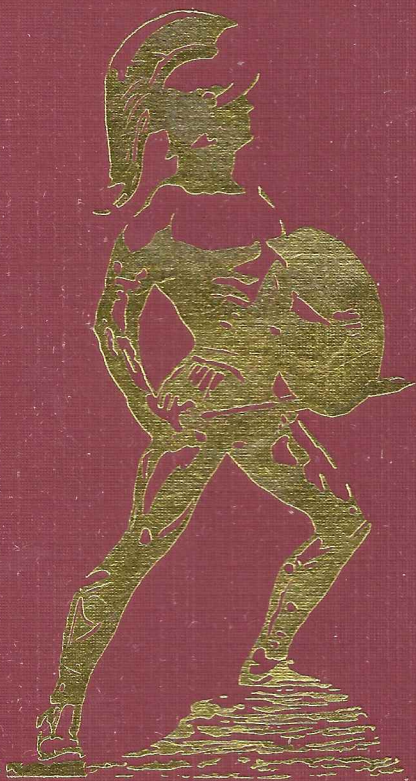

1989 USC MEN'S TRACK AND FIELD PROSPECTUS

Three returning NCAA scorers and a fine crop of recruits will hold the key to USC's success in men's track this year. In 1988, the Trojans finished tied for 32nd place at the NCAA meet on the strength of three athletes. Although limited in numbers, fifth-year coach **Ernie Bullard** is confident of his team's chances to make a stronger impact on the national picture.

"We will definitely focus our efforts on quality this year," said Bullard. **"All our meets during the season will serve as a means to an end — and that end is the NCAA meet. We're solid in the track events and have good quality in some field events. It's important that our young people jump up and contribute right away."**

Here's a closer look at USC's 1989 men's track and field squad:

SPRINTS — The veteran faction of the Trojan sprint corps consists of senior **Bert Fuller** (10.65, 21.70) and three USC football players — sophomores **Calvin Holmes** (10.50), **Ricky Ervins** (10.69) and **Gary Wellman** (10.67). Although spring football will dictate this grid trio's availability, they should figure strongly on the conference level and on the sprint relay. The talented youth in this group promises to conjure memories of past Trojan sprint greats. Freshmen **Quincy Watts** (10.30, 20.50) and **Travis Hannah** (46.84) are California State champions and two of the nation's top sprint talents. Watts, from Taft High in Woodland Hills, Calif., was undefeated among preps as a junior in 1987 and Hannah was a key ingredient in Hawthorne (Calif.) High's state champion teams in 1987 and 1988.

HURDLES — Troy has two returning NCAA scorers in this department in senior high hurdler **Robert Reading** (13.64) and junior intermediate hurdler **George Porter** (49.49). Reading finished seventh at the 1988 NCAA meet despite falling over Arthur Blake (a 1988 Olympian) in the final. Porter ended up fifth at the nationals and took third at the 1988 TAC championships. Freshman **Ron Copeland** (13.88hs), second at the 1987 state meet while at Dorsey High in Los Angeles, could also figure in the national picture very soon.

DISTANCES — Senior **Ibrahim Okash** (1:44.92, 3:40.86), USC's third NCAA scorer last year and school record holder in the 800, hopes to maintain the form he showed last summer in Europe when he set impressive personal bests. The man with the range is senior **Ray Griffin** (1:48.62, 3:46.09, 14:28.4), who appears on USC's all-time top 10 lists for 800, 1500 and 5000 meters. Senior **Fredson**

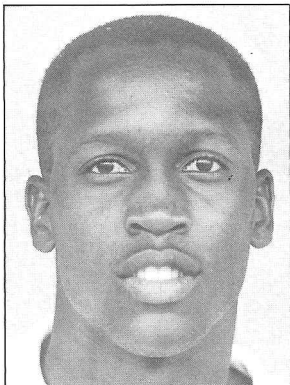
Mayiek (14:10.0, 29:42.70), a three-time Pac-10 scorer, along with senior **Adolfo Garcia** (14:34.7, 30:15.0), sophomore **Mitch Sloan**, senior **Matt McCarthy** (9:21.0) and freshman **Dreux Valenti**, will hold down the duties in the long distances.

