Behind the Scenes at the AWL - If It's Tuesday, it Must Be Vet Day

As part of our continuing series featuring the behind the scenes work at the AWL, the days when the animals are examined, vaccinated, and even sterilized - all prior to adoption - are crucial to our mission. Thanks to the expertise demonstrated by AWL volunteers who assist Dr. Chris Bilby and technician Rebecca Burnett when they come to the shelter on "Vet Day," the multiple procedures at the shelter are done with the precision of a surgical team, and with complete accuracy. Behind the Scenes - Vet Day (cont'd)





Dr. Chris Bilby has been coming to the shelter for 8 years, which enables our animals to receive faster treatment; we can easily monitor them, plus it frees up space at Waggin' Wheel so other animals can get care for services that can't be performed at the shelter. These include surgical sterilizations, which are performed on Wednesdays at Waggin' Wheel. Non-surgical procedures can be done at the shelter.



Behind the Scenes - Operation 7

The AWL has great relationships with partner rescues that ensure our larger dogs find their forever families, but it requires the help of our dedicated volunteers who go to great lengths to make that happen - multiple times every year. In the early hours (3:58 am) on a rainy July 13th, that's exactly what Julie Keck and Liz Ryan did. They met at the shelter, walked seven dogs that were being transported, loaded them in their crates and drove to North Little Rock where they met with the partner rescue, who took the dogs to their new forever homes in the northeast US. Unfazed by the schedule, Julie and Liz modestly say they're just so happy for the dogs!





Behind the Scenes - Helping Community Pets

Three caring volunteers have been delivering pet food within the community for many years. Since 2015, Dorothy Zabecki has been delivering cat food donations to local area homes that have been referred to by the AWL. The folks are low income and would otherwise have a hard time affording the food. The AWL can provide this service as sometimes we receive brands or types of food we cannot use at the shelter. In return, we require the recipients to have their pets spayed/neutered. Jane Garrison works with many area churches that provide hot meals to the homeless. Since many of these people have dogs, Jane delivers dog food that gets distribute to the people when they get hot meals at the churches. To make it easy for them to carry, she repackages the food into gallon ziploc bags. The AWL provides some food to distribute, but Jane also purchases

a lot with her own money. **Shelley Shepherd** also helps deliver dog food to needy dog owners, who are always so grateful to get the donations for their beloved pets.







Feline Frenzy - 93 and counting!

AWL dog walkers heard meows by the water treatment center; a couple out walking found six abandoned kittens in a cardboard box on a deserted Village street; a family riding their bicycles saw five kittens run out of the woods crying for help; and a nurse at Mt. Carmel spotted a young mama moving her three kittens to higher ground during the heavy rains. These are just a few of the recent stories about some unfortunate felines, many who have been abandoned, surrendered, or unceremoniously dumped in Hot Springs Village.

Thanks to the good samaritans who contacted the AWL, these cats and kittens are indeed lucky. But while finding them is one thing, caring for them is quite another.

Featured are some of the record 90+ kittens and cats in our care that will be, or are currently, up for adoption. Skylar, (above left) holds two kittens he found near the water treatment center while helping AWL dog walker Shelly Hill.

Once in our care, our volunteers often spend hours each day taking care of their continuous needs; whether providing food and water (even round the clock feedings when required), taking animals to the vet, giving medications, daily health checks, socializing, keeping needed supplies on hand, and constant cleaning.*

Compounding the situation is the shear number of felines involved. In a typical kitten season, we may care for 50 or 60 felines, which in itself is very demanding and requires the efforts and time of many volunteers.

As of this writing, we are caring for 93 felines; a workload that is pushing our capabilities to the max. But thanks to our incredible foster parents & cat care workers who have stepped up to this daunting challenge, all animals are getting wonderful care.

Words can't express how much the AWL appreciates our incredible volunteers! Without their help, we simply couldn't save these many cats simultaneously. The amazing foster parents caring for the cats in their homes are Jill Jones, Susan and Bill Wheat, Cheryl and Chad Schaefer, Pam Galuska, Heather Benz and Judi Prestridge. Volunteers Lisa Ake and Jennifer Hurd have been working many hours nearly every day for several weeks, and Cindy Boucher, Brenda Bennett, Susan Senogles, Susan Espinal, Sandie Rickerman, and Laura Allworth are helping at the fosters', while Beth Barrows, Janene Howell, and Melanie Marshall are taking on extra shifts at the adoption center until the crunch subsides.

*Daily cleaning is essential, Simply keeping bedding and towels washed can require 5 loads of laundry each day; another foster home uses up to 60 lbs of cat litter per day, not to mention the huge bags of kitten chow and multiple cans of food consumed. Other tasks include washing food food and water bowls, cleaning cages, changing bedding, sweeping / washing floors, removing trash and recycling when possible.
