Girdwood Youth Space...

Building good relations



Some of young people don't want to stop doing good relations work. Our previous T:BUC (Together: Building a United Community) group had so much unfinished business that when the funding came to an end we just couldn't possibly let them go.

We partnered up with Tar Isteach to form a good relations group, facilitated by Naoise Ó Cuilín and our North Talks Too youth workers John and Lauren.

The building good relations project has further cemented the lifelong relationships this group of young people had already began to form and puts an emphasis on cultural awareness, local history,

different backgrounds, politics, personal development and well-being while most importantly, having fun.

Multi-Cultural

Together, they have had several in-person learning experiences and off site visits including visiting the Chinese Welfare Association to learn about Chinese and other ethnic minority groups living in Belfast over the last 100 years. This was a great opportunity to learn about other cultural backgrounds and while there we got to sample some traditional Chinese food.

The group also got to visit the local history site of the Crumlin Road Gaol for a tour

as well as taking part in a walking tour of the Falls Road.

They joined in on the 'Small Worlds Workshop'. Here the young people got to hear the personal journeys of those from Kazakhstan, Somalia, Tibet and Vietnam and how and why they came to Belfast. The group were also able to ask the hosts questions and appreciate the significant struggles faced by asylum seekers and migrants.

World War One

The young people also had the opportunity to visit the Somme Association to learn a bit about World War 1.

As well as all the offsite opportunities this group of young people have had over

the last few months, we have also been grateful to have TAMHI come in to deliver fantastic mental health awareness sessions.

A mindfulness and visualisation session was facilitated by Carmel McGivern.

We welcomed in Aaron Kelly from the Blackmountain Rewilding Project. Aaron spoke about his journey into wildlife conservation both locally and across Ireland. Following this session the group took to Blackmountain to plant trees in their bid to help with the conservation.

As if the group wasn't fast-paced enough we headed to Need 4 Speed for a well deserved night of go-karting.

Carlingford Adventure!

The Girdwood Youth Space good relations group headed off the Carlingford Adventure Centre for 2 days packed with fun. To was to finish a very busy couple of months of good relations work and good relations training.

Over the course of 2 days, they jammed in heaps of team-building games and activities, as well as taking part in some of the adventure centres onsite activities. Laser tag was a huge hit as was the high rope and zip-lining course.

Lifelong friendships

We also got the opportunity to explore Dublin City and take part in a 1916 walking tour to learn more about Irish history.

on over night residential event have always been a great way for young people and staff alike to make lifelong memories and this one was no different!

The young people have the time to get to know one another and build relationships and sometimes life long friendships.

Programmes and partnerships like this are critical to maintaining a peaceful North Belfast and building stronger communities for this group's generation and the next.

We hope to continue the development of these incredible young people, learning from each other as the year continues. None of this would be achievable without their dedication and participation.

Glasgow youth work learning trip

Celebrating local talent

A number of North Belfast youth organisations — including Cliftonville Community Regeneration Forum — visited Glasgow to learn from them how they have tackled youth related crime.

The youth groups visited two projects which have successfully tackled and reduced youth-related crime:

- Nil By Mouth – an anti-sectarian youth project
- Reduction in Violent Crime was set up in response to rising violent crime. This initiative has shown that by working in partnership across the statutory, government and community sectors, levels of violent crime can be dramatically reduced.

Work together

Following the Glasgow visit the North Belfast groups involved are continuing to work together to explore ways of reducing youth crime and anti-social behaviour across North Belfast.

History

John Hewitt



The well-know poet John Hewitt lived at 96 Cliftonpark Avenue, Belfast. He was the most significant Belfast poet to emerge before the 1960s generation of poets that included Seamus Heaney, Derek Mahon and Michael Longley.

He played an important role in the arts world in Ireland and Britain. In 1983 he was made a Freeman of the City of Belfast and was awarded honorary doctorates by the University of Ulster and Queen's University Belfast.

John Hewitt was born in 1907 and died eighty years later in 1987.

John Hewitt received his primary education (1912–19) at Agnes Street National School. He attended Belfast Methodist College ('Methody') (1919-24) and

studied at Queen's University. He graduated in 1930 with a BA in English.

Hewitt's parents were Protestant and Methodist. His father was a radical socialist, an admirer of Keir Hardie, the founder of the British Labour party and Jim Larkin, the radical trade union leader and socialist. John Hewitt was deeply influenced by his father and his earliest poems in the late 1920s were rousing socialist anthems which appeared in such newspapers as the Irish Labour Party journal *The Irishman* and the Communist party's *Workers' Voice*.