JUMPS — Senior **Greg Harper** (52-8), a scorer at the 1988 Pac-10 meet, has improved one foot per year since coming to USC. Junior **Darryl Hentley** (23-3¾), a jumper/sprinter last year, will focus on the decathlon in 1989. In the pole vault, freshman **Todd Lehman** of North Phoenix (Ariz.) High is the Arizona state record holder (16-6) in his specialty and soph **Brooks Morris** (15-7) returns from last year.

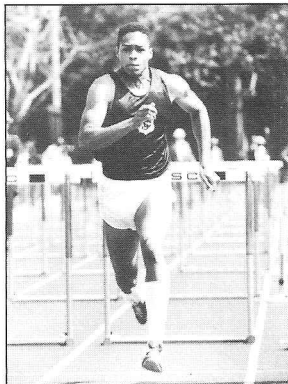
THROWS — 1988 prep All-American **Matt Gee** (243-9hs), an inside linebacker on the USC football team, was the No. 2 high school javelin thrower last year at Arkansas City (Ks.) High.

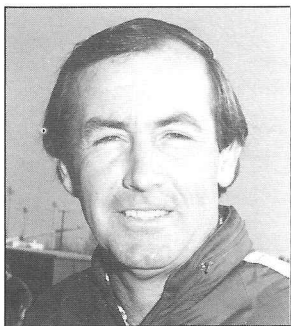

ERNIE BULLARD

Head Coach



Ernie Bullard is a man living a dream — if you don't believe it, just ask him.

Ever since his days as a Trojan pole vaulter (his best was 14-4½) under Jess Mortensen (1957-59), Bullard's goal was to return to USC as the head coach of the men's track team. He realized his goal when he inherited the job from longtime USC coach Vern Wolfe. Wolfe retired at the end of the 1984 season after 22 years at the helm of the Trojans and Bullard was picked

as his successor. Coincidentally, Wolfe was also a vaulter at USC (in the 1940s) and coached Bullard at North Phoenix (Ariz.) High in 1954.

Bullard, 51, is the ninth head track coach at USC, which has won more NCAA team titles in the sport (26 outdoor and two indoor) than any other school.

"This is the successful culmination of my career," says Bullard. "Ever since I was an athlete at USC, my primary professional goal was to return to my alma mater as its track coach. My experience at San Jose State certainly prepared me well for that."

Bullard posted a stellar 84-22 dual meet record at San Jose State (.792 winning percentage) and six of his teams finished in the Top 10 in *Track & Field News'* national dual meet rankings.

When he took over at San Jose State in 1971, Bullard maintained the national prominence that the Spartans had enjoyed under the late Bud Winter. Ernie's 1973 team was 9-0 and ranked sixth by *Track & Field News*, and three of his later teams also went undefeated (11-0 in 1975, 10-0 in 1977 and 6-0 in 1979). The 1975 squad placed fourth in the NCAA meet. His teams won the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA) championship seven times and were runners-up five times.

Four of Bullard's athletes at San Jose State won seven NCAA titles between them — triple jumper Ron Livers (1975-77-78), high hurdler Dedy Cooper (1976), javelin thrower Curt Ransford (1980) and pole vaulter Felix Bohni (1983 indoor and outdoor). Two others, John Powell in the discus and Dan Ripley in the pole vault, have held world records.

The Spartans won the NCAA title in 1969 while Bullard was an assistant (1969-70) under Winter.

Internationally respected, he has been a member of the U.S. Olympic Development Committee since 1978, is the NCAA District VIII track representative and coached the U.S. junior team against the USSR in 1975.

Bullard was also a successful junior college head coach, serving two years (1967-68) at Mesa (Ariz.) Community College and three years (1964-66) at Orange Coast College in Costa Mesa (Calif.). His 1968 Mesa team won the national JC meet (and earned him national JC Coach of the Year honors) after placing second in 1967. His Mesa pupils included several national JC individual champions, JC record holders and Olympic competitors, including Mark Murro, the first American to throw the javelin 300 feet.

He also coached in the high school ranks. He was the head coach at Tolleson (Ariz.) High in 1961, then served as an assistant at Arca-

dia High in Phoenix in 1962 and 1963. In 1960, he was a student teacher under Vern Wolfe at North Phoenix High.

Before Bullard came to USC as a student-athlete, he was the national JC pole vault champion in 1956 at Phoenix College and was the Arizona state champ in 1954 at North Phoenix High as a senior under Wolfe.

