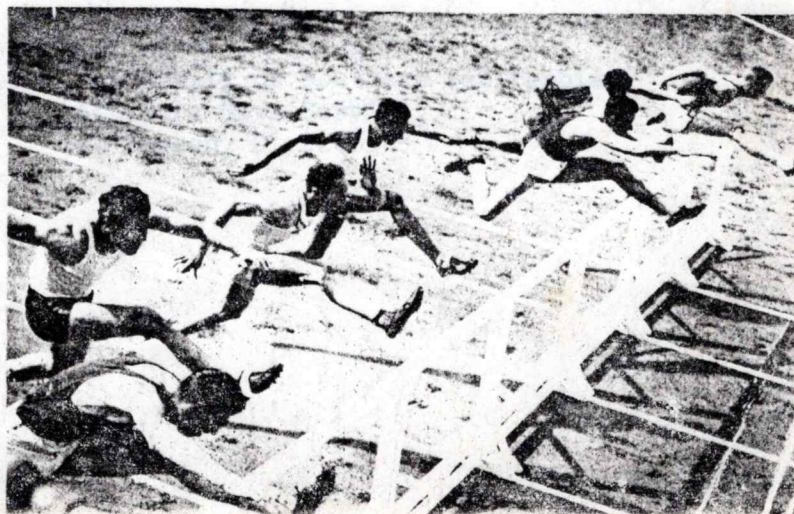

SPRINTS

CLIFFORD F. (CLIFF) BOURLAND (Soph., 20, 6', 165, from Venice). Primarily a quarter-miler but will run sprints in most S.C. meets because of shortage of sprint material. Best marks, 10s and 21.7s; latter is Boward Field record for 220 (one curve). Best sprint event is 220 due to powerful finish. As freshman last year won Junior National A.A.U. 400-meter championship at 47.4s. Third in senior A.A.U. 400m behind Grover Klemmer and Charles Belcher, 5 yards back of Klemmer. Majoring in merchandising.

HUBERT KERNS (Soph., 20, 5:11 $\frac{1}{2}$ , 164, from Manual Arts HS, Los Angeles). Like Bourland, also primarily a quarter-miler. Best marks, 10.2 and 21.8. Best mark at Manual Arts, 50.2; best as freshman last year, 49.3, but unofficially timed at better than 48s in relay lap in Finnish Relief meet. Majoring in commerce.

STANLEY SKAFTE (Soph., 19, 5:10, 155, from Compton). Handicapped by muscle knot in leg and may not be able to reach best form. Best marks, 9.8 and 21.3 in Frosh vs. Fullerton JC meet last year. Majoring in mechanical engineering.

HOWARD CARTER (Soph., 19, 6:1, 175, from Antelope Valley HS; home address, Palmdale). Best marks as Frosh, 10s and 22s. Pulled leg muscle early in 1941 season and unlikely to reach best form. Majoring in petroleum engineering.

WAYNE MATSON (Jun., 20, 6:1, 183, from Jordan HS, Long Beach, and Long Beach JC). Best Jaysee times, 9.9 and 21.6. Majoring in bacteriology.

Lost from 1940 team: Mickey Anderson, 3rd in NCAA 220 and 4th in NCAA 100; national Junior AAU 100m champ in 10.5 in 1939, 9.7 and 21.3. Barney Willis, 3rd in FCC 220; 9.6 and 21.2.

HOWARD UPTON (Sen., 22, 6', 165, from Montezuma Mt. School, Los Gatos and Modesto JC; home address, Turlock). Co-Capt. of 1941 team with Johnny Wilson. As soph. best time was unofficial 47s in finishing 2 ms. behind John Woodruff in ICA Finals. 2nd in Pacific Coast Conference champs and 4th in NCAA in 1939. In 1940 best time was 47.7. 5th in FCC championships but improved to take 3rd in NCAA. Majoring in geology.

FILMORE CRANK (Soph., 19, 6:1, 170, from Fairfax HS, Los Angeles). Ran 470 and 880 on Frosh last year. Best marks were 51.1s and 1:58.6. Majoring in international relations.

ED GRUBBICK (Sen., 21, 6:2, 170, from Roosevelt HS, Seattle). Best mark, 49.4; unofficial 48.5 in Cal and Stanford relays last year. May try low hurdles. Majoring in banking and finance.

HOWARD BACHMAN (Sen., 23, 6', 175, from Pasadena). Out of university 2 yrs. and question if can get in shape. 4th in 1938 PCC and 3rd in 1938 NCAA in unofficial 47.6. Majoring in accounting.

City College last year but has unofficial 1:56.7 in practice race. Undeclared last year in Frosh competition. Taking pre-legal course preparatory to studying law.

