

- The capital campaign for new sanctuary air-conditioning has gone very well. We have raised approximately \$10,727 of the \$13,500 additional money needed. Thanks to all who supported this to help us be more comfortable in the hot summer months!

- Work on the air conditioning for the sanctuary will begin in late April.
- The voting machines will be delivered on May 6 for the voting that will take place on May 7. Our church is a polling location.
- The Trustees will be working on outdoor projects including repair/repainting of the Blessing Box, seeding the lot where the shed was located, adding more dirt in the garden and repair/replacement of the sign for our church.

DEACONS


- The Deacons continue to respond to the needs of their clusters.

Stewardship is...

The Archdiocese of St. Louis has a comprehensive list of ways to describe stewardship. We thought that sharing some of those descriptions would help to fill out our holistic understanding of stewardship as a way of life. We invite you to reflect on those descriptions that speak most to you.

Stewardship is

Gratitude: Stewardship is living a life of gratitude - taking the time every day to recognize the gifts that God has given and to be grateful for them.

Transformative: Stewardship is transformative. Once we embrace the stewardship message, it changes the way we look at every decision we make. Stewardship becomes a total way of life.

A Love Response: Once we allow God to truly take up residence in our hearts, we become so overwhelmed by God's abundant love for us that we naturally feel the need to join our lives with God and dedicate our time, talent and treasure to carrying out God's work here on earth. Our generosity comes from within and not from any external pressure or reward.

Proportionate Giving: Stewardship calls us to realize that each of us is called to give as God has given to us. We no longer base our giving on what others are giving. We no longer excuse ourselves from giving because we do not see others giving. Rather, we give in proportion to all that God has given to us.

Prayer - Spending Time with God: Stewardship involves spending time with God. Recognizing that every day is a gift from God, we strive to spend some of each day with God, through prayer, worship, communion, scripture reading, meditation and other spiritual activities. During this time, we ask God how to use the gifts given to us by God.

Participation - Sharing Talent: Stewardship involves sharing talent. Recognizing that God has given each individual unique skills and talents so that together we can do the work of Our Lord. We strive to share our own talents and to encourage and welcome others to also use their talents to participate in the mission and ministry of the Church.

Generosity - Giving Treasure: Stewardship involves giving treasure in addition to time and talent. Throughout the Gospels, Jesus challenged us to give as it has been given to us. Aware of our tremendous financial blessings, we strive to give generously to support the building up of God's kingdom. We regularly strive to increase our generosity.

Trust in God: Stewardship is trusting God. We believe that our generous God will always provide for us. None of us will ever have all that we want, but we will always have all that we need.

Counter-Cultural: Stewardship is counter-cultural. While society encourages us to continually strive for more and more, stewardship helps us to recognize that we already have more than enough. In fact, we have enough to share.

Discipleship: Stewardship is discipleship. We strive to put God first in all things and to follow where Our Lord might lead.


BYOB (Bring Your Own Bible)

SPRING READ-A-LONG AND BOOK DISCUSSION



Faith Development is sponsoring a spring read-a-long. The book is “Thou Shalt Not Be Jerk: A Christian’s Guide to Engaging Politics” by Eugene Cho. This book, published in 2020, and our discussions, will not endorse any candidates or political parties, so no matter where you may find yourself on the vast spectrum of thought, there is room for all voices.

Here is a summary from the publisher, David C Cook: *According to Eugene Cho, Christians should never profess blind loyalty to a party. Any party. But they should engage with politics, because politics inform policies which impact people. Cho encourages readers to remember that hope arrived—not in a politician, system, or great nation—but in the person of Jesus Christ. With determination and heart, Cho urges*

readers to stop vilifying those they disagree with—especially the vulnerable—and asks Christians to follow Jesus and reflect His teachings. In this book that integrates the pastoral, prophetic, practical, and personal, readers will be inspired to stay engaged, have integrity, listen to the hurting, and vote their convictions.

Author Eugene Cho is the founder and visionary of One Day’s Wages, which works to alleviate extreme global poverty; the president and CEO of Bread for the World, a Christian advocacy organization urging U.S. decision makers to do all they can to pursue a world without hunger; and an ordained pastor.

There will be several ways to engage in discussion:

- A private Facebook group for this read-a-long – jump in anytime with comments and questions
- A Zoom discussion on the first half of the book on May 22 at 6:30 pm
- An in-person discussion of the last half of the book on June 12 at 6:30 pm at the church

We have 5 copies of this book at the church that can be checked out to read. They are in the library room across from the church office. Please sign the check-out sheet when you take a book, and sign it back in when you are finished so more people may enjoy the book. “Thou Shalt Not Be A Jerk” is also available in paperback and as an e-book (Kindle) through many retailers and bookstores. To continue to fulfill our Mission Statement, “to be an emissary for Christ’s love and compassion for these in need throughout the community, the nation and the world, Mission has recently supported the following organizations:

OUT OF CHAOS, HOPE

Mission recently donated \$1,000.00 to the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) to support humanitarian assistance to Israel/ Palestine. The response efforts encompass a wide array of vital humanitarian interventions, including but not limited to medical supplies, shelter, WASH (water, sanitation and hygiene), food and non-food items and delivering crucial psychosocial support to individuals.

The Ministry of Mission also sent \$500.00 to the PDA to support the denomination’s assistance with the Texas Panhandle Fires. The Smokehouse Creek fire is the largest fire on record in Texas, and there are several fires affecting this area; more than a million acres have been scorched. The PDA is working with the Synod of the Sun’s Presbyterian Disaster Relief on this response.


