

501 Overhill sloping gable that slopes down to the first story in the left bays. The roof slope is bisected by a chimney that is flanked by recessed doors that lead to a small balcony. Further up on the roof slope, Photo toward the ridge are two gable roofed dormers containing a single, double-hung window with six-over-six lights. The first floor (left bays) contains a single casement door with transom and sidelights. Drive, 3 History and Significance This house was speculatively built by Howard Godwin who had his own real estate business on Delmar Boulevard. Howard developed over a dozen properties in University Hills, this example being one of his largest projects in the area. In fact, he took out a building permit for 7229 Kingsbury on the same day he filed for this property and 7233 Kingsbury the preceeding day. He generally acted as his own contractor and architect. four-sectional ribbon window (casement) flanks the entry. These window and door openings are highlighted with a stone surround. The center bay which has a combination hip and gable roof is accentuated with a single arched door with a stone surround. A small fixed lancet-type window flanks the entrance on the left. The second-floor contains three casement windows (leaded glass) one above the other, sloping toward roof. The right bay contains a street facing gable with a paired casement window with rectangular-shaped transoms. The first floor casement windows are paired together. All windows (in this bay) are decorated with a stone surround.



owners, by 1936, were Arthur F. (1889-1935) and Lydia B. Williams. He was president of the Williams Patent Crusher and Pulverizer Company, that his father Milton F. had founded around 1900. Arthur was a famous all-around athlete. He almost beat Arthur Duffy in the 100 yard sprint. The Williams had three sons and one daughter, Arthur, Donald, Robert and Carol Jean. By 1938, the second owners, Lloyd L. and Lydia W. Smith were only here about a year according to directories. By 1939 they were living in Creve Coeur. Lloyd was listed in the insurance business. (This family possibly may not have lived here. Although Smith was listed by street address, he could not be located in the directory by name.) By 1941, the next owners were Herbert F. and Fannie Lewis. He was secretary (Board of Directors) for the Quaker Oil Corporation by 1946. By 1953, Saul L. and Joan Rosen resided here. He worked for the Arthur Fischman Realty Company. This company was responsible for developing several properties in University Hills. This family resided here until 1967. The next and current owners are John J. and Bernice Budd (physician).

drug company and others before joining Monsanto in 1934. Cyrus was married in 1927 (in New York) to Frances Spink who had been widowed three years earlier (1924) by Edward Riesmeyer. Mrs. Merrell died in 1953. Cyrus had retired by 1959. The Merrells had a daughter, Mrs. William H. Bixby, Jr., and a son, Cyrus W. Merrell Jr., who resided in Palm Beach, Florida. By 1946 the second owners, Jack and Maxine Berg, were living at this address, apparently a retired couple. The third and current owners, Paul B. and Silvia Rava, were residing at this address in 1953. Paul was listed as a lawyer for the law firm of Lashly & Lashly in St. Louis.



a one-pane storm door. Two framing members brace the outside entry opening. The right bay (central block) consists of a five-sectional bay window (with transoms) with a slate, hipped roof. The second floor contains a three-sectional casement ribbon window. This window is further accentuated with a dormer gable that is decorated with half-timbering. The right bay two-story wing consists of a two-sectional casement window on the second floor. The second floor is highlighted with a small dormer gable over window. The brick wall that tapers off at eaves conceals the large inside chimney which extends through the front slope. Since the (enclosed) photograph was taken in 1981, owner's have enclosed the right bay window on the first floor. They have decorated it with half-timbering. Shutters have been taken off center bay windows also.

She was involved with dramatics and literary work. Her father, Charles Angert was president of the First National Bank. In July 1937, at the age of 49, Mrs. Stealey died of a cerebral hemorrhage. The building permit for this house was taken out in May. It is unclear if Lee. G. Stealey built this house for his family or decided to move here after the house was built by his company. The Stealey's had 3 children, Joan Angert, Henry A. (both graduates of Washington University) and Laura Louise.

transom and narrow sidelights that extend half-way to the ground. A pedimental console, which is decorated with modillions is supported by two, narrow Tuscan columns. The cornice of the house is decorated with modillions and a plain architrave. Frame cresting decorates roof ridge. Chimneys on each side elevation at ridge. Wings are at northeast corner, and a front wing is at southeast facade containing a two-story gable-roofed wing.



windows on both floors project out from a three-sided bay (extending to both floors) with a three-sectional casement window on each floor, although the first floor contains three four-lighted transoms. Both windows are decorated with a stone surround. A small recessed window at the attic. The right bay contains a three-sectional casement ribbon window with transoms; a mirror image of left bay fenestration, while the second floor is decorated with half-timbering. The house contains another "stepped" wing at the southwest corner. The house extends toward the southeast corner, containing screened-in porches.

partnership and the firm assumed the name of F.J. Cornwell Real Estate Company and later as the A.M. and F.J. Cornwell, Inc. In 1912, in St. Louis, Mr. Cornwell married Henrietta Jackes (1891-1964), the daughter of Franklin R. and Margaret (Campbell) Jackes. Henrietta was educated at Mary Institute. They had six children, Franklin J. Cornwell; Margaret, now Mrs. W. Clark Schmidt: Helen, now Mrs. Homer D. Jones; Dorothy, now Mrs. James C. Bailey; Virginia, now Mrs. Robert B. Huette; and Alexander Moore Cornwell, Jr. Alex was a former vice-president of the Broadway Savings Trust Company and is a director of the Chippewa Trust Company. He served on the board of trustees for the John Burroughs School, was a member of the City Plan Commission of St. Louis and president of the Board of Adjustments of University City. By 1949, the second owners were Randolph C. and Hilda Wohltman with two sons, Donald (student) and Randolph C. (in the U. S. Navy). Randolph was listed as a salesman for the Randolph Wohltman Company in St. Louis. His sons were listed as vice-president and salesman by 1955. By 1965, Mrs. Wohltman was a widow, and soon moved away. By 1967, the third owners were Frank J. and Mary A. Flood. He was listed as a salesman for Brown Shoe Company. This family was still residing at this location in 1975. Frank was listed as a salesman for Wolverine.

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