EDWARD LEGAR (Jun., 20, 5:9, 131, from Taft HS and Taft JC) Best times in Jaycee were 50.6 for 440 and 1:58.1 for 880. Majoring in pre-legal course in college of Commerce.

GEORGE PRENTICE (Sen., 21, 5:10 $\frac{1}{2}$ , 165, from Ventura). Best time, 49.8 in 440; no 880 mark. Majoring in English.

LEROY WEED (Jun., 20, 5:10, 155, from Coachelia). Best mark, unofficial 4:13 to take 3rd in Stanford meet last year behind Paul Moore and Louie Zamperini. Also unofficial 4:14.5 in practice meet in 1940. Ran 2-mile in 9:23 against UCLA last year. 2nd in PCC 2-mile in 9:25. Majoring in civil engineering.

MELVILLE BARRY (Jun., 20, 6:1, 188, from Beverly Hills HS and Los Angeles City College) Best time, 4:19.6 in 1939 in winning So. Cal. JC championship; ineligible last year and no competition. Overweight and needs much work to get in shape. Majoring in international relations.

HERMAN STANFILL (Soph., 20, 5:11, 180, from Montebello). Best mile mark, 4:27. No 2-mile mark. Majoring in history.

ED POWERS (Sen., 22, 6', 155, from Mercersburg Academy). Best mark, 9:53 2 years ago. 1444 on pace of 11:11 last year. Majoring in business management.

DON HOMMEL (Sen., 21, 6:1, 155, from Culver Military Academy; home address, Los Angeles). Came from 15.2 to 14.6 during 1940 season to win against California and Stanford and in Fresno Relays. Won national junior A.A.U. 110m high hurdles championship in 14.7; 4th in 1940 PCC. Majoring in marketing.

ART KACWICZ (Jun., 20, 6:3, 190, from Alhambra). From 15.3 in 1939 to unofficial 14.7 in taking 3rd in PCC last year; 4th in national junior AAU; 6th in senior AAU championships. Majoring in cinematography.

JOHN BIEWENER (Jun., 20, 6:2, 170, from San Diego HS). Went from 15.3 to unofficial 14.8 in taking 2nd to Hommel at Fresno Relays last year. 6th in NCAA and 3rd in national junior AAU meet. Majoring in advertising.

SAM JOHNSON (Soph., 20, 5:11, 155, from Fillmore). State prep high hurdles champ 2 years ago; best mark, 14.9. Shifting to low hurdles this year. No low hurdles time. Majoring in banking and finance.

ART LAHET (Sen., 22, 6:1, 170, from Alhambra). Best time is 23.8; 5th in PCC last year. Also broad jumps; best mark, 23:7 3/8. to win against Stanford in 1939; jumped only once last year—22:9 3/4 to take 3rd against Cal—because of sore leg. Majoring in marketing.

WILLARD (BILL) SCHAEFFER (Jun., 22, 6:1, 168, from Collingswood HS, N.J., and Compton J.C.; home address, Oaklyn, N.J.). Best mark, unofficial 14 feet in practice on Board Field; cleared 13:9 to tie for 2nd in Stanford meet last year; usually 13:6. Majoring in education.

BYRON DUDLEY (Sen., 23, 5:9, 140, from Longmont, Colo., and Pasadena J.C.). Best mark, 13:9 to take 2nd in Fresno Relays last year; usually 13:6; 4th in national junior A.A.U. Majoring in electrical engineering.

HIGH JUMP

JOHN WILSON (Sen., 20, 6:3, 185, from Hermosa Beach). Co-captain of team. Best mark 6:9 3/8, "white man's world's record," made while tying with Les Steers in SC-Olympic Club meet last year. NCAA champion as soph 2 yrs. ago at 6:6; also tied for ICA and PCC championships with team mate Clarke Mallery in 1939. In 1940, won PCC at 6:7 and PCC-Big Ten at 6:7 1/2; tied for NCAA championship with Don Canham of Michigan at 6:6 3/8; hurt back in this meet and week later was unable to clear 6 ft. in national AAU. Competed as Class B at Redondo Union HS and cleared 6:1; made 6:3 as Trojan freshman, 6:7 as soph and 6:9 3/8 as junior; appears to have good chance to break world's record of 6:9 3/4 this year. Splendid stylist at western roll, side clearance. Majoring in education.

GIBBERT LACAVA (Jun., 20, 6:1, 160, from Beverly Hills). Best mark, 6:7 1/8 for world's interscholastic record made as Beverly Hills HS senior. Best mark last year, 6:6 to take 2nd in SC-Stanford meet. Experimenting with belly roll style this season and may change from Western roll. Majoring in cinematography; goal is motion picture photography.

