Varsity Prospects

It was just two years ago that SC track and field men entered their season with a crusade: To win the national collegiate title following their ineligibility to compete the season before.

Such is the case again in 1960. And SC followers are hoping for a like effort by Trojan thinclads this season. The Men from Troy, it may be remembered, were declared ineligible for all national competition for the 1957 season as a result of sanctions imposed by the NCAA. But the Trojans came roaring back in 1958 to claim their 20th title in the 28 times that they have competed for the national track and field championship.

New penalties were levied early in 1959 and, once again, all Trojan athletic teams were declared out of national competition.

But the Trojans are eligible in 1960 and Head Coach Jess Mortensen anticipates another winning season. It might be noted that the popular SC mentor enters the 1960 campaign with a perfect team meet record—having won 51 dual and 12 team (triangular or quadrangular) meets since taking over as head coach in 1951.

At this writing, the Trojans will be able to field nationally ranked performers in some events. In others, however, "Mort" will be faced with a tremendous rebuilding job to offset the loss of such 1959 stars as Tom Anderson, Bob Shankland, Mike Page, and Gene Freudenthal.

A fast rundown by events (with 1959 best marks unless otherwise noted):

SPRINTS: For the first time in decade, the Trojans are loaded with speed merchants. Heading the list are Bobby Staten (9.8 and 20.9), Angelo Coia (9.8 and 20.9n), Bruce Munn (9.6 and 20.8) and JC transfer Jim Bates (9.5 and 20.7). Look for a new world mark in the 880-yard relay from these boys. RATING: Excellent.

MID-DISTANCES: Quartermile should be as strong as in '59, with Staten (47.0), Coia (48.3), Dean Balzarett (48.7), and Ted Smith (48.7n and all-time best of 46.8n) heading an impressive array of 440 dashmen. Halfmile is more questionable, with only Wayne Lemons (1:51.6n) and Warren Farlow (1:51.5n) boasting any marks of note. RATING: Good

DISTANCES: Trojans could be hurting here. Rene Rogers has done 4:10.6n and 9:29.6. Lemons (4:20.8) could double in mile while Fernando Leon, (4:26.9n and 9:34.5n), who was sick with a respiratory ailment during most of the '59 season, could develop into an important point winner. **RATING:** Fair.

HURDLES: The big "if" in Trojan track for '60. Charlie Dumas will porbably skip the hurdles to concentrate on high jum sing, leaving the field open for a host of less-experienced hurdlers. Lows picture a little more optimistic with Staten (23.5), Jack Holman (23.7), and Jim Waldron (23.7n). RATING: Fair.

SHOT PUT: The Trojans got by without Dave Davis last year and should do even better in '60. Look for Dallas Long (63-7) to break every record of note. On hand to lend support are the Marvelous McKeevers (Marlin at 56-9 ½ and Mike at 54-2 ½). Also newcomer Jim Wade (56-0). **RATING:** Excellent.

DISCUS: McKeevers (Mike at 159-3 $\frac{1}{2}$ and Marlin at 150-11) and Bob Sbordone (163-8) are only candidates with varsity experience. Wade (170- $\frac{1}{2}$) could be best of all and footballer Dave Washington (155-7 $\frac{1}{2}$) could surprise. **RATING:** Fair.

JAVELIN: Shordone should improve over last season's mark $(227-4\frac{1}{2})$. Transfer Dick Tomlinson $(231-\frac{1}{4})$ owns national UC record. **RATING:** Good.

BROAD JUMP: Luther Hayes $(24-9\frac{1}{2})$ proved a pleasant surprise in '59. Should team with Bill Jackson $(24-6\frac{1}{2})$ and all-time best of $25-9\frac{1}{4}$) to give the Trojans a solid one-two punch in this event. **RATING:** Good.

POLE VAULT: Jim Brewer is still off the form that made him the first prepster to clear 15-feet and which gave him the national Frosh record in 1958 (14-11 ¾). Had best of 14-8 ¾ last year. Converted sprinter-hurdler Don George could help. **RATING:** Fair.