Bullard received a bachelor's degree in education from USC in 1959 and a master's degree in physical education from Arizona State in 1961. He is the author of four books on track (a fifth is being written) and is in demand as a guest at track clinics and camps.

Born on July 30, 1937, he has a son, Denton, 29, and a daughter, Kari, 22, a student at USC.

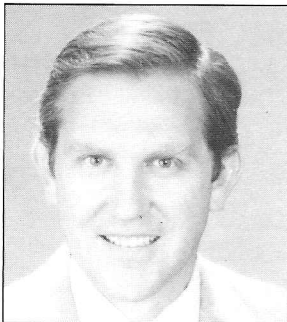

Events over one lap are officially recorded in tenths and no auto timing factors are therefore presented.

100 yard, 100 meter, 200 meter, 220 yard hand times are converted to automatic "equivalents" by adding a factor of 0.24; 400 meter flat and hurdles, add 0.14; 400 relay, add 0.14 hand-timed yards to automatic metric equivalent; 440 yards flat and hurdles, subtract 0.16; 440 relay, subtract 0.06; hand-timed decathlons are worth about an extra 75 points compared to an automatically timed ten-eventer.

LARRY KNUTH

Assistant Coach



When Ernie Bullard was named head track coach at USC, he called on his old friend and book collaborator, Larry Knuth, to rebuild the USC distance program. The 47-year-old Knuth worked quickly and has impressively rebuilt Troy's distance program. Among his accomplishments has been the revival of USC's cross country program. In 1985, the University fielded its first team in 13 years, and this past fall Knuth's squad defeated highly-ranked Notre Dame and finished third in the NCAA District VIII.

Bullard found Knuth working as a journalism advisor at Saddleback (Calif.) College where he was from 1977 to 1984. During a three-year stint as cross-country coach at UC Irvine, Knuth took a team that finished in last place in the conference during his first year (1979) and won the PCAA title the following year (1980). He was named PCAA Coach of the Year for the turnaround.

In his 15 years as a cross-country coach, Knuth's teams have won more than 80 percent of their meets. In 1967 his team at Pasadena (Calif.) City College won the California state JC championship.

Among the other California community colleges where Knuth has coached are Palomar, Glendale and Fullerton. In the first four years of his JC coaching career, he had eight runners who clocked 4:12 or better in the mile, two of which were Southern California champions.

At UCI in 1981, one of his runners, John Gerhardt, won the PCAA cross-country individual title and another, Joe Young, was the conference 1500 champion. Gerhardt also finished eighth at the 1981 TAC cross-country championships.

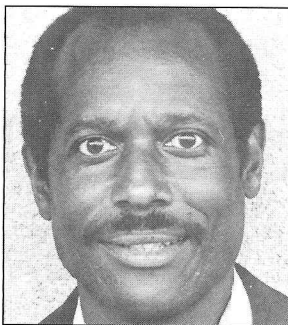
A fine instructor in the classroom, Knuth teaches courses in USC's sports information academic program.

A three-sport letterman at California High in Whittier, Calif., Knuth went on to compete for Jim Bush at Fullerton College and Cornelius Warmerdam at Fresno State. Bush went on to build one of collegiate track's finest programs at UCLA and Warmerdam was the first man to clear 15 feet in the pole vault.

Knuth and his wife June have two daughters, Lindsay, 12, and Cameron, 6.

HILLIARD SUMNER

Assistant Coach



The 43-year-old Sumner joined the USC staff last summer to coach the men's sprints, then added the Women of Troy sprinters to his charges when Mike Bailey took over for Fred LaPlante in August.

Sumner enjoyed great success as the coach of the Win America youth track club, where he helped develop prep sprint sensations Quincy Watts (now a Trojan sprinter) and Brian Bridgewater, 1988 California State champ in the 200. He also coached Watts at Taft High in Woodland Hills, Calif.

From 1976 to 1981, Sumner was the head coach of the Southern California Striders and also competed on the SubMasters level (ages 30-39). He posted bests of 21.2 for 200 meters and 46.7 for 400 meters when he was 34 years old.

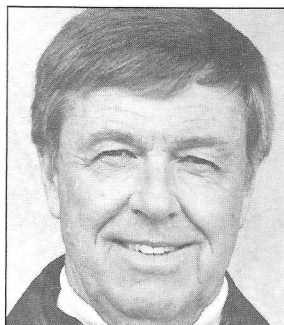
Out of coaching between 1981 and 1987, Sumner was a business manager and administrator with Collisson & Kaplam, and John Fluke Manufacturing. During that time he organized numerous track meets involving SubMaster and Master athletes.