DICK HOMMEYER (Soph., 20, 6:2, 160, from Beverly Hills). Cleared 6:2 1/2 as freshman last year; has broad jumped 22:10 and may give more time to this event than high jump. Majoring in commerce.

SEARLES TALLY (Soph., 20, 6:1, 156, from L.A. High). Best mark, 6:4. Handicapped by growth on ankle from old high school injury and may be unable to reach best condition; out of competition last year. Majoring in business administration.

NCAA and ICA champion as sophomore in 1939. In 1940 won against Stanford at 222:9 $\frac{1}{2}$  and against California at 222:2 $\frac{1}{2}$ , but fell upstairs at fraternity house and broke right arm in mid-season and was unable to compete in PCC, NCAA and national AAU. Played fullback and quarterback in football. Majoring in business management.

DICK PRITIGREW (Jun., 20, 5:11, 180, from Wichita Falls, Texas). Best mark last year as sophomore was 194:8 in SC-Stanford meet. Best as freshman was 177:2. Majoring in advertising.

He has coached the present world record holding 440- and mile-relay teams, two members of another world record holding sprint relay team and three individual record holders—440 team of Maurice Guyer, Milton Maurer, Roy Delby and Frank Wykoff; mile relay team of James Cassin, Harold Smallwood, Estel Johnson and Al Fitch; 400-meter U.S. relay team of 1936 Olympics, Frank Wykoff and Foy Draper; Frank Wykoff, 100; Earle Meadows and Bill Seton, pole vault. Three relay teams now have world's records up for adoption: two 440-yard teams and one 880-yard team.

In 13 years of competition in the N.C.A.A., meet his teams have won nine championships — in 1926, '30, '31, '32, '33, '35, '36, '37, '38, '39, '40. The Trojan team finished second in 1933 and 1934 and fourth in 1929.

In 13 years of competition in the I.C.7-A, his teams have won nine championships — in 1925, '26, '30, '31, '32, '33, '35, '38, '39. The Trojan I.C.7-A, record in other years is 1924, sixth; 1927, fourth; 1938, sixteenth; 1929, second.

Since the revival of the Pacific Coast Conference championships in 1936, his teams have won all of them—five straight. Trojan teams have won 10 West Coast Relay championships, tied for one and finished second twice in 13 meets at Fresno.

For the fifth consecutive year, S.C. won the N.C.A.A. title, the eighth time since entering competition, with a total of 86 points. Earlier in the season, the Trojans also defended their I.C.4-A. crown with an all-time scoring record of 71 1/2 points. N.C.A.A. champions included Erwin Miller in the 440 with a time of 47.5s; Louis Zamperini, who defended his mile title in 4m. 13.6s; John Wilson, who won the high jump at 6 feet, 6 inches, and Bob Peoples, winner of the javelin at 220 feet, 6 1/2 inches. I.C.4-A. champions included Zamperini in the mile with a new meet record of 4m. 11.2s; Jim Humphrey, who equaled the high hurdle record of 14.7s; Earl Vickers, who set a new low hurdles record of 22.8s; Peoples, whose 223 feet 1 1/2 inches in the javelin was also a new meet record; Phil Gaspar, winner of the discus at 158 feet, 3 1/2 inches; Wilson and Clarke Mallery, who tied for first in the high jump; Loring Day, who tied for first in the pole vault, and the four-man mile relay team of Zamperini, Miller, Howard Upton and Art Reading, which won the I.C.4-A. inaugural relay event. Troy also remained undefeated in dual competition, winning by identical scores of 81-50 from California and Stanford and from U.C.L.A., 115-16. For the fourth straight year, S.C. won the Pacific Coast Conference championship with a total of 67 points. Troy also won its eleventh West Coast Relays title with 56 9/10 points. Early in the season at the Long Beach Relays, Bob Peoples set a new native American javelin record with a throw of 234 feet, 1 7/8 inches.

Southern California won the N.C.A.A. crown for sixth year in a row with 47 1/4 points. S.C. edged out Stanford to win the Pacific Coast Conference Champion-ship by two points. Troy's N.C.A.A. champions were Kenny Dills in the pole vault at 13 feet, 10 inches and John Wilson, who tied for first in the high jump at 6 feet, 6 3/8 inches. The Trojans won their dual meets with California and Stanford by respective scores of 72 1/2-58 1/2 and 71 1/3-59 2/3. In a triangular meet with U.C.L.A. and the Olympic Club S.C. won with 65 1/2 to 49 for O.C. and 16 1/2 for U.C.L.A. In the dual records with the Bruins, S.C.'s score was 93-38. In the Olympic Club meet John Wilson high jumped 6 feet, 9 3/8 inches to tie with Les Steers for the best mark of the year and the "white man's world record." For the first time since 1937 Troy lost the West Coast Relays to Stanford, taking second with 63 1/3 points.
