1953 VARSITY PROSPECTS

Headed by Olympians Sim Iness, Parry O'Brien and Jack Davis, Coach Jess Mortensen's 1953 Trojan track team appears to be a worthy successor to the 17 national-championship teams that SC track has produced in the last 26 years.

On hand are the men who scored 56\frac{1}{3} of SC's winning total of 66\frac{7}{3} in last year's NCAA Championship meet. Since the runner-up team last year scored only 241/3 points, the Trojans will undoubtedly be favored to win their fifth straight

national title at Lincoln, Nebr. this June.

In dual meet competition, however, the picture is not quite so rosy. The "big three" can total only 23 points in a dual meet and 66 are needed to win. Since the 1953 SC team has weak spots in several events, it may have trouble gathering the remaining 43 points against such well-balanced dual meet teams as California, Stanford, UCLA and Occidental.

If the Bears should win their April 25 dual with the Trojans, it will be their first win since 1943 and only the second since 1924. The Indians haven't bested the Trojans in a dual meet since 1933, twenty years ago. In all, SC track teams have lost only two collegiate dual meets in the last twenty-three years.

As the season opens, Coach Mortensen feels that he will have weaknesses in the pole vault, javelin throw, broad jump and running events over 440 yards. Mort has lost all three of his 13-6 pole vaulters from last season—Leroy Cox, Frank Johnson and Al Sandusky. On hand are Jim Buchanan and Dick Hecht who may develop into good valuters, but at present are unknown quantities.

Only one of SC's fair javelin throwers of last spring is currently available. That is Dick Gnether who has been tossing the spear around 180 feet for the past two seasons. He will have to do better than that or be shut out by Cal and Stanford.

Last spring SC had two good broad-jumpers, but Frank Flores has finished his college competition and is an assistant coach and Verle Sorgen, due to a injured foot, may give up jumping altogether in favor of center-fielding and sprinting. Don Nice and J. B. Hutchins are possibilities in the broad jump.

Behind Davis in the hurdles are Willard Wright, Henry Ketels and John Morgan in the highs and Leon Clarke, Ron Loy and Lea in the lows. Davis is one of the few collegians in the country who can beat Wright in the 120 highs.

Mort is sure his quartet of high hurdlers can better the collegiate mark of 57.9 in the 480-shuttle hurdle race if they get a good crack at it this year.

JC transfer Ernie Shelton joins Manuel Ronquillo in the high jump, Ronquillo has cleared 6-6 for the past three years and got fourth in the NCAA at this level last year. Shelton's best is 6-51/8, but he will probably go higher than that this year. Chuck Leach has also sailed over 6-4.

Iness and O'Brien are so proficient in the discus that Des Koch, probably the fifth ranking collegiate discus thrower in the nation, has decided to lay out of track this spring. Iness, already holder of the collegiate record with the disc, will be a threat to the world mark in every meet. And O'Brien won't be far back.

Equally deep is the shot put. Behind O'Brien, the Olympic champ, are Al Barry, Walt Ashcraft and Hillard Torgan, all capable of throwing over 50 feet. Bob Van Doren a 52-footer, and Jim Psaltis, a 49-footer, have passed up track in favor of pro football while Koch, another 49-footer, is saving his eligibility until the day when O'Brien and Iness accept their diplomas. Elmer Willhoite, still another 49-foot putter, is concentrating on a boxing career.

Ace miler and two-miler Art Garcia is also an assistant coach this spring and won't be able to run for Troy, His logical successor, Martell Montgomery, who looked very promising in cross-country last fall, is not eligible this spring. Sophomore Dick Adams, junior George Root and transfer Dave Bungay are all bidding for the top spot in the mile and two-mile.

Don Hoover, the best of SC's medoicre half-milers last year, has gone into service leaving Bill Sweet as the only experienced man in the event. If Sweet can take enough time from his engineering studies to get in top shape, he will be hard to beat. Chuck Beeman, a transfer from San Bernardino, was the teams best half miler in early-season workouts.

Turning to the other events, the Trojan power shows itself.

Compton College transfer Ioe Graffio was just what Mort needs in the way of a sprinter. Little Joe is excellent at 100 yards, but not too strong at the longer dash where Davis and Jim Lea excell. Ron Childs and Rod Wilger are improving rapidly and should score points in both sprints, as will the versatile Sorgen, if he is used in the sprints.

Lea should be one of the nation's best 440 men. His 47.2 in the 400-meters last spring placed him third in the NCAA behind two men who have graduated, George Rhoden and Ollie Matson. Sorgen, Roger Hendrix and Darel Griffin will

give the Trojans a good mile relay combine.