He received his degree in accounting from Temple University in 1970 and received CPA certification in 1976. He earned an executive management certificate from UCLA in 1977.

Born on Dec. 17, 1945, Sumner has four children: Kim, 23, Tracy, 21, Hilliard III, 13, and Quincy, 13.

JIM BUSH

Assistant Coach



One of the great coaches in college track, Bush is in his first year coaching USC's hurdlers. His teams at UCLA won four NCAA titles during his 20 years in Westwood. And Bush was voted to the National Track and Field Hall of Fame in 1987.

Since retiring from UCLA in 1984, Bush has served as conditioning coach for the Los Angeles Dodgers and Los Angeles Raiders.

While at UCLA, Bush's teams won 88.1% of their dual meets and seven conference championships.

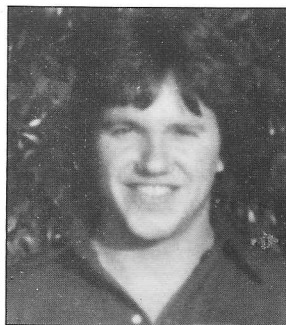
The Bruins were named National Dual Meet champions 10 times by Track and Field News under Bush, posting undefeated seasons in each of those years. He was honored as National Coach of the Year in 1971 and 1973.

Bush began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Berkeley (Calif.) High in 1952 and then moved south to Fullerton High, where he spent seven years (1953-59). After two seasons at Fullerton College (1960-61) and three years at Occidental College (1962-64), Bush succeeded the late Ducky Drake as UCLA's head track coach in 1965.

Born in Cleveland, Ohio, the 62-year-old Bush was a quartermiler at California and graduated from the Berkeley campus in 1951.

BYRON HANSEN

Trainer



In his 10th year at USC, Hansen handles the duties as trainer for the men's track team, as well as other intercollegiate sports at Troy.

The 33-year-old Hansen came to USC in 1980 after serving as assistant trainer at Colorado from 1978 to 1980. He received his master's degree in physical education from Colorado in 1981.

Byron also served as a trainer for basketball at the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles.

A native of Albany, Oregon, Hansen received his bachelor's degree from Oregon in 1978 in Health Education. At South Albany High, Hansen played football and was one of the top running backs in the area.

Byron and his wife, Laurie, have a 3-year-old daughter, Kelly, and another daughter, Kristin, who was born this past July.

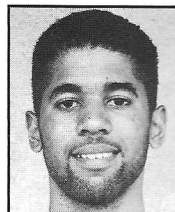

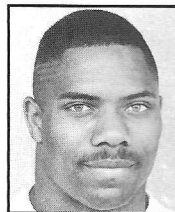

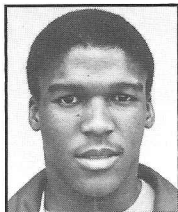


RICKY ERVINS — 5-8, 190, So., Sprints

BERT FULLER — 5-8, 163, Sr., Sprints

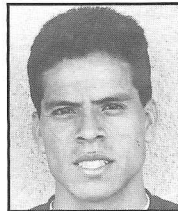

CAREER BESTS: 10.65 (10.61w), 100 meters; 21.70, 200 meters.



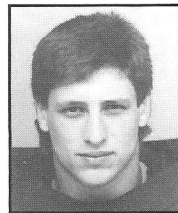
ADOLFO GARCIA — 5-7, 130, Sr., Distances

MATT GEE — 6-3, 230, Fr., Throws

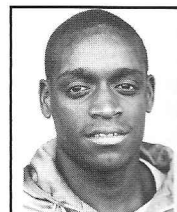

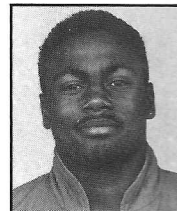

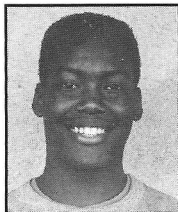
TRAVIS HANNAH — 5-9, 160, Fr., Sprints

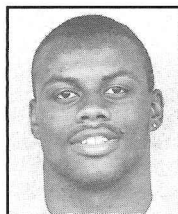
GREG HARPER — 6-4, 170, Sr., Triple Jump

