Varsity Prospects

Hard hit by their second ineligibility for the national collegiate title in three years, Coach Jess Mortensen's thinclads have but one objective this season: To thoroughly convince the country that the Trojans, by soundly beating all opponents in dual meet competition, are still the best collegiate team in the country.

Despite the loss of such all-time SC cinder greats as Rink Babka and Max Truex together with standouts Murray Cockburn, Bob Lawson, Jack Egan, and Wes McLeod, this year's Trojan squad was still considered a good bet to successfully retain the NCAA title that has been theirs 20 of the 28 times that an SC team has competed for the national championship.

As for their current objective of soundly beating all dual meet foes, Coach Jess Mortensen has labeled this team as probably the strongest dual meet team during his reign at Troy. "Mort," incidentally, enters the season with a perfect team meet record—having won 44 dual and 11 team (triangular or quadrangular) meets since taking over as head coach in 1951.

With the exception of the high hurdles and possible the discus throw and shot put, the Trojans are capable of entering nationally ranked performers in every event. A fast rundown by events (with 1958 best marks):

SPRINTS: Bob Staten (9:6, 20.7) and Angelo Coia (9.6, 21.0), will finally give the Trojans the speed that SC teams have lacked in recent years.

MID-DISTANCES: Real Trojan strength here. Staten (46.6), Ted Smith (46.8 and 1:51.6), Dean Balzaret (47.6), Wayne Lemons (1:50.9), Tom Anderson (1:51.7), and Bob Shankland (1:53.3).

DISTANCES: Trojans will hold their own against any dual meet foe with Shankland (4:07.9), Atis Petersons (4:16.1 and 9:21.1), Lemons (4:17.0), and Fernando Leon (4:18.7 and 9:28.5).

HURDLES: Loss of Bob Lawson definitely hurts, especially in the highs. Some top material in lows, however, with Don George (22.9), Staten (23.0), and Dave Hollingsworth (23.5).

SHOT PUT: Trojans hard hit by the ineligibility ruling of defending NCAA champ Dave Davis (60-5). Carl Self and Marlin McKeever will have to pick up key points.

DISCUS: Questionable at present time. McKeever, together with JC transfer Bob Sbordone, could help.

JAVELIN: Another Trojan strong point with Mike Page (235-7) and Sbordone (214-9).

HIGH JUMP: Charlie Dumas (6-11½) and Bob Avant (6-8¾) should run one-two in every meet.

BROAD JUMP: Bill Jackson (25-9¼) should be among the world's best this year.

POLE VAULT: Defending NCAA co-champion Gene Freudenthal (14-6) and frosh record holder Jim Brewer (14-11¾) will be hard to beat.

JESS HILL, DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Jess Hill, former track and grid coach at Troy, is in his second year as Director of Intercollegiate Athletics at the University of Southern California.

Born Jesse Terrill Hill in Yates, Missouri, on January 20, 1907, Jess came west with his family ten years later and became one of the top athletes in southern California while at Corona High School. From the fall of 1923 to the spring of 1925, he was awarded ten letters in five sports.

Following his graduation from Corona in 1925, Hill attended Riverside Junior College for one year, earning letters in football, basketball, baseball and track as Riverside fielded championship teams in all four sports.

Jess entered SC in February, 1927, and continued to exhibit his all-around athletic prowess, playing football and baseball and compiling an outstanding track and field record.

He became the first Trojan in history to surpass 25 feet in the broad jump, leaping 25⁷/₈" to win the 1929 IC4A title. This mark has been bettered by only three Trojans since 1929.

Also outstanding in his studies, Jess graduated cum laude following the 1930 collegiate baseball season.

Hill signed immediately to play professional baseball and enjoyed a brilliant ten-year career in Triple-A and Major League ball. He compiled a lifetime average of .306, seeing service with the Yankees, Senators, Athletics and Oakland, Hollywood and Newark.

In the off-season during his professional baseball years, Jess launched his coaching career at Corona High. Just as in his playing days, he moved from Corona to Riverside J.C. His next position was at Long Beach JC, where he was on the physical education and coaching staff when World War II came.

Hill enlisted in the Navy in March of 1942 and served until February of 1946, when he was separated from active duty with the rank of Lieutenant Commander.

