay with the roof line forming a peak above the window.

#### 43. continued

the third owner was Bernie J. Kirsch. Charles Roult was residing at this address by 1959. The fifth owners, Charles E. and Sally J. Kopman, were residing at this address by 1963. Kopman was listed as being a lawyer with the St. Louis firm of Blumenfeld Kalishman, Tureen and Marx. By 1970 Howard I. and Margaret S. Sitkoff were residing at this address. Sitkoff taught at Washington University. The current owners were residing at this address by 1979.

Edward B. Kelley (A.I.A.) (1900 -?) came to St. Louis in 1921 to take a course in vocational training at St. Louis University School of Commerce and Finance through the Veterans' Bureau. He went on and studied at Brown's Business College and received a degree in architecture from Washington University. He began his career as a draftsman and worked for the Missouri Pacific Railroad's architectural department, and for architects William A. Caldwell, Jameson and Spearl, and T. L. Johnson (who designed most of the larger homes in University Hills). Kelley started his own architectural practice by 1926 with offices at 6625 Delmar. Later he moved his offices to St. Louis, and finally to 1111 Brentwood Boulevard.

Mr. Kelly was also employed with the Board of Public Service, collaborating in the writing of a new building code for University City. During World War I he designed small arms plants for other architectural and engineering agencies and worked as a tool designer for the Emerson Electric Company. He was project architect at Jefferson Barracks Army Post for Mauran, Russell, Crowell and Mulgardt and the United States Army Corps of Engineers, Kansas City Division.

After the war Kelley again began his private practice. He collaborated in the development of the City of St. Ann and associated structures. He has designed fine residences, churches, schools and other public and private structures.





consists of a street-facing gable, with the entry nestled within the roof slope. The two-story windows consist of nine casement windows (three sizes) decorated with diamond-shaped panes. The gable end is accented with a small three-sided oriel window. The left bay contains a four-sectional ribbon window (casement) with individual four-lighted transoms. The second-floor contains a triple, double-hung ribbon window with six-over-six lights. The roof line is cut out over this window forming a shed roof. A chimney is located on the west facade; centered.



with smooth ashlar lintels and lugsills. The left bay (first floor) contains a paired double-hung window with diamond-shaped panes on the upper sashes. This window is accentuated with a smooth ashlar lintel and lugsill. The gable end contains a rectangular-shaped louvered vent. Horizontal siding is positioned at gable end. The right bay contains two arched doors on the first floor. A brick rowlock band of arches outline the doors. The second story contains three single double-hung windows (same size) with diamond-shaped panes in the upper sashes. The window heads are decorated with a patterned brick course (three brick courses laid on the vertical and three on the horizontal consecutively). The second floor contains a decorative gable which is highlighted with half-timbering (stucco infill). Two single double-hung windows with diamond-shaped panes in upper sashes are centered to the right bay (second story). A king post extends below ridge (gable end) which is connected to two curved framing members. A raised terrace extends across the entry to the southeast corner of building. A chimney is positioned on the east facade, centered.



contains a centered attic window outlined with a brick rowlock course and keystone. The right bay, which is slightly recessed from the center pavilion is decorated with frame pilasters and a fanlight surround with cornice. A small fixed window, outlined with moulding is to the left of the door. The second floor (above entrance) contains a casement window decorated with a semi-circular transom. The projecting central pavilion contains an outside chimney on the east facade. An east wing (sleeping porches) projects out from the edge of the chimney. Both floors contain a three-sectional ribbon window.

Nolte & Nauman was an architectural firm consisting of Edward F. Nolte (1870-1944) and Fred Nauman. This firm designed more houses in University Hills than any other. Nolte opened his own office in 1896. He designed medium-sized houses, flats, and apartments during his earlier years including five houses in Parkview in partnership with Preston Bradshaw. Fred Nauman, who had previously worked as Nolte's draftsman, joined the firm as a partner around 1913. They continued in this partnership for twenty years. Nolte continued to practice alone until 1941. In University Hills, this firm primarily designed medium-sized dwellings (with high concentrations on Midvale, Warren and Purdue) which were commissioned by various real estate and investment companies. The larger houses that this firm designed in partnership with the George Bergfeld Real Estate Company (who commissioned Nolte & Nauman quite often) are 7260 Creveling (1926), 7281 Greenway (1927), 7257 Greenway (1928), 7228 Greenway (1930), 7272 Greenway (1927). Examples of their partnership can be seen in many of the middle-to-upper-class neighborhoods in the St. Louis Area.


George F. Bergfeld Realty Company was formed in 1889, and was described in 1908 "as a general building, real estate, financial and insurance business." Bergfeld houses were built with flexible floor plans and excellent construction. The houses that his firm built in Unversity Hills employed the architectural firm of Nolte & Nauman. George's son Lucus continued with the firm after his father's death in 1927.