TRACK COACHING STAFF

Head Coach Jess Mortensen

Jess was one of SC's greatest all-around athletes as an undergraduate from 1927 to 1930 and has been equally successful as head track coach at Troy. Since he returned to SC at the start of the 1951 track season, his teams have won two straight NCAA titles and in last summer's Olympic Games three of his proteges (SC's Sim Iness and Parry O'Brien and Denver's Jerome Biffle) won gold medals and still another (SC's Jack Davis) won a silver medal for second place.

He came to SC from the US Military Academy at West Point where he was head track and field coach. Immediately prior to that he had been at Denver

University as head track coach and freshman football coach.

Mortensen's athletic career began at Gila Academy, a religious institution in Thatcher, Arizona. Following a brilliant all-around prep career, he entered Gila Junior College. In the 1925-27 period he lettered in football, track, basketball and football. On one afternoon he scored 26 points in the shot put, discus, javelin, high jump, high hurdles and 100-yard dash.

He enrolled at SC in the fall of 1927 and immediately became a regular on the varsity basketball team which he led in southern division scoring that season. He was named all-Southern Division and all-Pacific Coast Conference. In the summer of 1928, he just missed making the US Olympic team as a decathlon

man, placing fifth in the trials at Franklin Field in Philadelphia.

Mort won the javelin title in the 1929 NCAA meet with a throw of 203 feet 734 inches. Following another season as an All-Pacific Coast basketballer and first string Trojan footballer in the 1929-30 seasons, he won the National AAU javelin title at 204 feet 113/4 inches and he was captain of the 1930 SC track team.

Before being declared ineligible for participation as an amateur because of his coaching connections with Riverside IC, Mortensen set a new world's record for the decathlon in 1931. He scored 8166.663 points (under the old decathlon scoring method which was revised in 1936) in the National AAU finals at Lincoln, Nebraska, to become the first man to hit the 8000 mark in the sport.

Following his graduation from SC in the spring of 1930, Mort began a 14year career as coach of football, track, basketball and baseball at Riverside Junior College.

During World War II, he served as a physical education instructor in the Navy Pre-flight training program. He was discharged as a lieutenant, senior

grade, early in 1946.

Mortensen returned to Riverside for the spring and fall of 1946 to act as head football coach and dean of men. In 1947 he went to Denver U. as head track coach and freshman football coach. His track team won Denver's first Skyline Six title in 1949 and his frosh footballers were undefeated in two years. He developed Jerome Biffle, NCAA champion in the broad jump in 1949, during his stav at Denver.

He was appointed track coach at Army in January, 1950. As well as taking the cadets through indoor, outdoor and cross-country seasons he aided Red Blaik

as a football scout.

A native of Gila, Arizona, Mortensen was born April 16, 1907. He is married to the former Irene Ross of Riverside, They have a daughter Anne, 14, and a son Ross, 11.

Freshman Coach Art Garcia

Art and his co-coach, Frank Flores ,were the co-captains of last season's national championship Trojan track team.

He was one of the outstanding distance runners in the nation in 1952. He won the PCC mile title in 4:12.5 and clocked 9:22.5 for the two-mile. At Fresno he won the 5000-meter run in 15:02.2, fastest time ever run by a Trojan. He was given an award as the most improved member of the 1952 team.

Art came to SC from San Bernardino Valley College in 1949 where he was a half-miler, winning the National JC title in 1948 in 1:58.0. He is 22 years old and in the last year of his finance course at SC. He is coaching on a voluntary nonpaid basis and will probably continue running this spring.

Freshman Coach Frank Flores

Frank, like Garcia, is a non-paid, voluntary coach who will continue in competition while helping Mortensen with the Trobabe team. He is a pre-dental student.

Last year he barely missed qualifying for the US Olympic team in the hop, step and jump, finishing fifth in the Final Tryout with a mark of 48 ft. 11 in., which is an all-time SC record. He finished second in the NCAA hop-step and fifth in the broad jump with a leap of 24 ft. 21/4 in. In 1951 he was second in the NCAA broad jump.

Frank transfered to SC in 1949 after spending one year at Monterey Peninsula College. His home is in Monterey.

A Long Time Ago

When SC entered the NCAA Championships for the first time in 1923, the Trojan reputation was not as widespread as it now is. When Otto Anderson, one of the three Trojans entered, stepped out on the track one of his competitors noticed the "SC" on his shirt and remarked, "I didn't know there were any hurdlers in South Carolina."

Biographies

DICK ADAMS, mile and two-mile.