Jess returned to Long Beach City College after getting out of the Navy and immediately piloted the junior college baseball team to a Conference championship.

Hill returned to SC in the fall of 1946 to begin a period of ten years of advancement within the athletic department. His first team at SC, the 1946 frosh football team, went through an undefeated season. In 1948 he was selected as assistant track coach, being groomed to succeed Dean Cromwell as head track coach after the latter's retirement at the end of the '48 season.

Hill had two undefeated years, 1949 and 1950, as head track coach at SC, continuing the great Trojan track heritage and winning two National Championships.

Early in 1951 he was named head football coach, following the resignation of Jeff Cravath. In 1952, Hill steered the Trojan varsity through an undefeated Conference season and a 7-0 win over Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl game. That win is still the only PCC victory over the Big Ten in the Pasadena game since the Bowl pact began eleven years ago.

Hill's six-year record as head football coach at SC was 45 wins, 17 losses and 1 tie for a .722 winning percentage.

On September 1, 1957, Hill officially succeeded Willis O. Hunter as Director of Athletics.

Jess is married to the former Elizabeth Helen Glass. They have two children, Mrs. Mary Bett Carter, 26 and an SC graduate, and Jess Jr., 17. The Hills reside in San Marino.

HEAD COACH JESS MORTENSEN

In his eight seasons as SC's head track and field coach, Jess Mortensen has posted an enviable record, including six NCAA titles and has yet to lose a dual meet.

Born in Thatcher, Arizona, on April 16, 1907, he attended Gila Academy and Gila Junior College for his freshman year.

He won two letters in football at SC as a right halfback, playing behind Lloyd Thomas in 1928 and Erny Pinckert in 1929. As a cager, he earned three awards and was an All-PCC choice as a sophomore in 1928.

It was in track and field that Mortensen gained his greatest recognition. Earning varsity letters in 1928-29-30, he won the NCAA javelin title his junior year with a throw of 203 ft. 7³/₄ in. and won the National AAU title the following season with his all-time best throw of 204 ft. 11³/₄ in.

"Mort" also won fame as a decathlon man. In 1931, while coaching at Riverside JC, he competed in his last decathlon and won the National AAU title at Lincoln, Nebraska, with a world-record-breaking score.

During his 14-year coaching stint at Riverside JC, he handled football, basketball, baseball and track, taking time off during World War II to serve as a physical education instructor for the Navy. He was discharged in 1946 as a lieutenant.

Upon his return to Riverside in 1946, he was appointed dean of men and resumed his duties as head football coach.

In 1947, he moved to the University of Denver as frosh football and head track coach. Mortensen turned out two unbeaten frosh grid teams and gave Denver its first Skyline Conference track championship in 1949 and developed Jerome Biffle, Olympic Games winner at Helsinki in 1952.

He moved on to West Point in a similar capacity in January, 1950, and a year later returned to SC as head track coach, replacing Jess Hill who moved up to the head football coaching post.

Since his return to SC, Mortensen has posted an incomparable track and field record. In addition to his current dual meet streak of 44 consecutive wins and five national collegiate championships, Mortensen gained added laurels in 1956 when he was named an assistant coach for the United States Olympic Games track and field team.

During his reign at SC, he is given credit for developing such all time cinder greats as Jack Davis, Sim Iness, Parry O'Brien, Des Koch, Max Truex, Jim Lea, Rink Babka, and countless others.

Jess is married to the former Irene Ross of Riverside. They have two children—a married daughter, Anne, 20 and Ross, 17. They live in South Pasadena.

ASSISTANT COACH JIM SLOSSON

Jim is in his fifth season as assistant track coach at SC.

Before his move to SC, Slosson gained a reputation as one of the finest young coaches in this area while at Valley JC, particularly for his work with middle-distance and distance runners. In his three years at Valley, he never lost a Conference dual meet and only lost one meet outside the league. In addition to his record of 27 wins in 28 meets in dual competition, Slosson's teams finished second in the state meet in 1952, won it in 1953, and finished sixth in 1954.

Since his move to SC in 1955, he has been credited with playing an important role in the development of Max Truex, Sid Wing, Mal Robertson, and more recent top Trojan distance runners.