Turned down

From November 1930 to 1957, Hewitt worked for the Belfast Museum and Art Gallery. In 1953 he was turned down for the job of Director of the Belfast

Museum by the unionist dominated Belfast city council. It is believed that this was due to his association with the Catholic community and his radical socialist ideas.

In 1957 he moved to Coventry, where Hewitt was appointed Director of the Herbert Art Gallery and Museum where he worked until retirement in 1972.

Dilemma

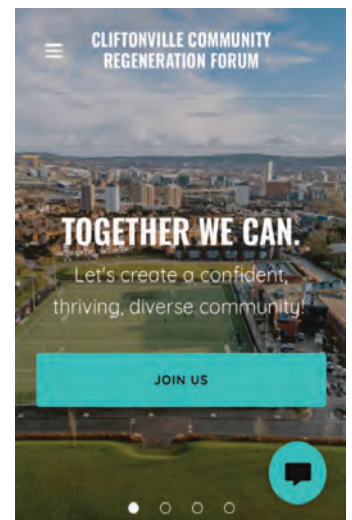
Hewitt enjoyed his time at Coventry, which Labour controlled and was socially progressive. He also remained active in the cultural life of Ireland. Many of Hewitt's poems addressed the issue of socialism, the division of Ireland and the culture and politics of his native Ulster.

In them he negotiates the dilemma of the Protestant identity in Northern Ireland, caught up in sectarian politics in a wider world which he saw as being dominated by socialist ideas.

In 1972 Hewitt retired from his Coventry post and he and his wife returned to live in Belfast. This gave John Hewitt a new lease of life. John Hewitt remained active and officially opened the Belfast Unemployed Resource Centre on May Day 1985. His name also inspired the name of their public house — *The John Hewitt* — on Donegall Street, Belfast.

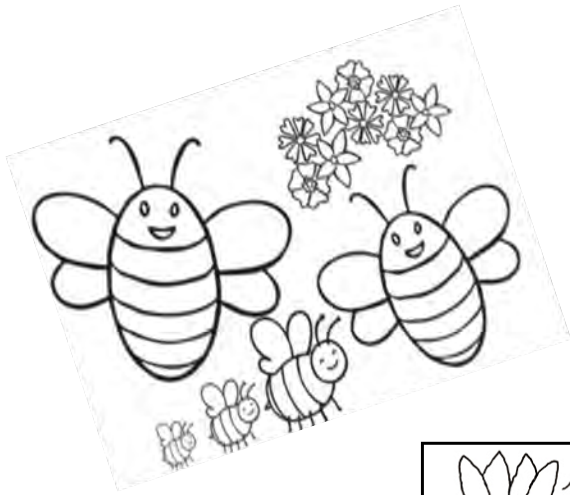

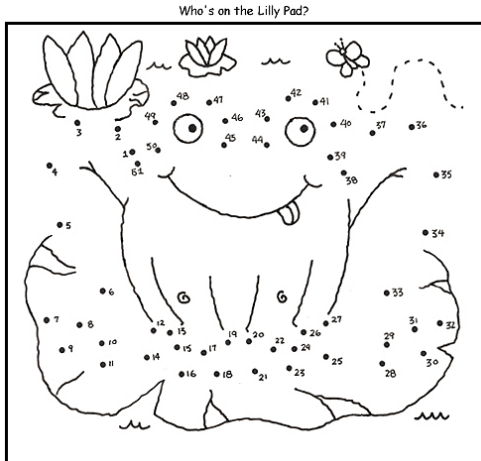

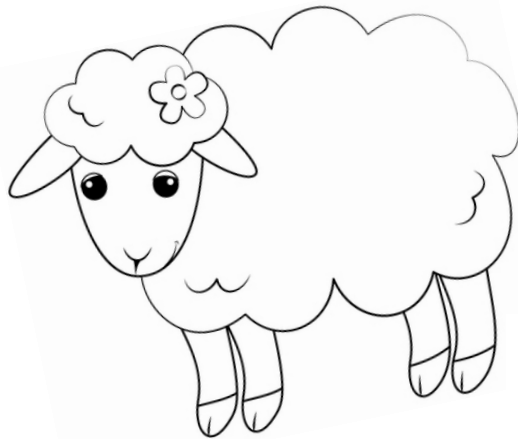