Had high school best of 4:25.8 as senior but was overshadowed by Bob Reed, Stanford's great distance prospect. Dick had a mediocre year as a frosh but after good cross-country campaign he turned in a 9:35.0 two-mile. He'll help out in the mile too but should be top eight lap man.

WALT ASHCRAFT, shot put.

Competed as frosh in 1948 and as sophomore the following season with only fair results. Picked up an occasional point but always behind Bill Bayless and Jess Swope. Stayed out in '50 and spent two years in Marine Corps. Turned in his best mark of 49'4" in winning 11th Naval District Championships in '51 for Camp Pendleton.

AL BARRY, shot put.

Only average shot putter as prep with best of 49'11¾". Was third man on '50 frosh behind O'Brien and Elmer Willhoite. Stayed out in '51 and put last year with 49'8½" mark. Showed rapid improvement and should be 52 footer this year. Lettered as varsity guard in football.

CHUCK BEEMAN, 880.

Spent two seasons at San Bernardino Valley College and showed signs of developing. Has a non-winning 1:57.0 timing in the Southern California JC Championships but not too consistent. Also had good cross-country year and is expected to show well.

DON BRINKER, hurdles.

Don won the State high hurdles in '51 in 14.5. Three times ran 15.4 last year as frosh. Will concentrate on the highs.

JIM BUCHANAN, pole vault,

A real in-and-outer as high school senior in '51, Jim recorded a 13'3" effort in dual meet but could do no better than 12'0" in All-City meet that year. Got over 12 feet in first two Spartan meets last year and then failed to equal that height for the remainder of the season.

DAVE BUNGAY, mile and two-mile.

Bungay is a sophomore transfer from Glendale College. He ran 4:29 and 9:52 at Glendale last year, the latter in taking second in the State JC two-mile. Will probably concentrate on two-mile this season.

RON CHILDS, 100 and 220.

Was a Class B sprinter in high school, running 10.0 and 21.7 in 1950, his senior year. Attended Menlo JC for one year. Entered SC last year but was ineligible. Has looked very good in early-season trials this year.

LEON CLARKE, low hurdles.

Ran the 180 lows and the 220 as a high school senior in '51. Earned SC varsity letter as freshman last spring and three times ran 23.9. Was first string end on outstanding yearling grid team of last fall. Ran a windy 21.9 as prep but will confine activities to lows.

JACK DAVIS, hurdles and 220.

Won State high school hurdles in 1949 with bests of 14.4 and 19.2 (had windy 19.1) timings. Got third in the broad jump and had top leap of 23'9\frac{1}{2}''. Had good season as frosh in '50 with marks of 14.6, 23.5 and 23'2". Jack didn't do any great running until mid-season as a sophomore in 1951. Then he recorded a 14.2 at Fresno, a 14.0 in the Coliseum Relays, equaled it a month later in a heat at the NCAA meet and the next day astounded everyone by winning the finals in 13.7. Davis was also doing some good low stick running and recorded a third in the NCAA at 22.9 and won the AAU 200 meter lows in 23.3. Last spring he repeated as NCAA champ and finished a close second to Harrison Dillard in the National AAU meet, Final US Olympic Tryouts and in the Olympic Games, In the 110-meter hurdle final at Helsinki Jack was off to a good start but fell behind Dillard, a very fast starter. By the seventh hurdle Davis had almost collared Dillard. However, he brushed the seventh and eight hurdles and hit the ninth to slow him down sufficiently for Dillard to gain a one-foot triumph. Both Dillard and Davis were timed in 13.7, a new Olympic record. His post-Olympic activities were curtailed in Dortmund, Germany, when he was spiked in the hand going over a hurdle. Davis lost that race to Bob Mathias and afterwards had to have several stitches taken in his hand. Jack began the current season with an effortless 14.4 in the Sugar Bowl meet on December 28. He will probably see some action as a 220 man this spring, since he showed so well as a sprinter in taking second in the NCAA 200-meters last year. He is a distinct threat to the world records in both the high and low hurdles.

JOE GRAFFIO, 100 and 220.

Had a windy 9.6 clocking in the 100 in high school. Has done 9.8 on numerous occasions in high school and at Compton College during the past two seasons. Not as good at 220, but has broken 22 seconds. Was state JC 100 champ last year.

DICK GENTHER, javelin.

From Allentown Pa., where he tossed the javelin 177 ft. in high school. Has won the Oxy-SC dual meet javelin for the past two years with a 184-foot throw Also won UCLA dual last year. Has practice mark over 190 feet this spring. Only experienced javelin thrower on squad.

DAREL GRIFFIN, 440.

