LET'S TAKE A LOOK BACK

The OTF was rebranded to CARP.



The Clermont County Addiction and Recovery Partnership (CARP), formerly the Clermont County Opiate Task Force (OTF) recently changed its name to reflect a broader focus on substance misuse in general versus opioid misuse.

The mission of the CARP is to minimize substance misuse, distribution, addiction, overdose, and deaths in Clermont County.

The vision of CARP is to create a healthier community by reducing unintentional overdose fatalities and community trauma associated with addiction through collective multi-sector efforts that focus on prevention, harm reduction, treatment, and recovery.

The Mental Health and Recovery Board was awarded a \$50,000 suicide prevention media grant. Part of the funding was used for a radio ad campaign advertising the Clermont and Brown Crisis Hotline. The ad ran from December 19 through March 12, 2023 on WGRR 103.5, The FOX 92.5, 96 Rock, Warm 98, and Cat Country 94.1. Other suicide prevention promotional items such as stickers, coffee cup sleeves, and posters with suicide prevention messaging and the hotline number were also purchased and are being distributed throughout Clermont County

CCMHRB was awarded a \$50,000 suicide prevention media grant.

Two new recovery houses opened in Clermont County. A women's recovery house in Bethel and a men's house in New Richmond. Both houses are run by On Our Way Home. Visit www.onourwayhome.org.

CCMHRB Hired Lee Ann Watson as the new Executive Director and Denny Moell as the new Associate Director. The Board also approved a budget for hiring a new position, Community Engagement Manager. www.ccmhrb.org

CCMHRB contracted with Hope Community Center in Amelia for peer support services for individuals in mental health or addiction recovery.



CLERMONT COUNTY NOW HAS 434 CIT TRAINED FIRST RESPONDERS

Crisis Intervention Teams (CIT) are community-based programs that bring together law enforcement, mental health professionals, advocates, people living with mental illness and their families, and other partners to improve community responses to people experiencing mental health crises.

CIT consists of two components:

1. training first responders, particularly law enforcement, to recognize mental health concerns and/or crisis, and to know the community resources to connect individuals in need to treatment; and
2. assuring that the mental health system has adequate access to mental health services.

CIT training is coordinated and led by the Mental Health and Recovery Board.



Clermont County CIT has been in existence since 2011 and has trained over 90% of law enforcement in the County.