HIGH JUMP: Charlie Dumas (7-0) and Bob Avant (6-8%) went one-two in most meets last year. Look for a repeat in '60. **RATING:** Excellent.

1959 ALL-AMERICAN TEAM

Only one member of SC's 1959 track and field team—high jumper Charlie Dumas—was named to the 1959 All-American track and field team, as selected by the National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field Rules Committee.

The first man in history to clear seven-feet and defending Olympic Games champion, Dumas established a new national collegiate record in 1959 when he cleared seven-feet even in the West Coast Relays meet, May 2, at Fresno.

JESS HILL, DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Jess Hill, former track and grid coach at Troy, is in his third years as Director of Intercollegiate Athletics at the

University of Southern California.

Born Jesse Terrill Hill in Yates, Missouri, on January 20, 1907, Jess came west with his family ten years later and became one of the top athletes in southern California while at Corona High School. From the fall of 1923 to the spring of 1925, he was awarded ten letters in five sports.

Following his graduation from Corona in 1925, Hill attended Riverside Junior College for one year, earning letters in football, basketball, baseball and track as Riverside fielded

championship teams in all four sports.

Jess entered SC in February, 1927, and continued to exhibit his all-around athletic prowess, playing football and baseball and compiling an outstanding track and field record.

He became the first Trojan in history to surpass 25 feet in the broad jump, leaping $25^{\prime} \gamma_{8}^{\prime\prime}$ to win the 1929 IC4A title. This mark has been bettered by only three Trojans since 1929.

Also outstanding in his studies, Jess graduated cum laude following the 1930 collegiate baseball season.

Hill signed immediately to play professional baseball and enjoyed a brilliant ten-year career in Triple-A and Major League ball. He compiled a lifetime average of .306, seeing service with the Yankees, Senators, Athletics and Oakland, Hollywood and Newark.

In the off-season during his professional baseball years, Jess launched his coaching career at Corona High. Just as in his playing days, he moved from Corona to Riverside J.C. His next position was at Long Beach JC, where he was on the physical education and coaching staff when World War II came

Hill enlisted in the Navy in March of 1942 and served until February of 1946, when he was separated from active duty with the rank of Lieutenant Commander.

Jess returned to Long Beach City College after getting out of the Navy and immediately piloted the junior college baseball

team to a Conference championship.

Hill returned to SC in the fall of 1946 to begin a period of ten years of advancement within the athletic department. His first team at SC, the 1946 frosh football team, went through an undefeated season. In 1948 he was selected as assistant track coach, being groomed to succeed Dean Cromwell as head track coach after the latter's retirement at the end of the '48 season.

Hill had two undefeated years, 1949 and 1950, as head track coach at SC, continuing the great Trojan track heritage

and winning two National Championships.

Early in 1951 he was named head football coach, following the resignation of Jeff Cravath. In 1952, Hill steered the Trojan varsity through an undefeated Conference season and a 7-0 win over Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl game. That win is still the only PCC victory over the Big Ten in the Pasadena game since the Bowl pact began eleven years ago.

Hill's six-year record as head football coach at SC was 45 wins, 17 losses and 1 tie for a .722 winning percentage.

On September 1, 1957, Hill officially succeeded Willis O. Hunter as Director of Athletics.

Jess is married to the former Elizabeth Helen Glass. They have two children, Mrs. Mary Bett Carter, an SC graduate, and Jess Jr., 18, a freshman at SC. The Hills reside in South Pasadena.

HEAD COACH JESS MORTENSEN

In his nine seasons as SC's head track and field coach, Jess Mortensen has posted an enviable record, including six NCAA titles and has yet to lose a dual meet.

Born in Thatcher, Arizona, on April 16, 1907, he attended Gila Academy and Gila Junior College for his freshman year.