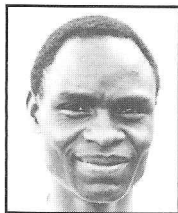

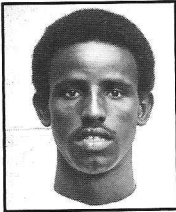


FREDSON MAYIEK — 5-10, 126, Sr., Distances

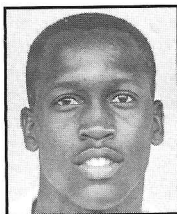

GEORGE PORTER — 6-5, 190, Jr., Hurdles

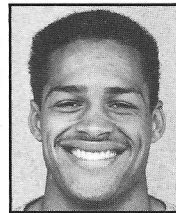

He was undefeated during his senior year in 1985, including the league, CIF 1-A, state and International Prep Invitational titles . . . Ran six races under 36.0 in 1985 . . . George was *Track and Field News'* top-ranked intermediate hurdler among the nation's preps in 1985 and was No. 3 in 1984 . . . Had the third best time in the U.S. in the 300 hurdles as a junior (36.10) while winning the state title in his specialty . . . Porter was named the state's Athlete of the Year in 1985 by Cal-Hi Sports . . . A fine high hurdler, Porter has run 14.0 over prep high hurdles . . . Porter won the CIF 1-A 110-meter highs at the 1985 CIF meet (14.29, the race was rerun during the following week because it was originally run over a short course) . . . A star basketball player, Porter averaged 21 points per game for Cabrillo's cagers in 1985.

ROBERT READING — 6-4, 195, Sr., Hurdles

COLLEGE: One of the nation's top collegiate high hurdlers, Reading clocked a season-best 13.70 in the 110-meter high hurdles while taking second at the Fresno Relays last year . . . Although he did not match his 1987 personal best of 13.64, Reading became more consistent with four races faster than 13.80 . . . Primed for the NCAA finals last year after running 13.74 in the heats, Reading fell over a tumbling Arthur Blake

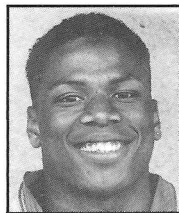
(a 1988 U.S. Olympian) in the finals and had to settle for seventh place when he got up and finished . . . The 1988 Pacific-10 champion, Robert won that title in 13.82 . . . Reading also competed in the Olympic Trials and the TAC Championships last summer . . . Robert's 13.64 hurdle PR came at the Modesto Relays in 1987, the fourth best ever by a Trojan . . . Also ran a hand-timed 13.4 last summer . . . In the 1987 UCLA dual meet, Reading managed a second against the formidable Bruin hurdle corps and clocked a 13.89 . . . Qualified for the 1987 Pac-10 meet, but a leg injury kept him from competing . . . As a freshman, Reading ran 13.83 while taking second in the 1986 Pac-10 110-meter high hurdles after running an identical time in the league prelims . . . Narrowly missed qualifying for the NCAA finals in his specialty, clocking 13.88 in the heats (he missed by .06 of a second) . . . Perhaps his breakthrough race was at the 1986 Pepsi Invitational at UCLA when, despite finishing seventh, Robert clocked a then-PR 13.85 against the likes of former Trojan Tonie Campbell, Greg Foster and Roger Kingdom . . . He won the high hurdles against UCLA in 13.96 as a freshman . . . Took fourth at the 1986 Jenner Classic with a respectable 13.92 . . . Ran wind-aided times in the San Jose State dual of 13.9 (hurdles) and 10.59 (100).

HIGH SCHOOL: Reading won the state title in the 110-meter high hurdles in 13.88 as a senior at St. Mary's College High in Berkeley, Calif. . . . His PR at the state meet was the fourth best time ever by an East Bay prep . . . He was the third St. Mary's hurdler in six years to win the state title . . . At the 1985 North Coast Section 2-A South meet, he won the highs (13.9), 300 intermediates (37.9), the long jump (23-4½) and 200 meters (21.3) . . . His career best in the long jump is 23-6¼ and he has run the 300 IH in 37.41 . . . St. Mary's never lost a dual meet during Reading's career . . . His effort at the North Coast meet got him the *Oakland Tribune's* Prep Athlete of the Week honors . . . He also played wide receiver in football and forward on his school's basketball team.