Ran fourth in 1950 state high school meet with time of 49.7. Had just an average frosh year. Best open quarter last year was a 50.5 effort for the JV's against Riverside JC. He ran many relay laps in 1952 with his best a 49.2 at Fresno. Married.

DICK HECHT, pole vault.

Spent freshman year at Santa Monica City College and recorded a 12'11¼" vault. Dick had two 13 foot efforts last year against San Diego State and Oxy. Is only vaulter with real experience. Married and an expectant father.

ROGER HENDRIX, 440.

Was noted as 220 man in high school and ran 22.2. Spent two years at Fullerton JC where he had relay lap of 49.8. Placed second against UCLA last year in 49.0 for best effort. Will run both quarter and relay.

SIM INESS, discus throw.

One of the best discus throwers in history. Sim was a teammate of Bob Mathias at Tulare High School. He finished fourth in the National AAU and sixth in the Final Olympic Tryouts in 1948 as a high school boy and had a best

of 156'11½" which bettered the National Interscholastic Record (154'9"). Sim spent his frosh year at Compton College where he set a National Junior College record of 164'5¾". He came to SC in 1950. Iness spun the disc 171'25½" to finish second in the 1950 NCAA meet at Minneapolis. He stayed out of competition in 1951. In the Olympic year Sim (whose full name is Simeon) started off fast and kept up a high level of performance, never dropping under 160 feet. He opened up with a new American record at San Diego with a 182'5" toss. He caught hold of the big one at Eugene, Ore. in the PCC meet. In the qualifying round he sailed one 183'5¼" again breaking the American, Collegiate and SC records. He went on to win the NCAA title and the Final Olympic Tryouts. In the Games defending champion, Adolfo Consolini of Italy, was the favorite, but Sim had the best day of his career when the pressure was on and won easily, breaking Consolini's old Olympic mark on all six of his throws in the finals. His best was a throw of 180'6½". This season has his sights on Fortune Gordien's world record of 186'11".

HENRY KETELS, high hurdles.

A football end who is trying the hurdles after a year layoff. He ran 15.1 at Los Angeles City College in 1951 and Mort expects to get under 15 seconds early this season.

JIM LEA, 220, 440 and low hurdles.

Rated as fine high school sprinter with 9.8 and 21.2 clockings. Added low hurdles to repertoire as frosh and ran them in 23.3. Didn't get to really running quarter mile until past mid-season last year when he won UCLA dual in 48.5. He recorded a 47.2 for 400 meters in the NCAA meet placing third. He just missed a trip to Helsinki in the Final Tryouts by placing fifth. Is aiming for NCAA title and considers J. W. Mashburn of Oklahoma and Ollie Sax of Penn State his toughest foes.

RON LOY, low hurdles.

As a prep senior in '51 Ron recorded a 19.3 (wind-pushed) in the Pacific League finals and then went on to place fourth in the State. Loy had a good frosh year and recorded a 24.0 timing in placing third against UCLA. Is short-legged and reminiscent of Ron Frazier, diminutive low stick ace of 1947-50.

JOHN MORGAN, hurdles.

Won both hurdle races in Arizona state meet as high school senior with bests of 14.3 and 19.4. Last season as a frosh he turned in a 15.0 and 24.5 in placing third and second, respectively, at Tempe. Mort feels he'll be a greatly improved hurdler this year, especially in the highs.

PARRY O'BRIEN, shot put and discus throw.

Won Southern Section CIF as high school senior in '49 with 57'9½" put. Placed third in State Meet behind All-American Elmer Wilhoite and Cal putter Hal Norris, Won 16 pound exhibition with 47'11¾" heave. In 1950 set new National Freshman record of 53'10½" in the Coliseum Relays. Parry had very good sophomore year highlighted by his upset over Jim Fuchs in the AAU with a new Trojan record of 55'9¼". He won the PCC and lost the NCAA to Darrow

Hooper of Texas A&M by one inch. Last spring he won all of the major honors, setting new NCAA, National AAU and Olympic records, all over 57 feet. His AAU mark of 57'43/8" is the SC record and has been exceeded by only two men in track history. He improved greatly in the discus also and took second to Iness in the NCAA discus with a throw of 170'41/2". Already this season he has won the National AAU Indoor title, beating world-coord holder Jim Fuchs for the sixth time. O'Brien hopes to top Fuchs' mark of 58'101/2" before this season is over.

MANUEL RONOUILLO, high jump.

Had a prep best of 6'3" and tied for the runnerup spots in both City and State meets. Barely missed the Trojan frosh record in 1950 when he hit 6'6¼". Manny did some pretty consistent leaping last year and only twice went under 6'4". He rost to the heights in the NCAA meet with a 6'6" which won him a fourth place tie. He won the PCC meet with 6'5½".