He won two letters in football at SC as a right halfback, playing behind Lloyd Thomas in 1928 and Erny Pinckert in 1929. As a cager, he earned three awards and was an All-PCC choice as a sophomore in 1928.

It was in track and field that Mortensen gained his greatest recognition. Earning varsity letters in 1928-29-30, he won the NCAA javelin title his junior year with a throw of 203 ft. $7\frac{3}{4}$, in. and won the National AAU title the following season with

his all-time best throw of 204 ft. $11 \frac{3}{4}$ in.

"Mort" also won fame as a decathlon man. In 1931, while coaching at Riverside JC, he competed in his last decathlon and won the National AAU title at Lincoln, Nebraska, with a world-record-breaking score.

During his 14-year coaching stint at Riverside JC, he handled football, basketball, baseball and track, taking time off during World War II to serve as a physical education instructor for the Navy. He was discharged in 1946 as a lieutenant.

Upon his return to Riverside in 1946, he was appointed dean of men and resumed his duties as head football coach.

In 1947, he moved to the University of Denver as frosh football and head track coach. Mortensen turned out two unbeaten frosh grid teams and gave Denver its first Skyline Conference track championship in 1949 and developed Jerome Biffle, Olympic Games winner at Helsinki in 1952.

He moved on to West Point in a similar capacity in January, 1950, and a year later returned to SC as head track coach, replacing Jess Hill who moved up to the head football coaching post.

Since his return to SC, Mortensen has posted an incomparable track and field record. In addition to his current dual meet streak of 51 consecutive wins and five national collegiate championships, Mortensen gained added laurels in 1956 when he was named an assistant coach for the United States Olympic Games track and field team.

During his reign at SC, he is given credit for developing such all time cinder greats as Jack Davis, Sim Iness, Parry O'Brien, Des Koch, Max Truex, Jim Lea, Rink Babka, and countless others.

Jess is married to the former Irene Ross of Riverside. They have two children—a married daughter, Anne, 21, and Ross, 18. They live in South Pasadena.

ASSISTANT COACH JIM SLOSSON

Jim is in his sixth season as assistant track coach at SC.

Before his move to SC, Slosson gained a reputation as one of the finest young coaches in this area while at Valley JC, particularly for his work with middle-distance and distance runners. In his three years at Valley, he never lost a Conference dual meet and only lost one meet outside the league. In addition to his record of 27 wins in 28 meets in dual competition, Slosson's teams finished second in the state meet in 1952, won it in 1953, and finished sixth in 1954.

Since his move to SC in 1955, he has been credited with playing an important role in the development of Max Truex, Sid Wing, Mal Robertson, and more recent top Trojan distance

Slosson was born on April 12, 1923, in Van Nuys, California, and has lived there ever since. He was L.A. City half-mile champ as a senior at Van Nuys High School in 1941. Following a tour of service with the Army Air Corps during World War II, he ran three years of track at SC (1946-48). His best times were 1:54.8 for the 880 and 47.8 for the 440.

Recently obtaining his doctorate in Geology from SC, Jim has been teaching geology at Valley JC since 1950. He is also head of the Earth Science Department at the Junior College.

WORLD RECORDS: 48 SC trackmen have equalled or bettered world records since 1912. The names of three Trojans—Mel Patton, Parry O'Brien, and Jack Davis—appear in the current record book.

OLYMPIC GAMES: SC trackmen have won 13 individual Olympic titles and have shared in nine relay victories. Forty men have won a total of 63 places on United States Olympic teams. Two Olympic records are currently held by SC men: Jack Davis, high hurdles, and Parry O'Brien, shot put.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS: SC has won 20 out of 28 NCAA meets competed in since its beginning in 1921. On five occasions they have finished second. The Trojans won nine in a row (1935-1943), and seven straight (1949-1955). A total of 56 individual championships and three current meet records highlight the record.

PACIFIC COAST CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS: SC was defeated but once in the meet from 1928 through 1959. This included 119 individual championships, while nine of the 17 meet records are held by SC.