Slosson was born on April 12, 1923, in Van Nuys, California, and has lived there ever since. He was L.A. City half-mile champ as a senior at Van Nuys High School in 1941. Following a tour of service with the Army Air Corps during World War II, he ran three years of track at SC (1946-48). His best times were 1:54.8 for the 880 and 47.8 for the 440.

Recently obtaining his doctorate in Geology from SC, Jim has been teaching geology at Valley JC since 1950. He is also head of the Earth Science Department at the Junior College.

Jim and his wife, Nancy, an SC graduate in 1947, have two children, Bonnie, 8, and Tommy, 5.

The Trojan varsity didn't compete in last year's relays, taking part in the SC-Stanford dual meet. . . . Freshman Bob Avant set a new Trobabe record in the high jump, clearing the bar at 6 ft. 8¼ in. . . . This year, the Trojans will enter a full team for the relays.

MT. SAN ANTONIO RELAYS, April 25

This year's first annual Mt. San Antonio Relays will host outstanding track athletes from throughout the California area.

WEST COAST RELAYS, May 9

The Trojans will be shooting for their 14th straight team title in this year's renewal. . . . Last year's meet found the Trojans posting a narrow 52½-49½ win over Oxy. . . . Trojan athletes won three events in the 1958 meet—5000 meters, Max Truex, 14:33.9; discus, Rink Babka, 186 ft.; and high jump, Charlie Dumas, 6 ft. 9 in.

COLISEUM RELAYS, May 15

Trojan athletes again dominated the 18th annual running of the relays before 33,656 fans last year. . . . Although finishing third in the two-mile relay, the Trojan quartet of Tom Anderson, Bob Shankland, Wes McLeod, and Wayne Lemons was clocked in 7:25.0ng, second fastest time in SC history. . . . Other outstanding Trojan marks included Rink Babka's win in the discus at 186 ft. 4 in.; Max Truex's 8:50.7ng clocking in the two-mile; and freshman Jim Brewer's 14 ft. 8¼ in. third-place finish in the pole vault.

PCC CHAMPIONSHIPS, May 22-23

The Trojans will be shooting for their 18th team title in this year's 29th and final running of the Pacific Coast Conference championships. . . . In last year's meet, the Trojans won six events—including Rink Babka's record toss of 186 ft. 8 in. in the discus.

CALIFORNIA RELAYS, May 30

The Trojans easily won the team title in last year's meet, scoring 43 points. . . . Highlight of the SC win was the 9:52.8 distance medley effort by Ted Smith, Wes McLeod, Bob Shankland, and Max Truex. . . . That time represented a new SC record. . . . The Trojans also won the two-mile relay and Rink Babka set a new record in the discus throw.

COMPTON INVITATIONAL, June 5

Trojan entries were limited to one first in last year's meet. Charlie Dumas' 6 ft. 7¾ in. win in the high jump. . . . Of interest to Trojan track fans was Parry O'Brien's 62 ft. 4¾ in. win in the shot put, followed by then high school and now SC frosh entry Dallas Long at 61 ft. ½ in. and Dave Davis, defending national collegiate champion and currently ineligible at SC, at 60 ft. 5 in.

SC varsity has won last 52 straight dual meets.

SC varsity has gone through 78 consecutive dual meets without a loss.

SC varsity has gone through 115 straight peacetime collegiate dual meets since last loss in 1933.

MISCELLANEOUS

CHAMPIONS AND RECORD HOLDERS

WORLD RECORDS: 47 SC trackmen have equalled or bettered world records since 1912. The names of three Trojans—Mel Patton, Parry O'Brien, and Jack Davis—appear in the current record book.

OLYMPIC GAMES: SC trackmen have won 13 individual Olympic titles and have shared in nine relay victories. Forty men have won a total of 63 places on United States Olympic teams. Two Olympic records are currently held by SC men: Jack Davis, high hurdles, and Parry O'Brien, shot put.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS: SC has won 20 out of 28 NCAA meets competed in since its beginning in 1921. On five occasions they have finished second. The Trojans won nine in a row (1935-1943), and seven straight (1949-1955). A total of 56 individual championships and three current meet records highlight the record.

PACIFIC COAST CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS: SC has been defeated but once in the meet since 1928. This includes 119 individual championships, while nine of the 15 meet records are held by SC.