GEORGE ROOT, mile and two-mile.

Ran 4:30.2 at Corvallis (Ore.) HS in 1950. As a frosh he ran 4:24.6 and 9:44.0. Ran his best race last year against Cal., taking mile in 4:20.4. Should be best Trojan miler this year.

ERNIE SHELTON, high jump.

Shelton was a very consistent 6-4 high-jumper in high school two seasons back with a best leap of 6'5½". He placed second in the 1951 National Junior AAU meet. Last year at Valley College he had a best of 6'4", but in an exhibition this winter between halves of a Valley basketball game he cleared 6'7". Transfered to SC in February. Has great spring.

VERLE SORGEN, 100, 220, 440, broad jump.

Was outstanding broad jumper as high school senior, leaping $24'4\frac{1}{2}''$. Has been bothered by injuries at SC but did $23'5\frac{1}{8}''$ in 1950 as freshman, $23'9\frac{1}{4}''$ as soph, and $23'7\frac{1}{2}''$ last season. Has sprint times of 9.9, 21.4 and 48.2 in competition. If his arch does not mend this spring, he may concentrate on running events. Has lettered in basketball and is currently playing centerfield on the SC varsity baseball team.

BILL SWEET, 880.

Ran a 1:59 half in high school three years ago. Was clocked in 1:55 for a relay lap as a Freshman. Last year was unable to put in sufficient time to get in good condition. Is taking an electrical engineering course.

ROD WILGER, 100 and 220.

Ran a windy 21.5 as a freshman in 1951. Ran on the Spartans last season with 10.1 and 21.9 best times. Should place in 220 this season in dual meets.

WILLARD WRIGHT, high hurdles.

Although overshadowed by Steve Turner as a prep, Will was considered a one of the finest high school hurdlers developed in this area in recent years. Wright beat Turner for the Southern Section CIF title in 14.2. Had mark of 14.7 as frosh and really blossomed out last year. Ran 14.3, placed second in PCC and fifth in NCAA. Got to finals of Olympic Tryouts.

BILL HUNTER, "THE DIRECTOR"

Willis O. (Bill) Hunter has been the director of intercollegiate athletics at the University of Southern California since 1952 and is synomymous with the rise to national prominence of Trojan athletics.

He has long been a leader in national collegiate athletics and currently is a member of the NCAA's important Television Committee and the only far-western member of the Executive Board of the U.S. Olympic Association.

He has also served as a member of the NCAA's executive committee, football rules committee and track championships committee.

Hunter came to SC in 1920 as an assistant football coach, five years after his graduation from Oberlin College where he was a football, basketball and baseball star. He served as an ensign in the Navy in World War I and rose to the rank of Commander in WW II, serving as director of athletics at the Pre-Flight School at St. Mary's and at the Pensacola NAS.

Trojan Champions and Record Holders

WORLD RECORDS:

Forty-four Trojan trackmen have equalled or bettered world records in the past forty years. The names of eleven of them still appear on the record books. OLYMPIC GAMES:

SC trackmen have won 13 individual Olympic titles since 1912 and have shared in 9 more relay victories. Three Olympic records are currently held by Trojans. In all 35 Trojans have participated in Olympic track competition, winning 57 places on US Olympic teams and one of the Canadian Olympic team. NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS:

Since 1923 the Trojans have won the NCAA team title 16 times, have finished second 5 times, fourth once and eighth once in the 23 times that they have entered

the meet. They have won at least one individual title in 22 of those 23 meets and have taken 41 individual titles. They still hold seven meet records.

NATIONAL AAU CHAMPIONSHIPS:

SC trackmen have won 50 National AAU senior titles since 1905, and had won 35 National Junior titles when that meet was discontinued in 1951. IC4A CHAMPIONSHIPS:

The Trojans competed in this meet 13 times from 1924 to 1939, winning 9 times. They won 37 individual titles and still hold 2 records even though they haven't competed in the meet in 14 years.

PCC CHAMPIONSHIPS:

SC has been undefeated in the Pacific Coast Conference meet since 1928, winning the last 12 meets that have been held. This has included 82 individual crowns. The meet records in 7 of the 15 events are held by Trojans.

SC Dual Meet Record

SC has lost only two collegiate dual meets since 1929, one to Stanford in 1933 and one to California in 1943. Since the 1943 loss, the Trojan varsity track team has gone through 56 college dual and triangular meets without a loss. They have 25 straight since tieing with Michigan State in 1949.