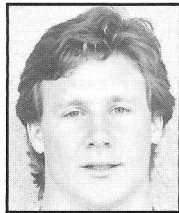
QUINCY WATTS — 6-2, 196, Fr., Sprints

HIGH SCHOOL: One of the most sought-after prep track recruits in the nation last year while at Taft High in Woodland Hills, Calif., Watts could be the newest addition to USC's great tradition in the sprints . . . Watts' star seemed to shine brightest at the California State meet — in 1986 as a sophomore he won the 200 meters (21.03) and took second in the 100 (10.59); in 1987

Quincy won both sprints, 10.49 in the 100 (edging out current USC teammate Calvin Holmes) and 20.99 in the 200; and in 1988 Watts finished second in the 200 (21.02), despite missing most of his senior season with a hamstring injury. . . The injury forced Watts to concentrate on the longer 400 meters and he responded by winning the L.A. City title in that race last year (47.38) . . . He won the West Valley League 400 with a personal-best 46.67 . . . Quincy came back after the 400 in the City meet and placed second in the fastest 200 in the U.S. last year (Watts ran 20.67 to Brian Bridgewater's 20.53) . . . Virtually unbeatable as a junior in 1987, Watts logged his sprint personal bests of 10.30 and 20.50 while winning the 100 and 200 at the Junior Olympics meet . . . In 1987 Watts ran faster than 10.54 in the 100 eight times and under 21.00 in the 200 10 times . . . Clocked a 10.17 with an aiding wind of 3.78 meters per second to win the 1987 L.A. City 100 . . . His winning time in the City 200 two years ago was a legal 20.63.

PERSONAL: Quincy was born in Detroit, Mich., on June 19, 1970.

CAREER BESTS: 10.30 (10.17w), 100 meters, 20.50, 200 meters; 46.67, 400 meters.



GARY WELLMAN — 5-9, 175, So., Sprints

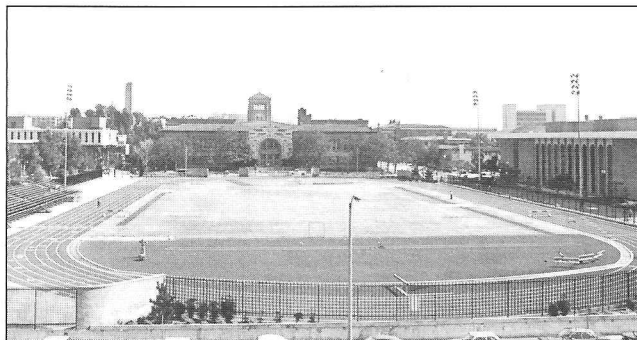
COLLEGE: A flanker on USC's 1988 Rose Bowl football team, Wellman is back for his second year on the Trojan track team . . . Wellman's track duties last year included running the first leg of USC's 400-meter relay team . . . With Wellman at the start, Troy finished fourth at the 1988 Pac-10 Championships (40.60) . . . USC's No. 3 receiver last season, Wellman caught 21

passes for 377 yards (18.0 yards per catch) and scored 2 touchdowns.

HIGH SCHOOL: One of the top prep sprint talents in the state three years ago while at Westlake High in Westlake Village, Calif., Wellman finished fifth at the 1986 state meet in the 100 meters (10.67) . . . He also took second at the CIF 4-A meet (10.77) and third at the CIF Masters meet (10.68) in 1986 . . . Wellman was the double sprint champ of the Marmonte League in 1986, winning the 100 in 10.5 and the 200 in 21.8 . . . He set a Marmonte League record as a junior in 1985 with a 10.4 clocking at the league finals . . . Gary finished fourth in the 1985 CIF 4-A 100 with an impressive, but windy 10.63 . . . Wellman was an All-CIF Coastal Conference pick as an all-purpose player at Westlake during his senior football season . . . In 1985 he rushed for 890 yards (7.7 average), caught 35 passes (14.6 average) and set a school record for points in a season (146).

PERSONAL: Wellman was born in Syracuse, N.Y., on Aug. 9, 1967 . . . His major at USC is business.

CAREER BESTS: 10.67, 100 meters.



CROMWELL TRACK AND FIELD

Used as a training and warm-up facility during the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles, Cromwell Track and Field underwent a complete refurbishing in fall, 1983. Not only was the track resurfaced, but a new drainage system was also added.

A new Rekortan surface, the same as the Olympic track in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum, has eight, 42-inch lanes. The high jump area is larger than before and there are two new sand pits for the horizontal jumps.

Cromwell Field has been renovated as recently as 1979, but all that remains from the first facelift is the equipment storeroom and weightroom on the track's southwest perimeter. Although there are no permanent grandstands yet, a \$1.8 million fundraising drive is on and when that financial goal is reached, a doubledeck stadium capable of holding 5,000 people will be constructed.

HERITAGE

CHAMPIONS AND RECORD HOLDERS

WORLD RECORDS: 61 USC trackmen have equalled or bettered world records since 1912.

OLYMPIC GAMES: USC trackmen have won 23 individual Olympic titles and have shared in seven relay victories. Fifty-seven men have won a total of 86 places on United States Olympic teams.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS: USC has won 26 out of the 63 NCAA Outdoor meets since its beginning in 1921. On 10 occasions they have finished second. The Trojans won nine in a row (1935-1943), and seven straight (1949-1955). They have also won two NCAA Indoor Championships since its beginning in 1965. A total of 96 individual outdoor championships highlight the record.

WOMEN'S TRACK

MICHELLE TAYLOR

1989 USC WOMEN'S TRACK AND FIELD PROSPECTUS

First-year coach **Mike Bailey**, who took over for **Fred LaPlante** (he is the men's assistant at his alma mater, Eastern Michigan) last summer, does not lose much in numbers from last year's seventh-place NCAA team, just two national scorers. But in those two scorers, Bailey begins his college head coaching career without two of the best female jumpers ever in college track — **Wendy Brown** and **Yvette Bates**.

Brown, the 1988 NCAA champion and U.S. Olympian in the heptathlon, and Bates, a two-time NCAA indoor triple jump titlist who narrowly missed qualifying for the Olympics in the long jump, were primarily responsible for USC's top 10 NCAA finishes the last three years in a row. Nevertheless, Bailey is optimistic about the talented crew he has coming back.

"Obviously we've lost a lot of scoring power since last year, but we still have a team that will have an impact at the NCAA meet," said Bailey. "We had some veterans who came forward last year and I expect more of that this year. And I really like the young talent we recruited for this year."

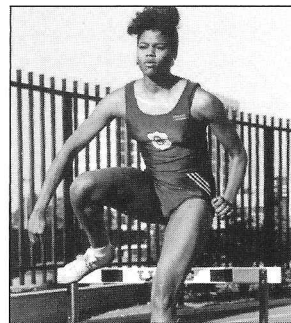
Here's a closer look at the 1989 Women of Troy:

SPRINTS — An experienced group, the Trojan sprinters are led by senior **Michelle Taylor** (23.74, 52.41), an NCAA scorer last year in the 400, and junior **Louan Gualdo** (11.91, 24.10), an NCAA competitor in the long jump a year ago. Taylor, whose vast range allows her to run the sprint relay or go as far as 800 meters, also competed in the Olympic Trials last summer. The versatile Gualdo will add the 100-meter hurdles to her sprinter/jumper repertoire. Sophomore **Ronda Brooks** (11.73, 23.95) and junior **Noelle Chapin** (24.97, 54.91) were factors on the conference level last year.

HURDLES — Led by Olympian **Leslie Maxie** (55.20), this department could be USC's best. After Maxie, the USC record holder who took second in the 400-meter hurdles at 1988 TAC meet and Olympic Trials, senior **Karen Koellner** (58.14), who ran in last year's NCAA meet, adds a second potential NCAA scorer in the 400 hurdles. Sophomore **Effie Daetz** (13.89), a 1988 Pac-10 finalist in the 100-meter hurdles, freshman **Michelle DeCoux** (13.86hs, 42.16hs), a double hurdles winner at the 1988 California State meet while at Bishop O'Dowd High in Oakland, Calif., and Gualdo will look to close the void in the 100-meter hurdles left by Bates and Brown.

DISTANCES — Another strong corps for the Women of Troy, led by senior **Lesley Noll** (2:03.30, 4:17.25), the USC record holder in the 800 and 1500. Noll competed in the NCAA meet and Olympic Trials last year. Two former USC record holders in the 1500, senior **Elise Lyon** (4:16.12, 9:32.0) and junior **Shannon Clark** (2:09.95, 4:22.06, 9:41.41) add talent and experience, the latter being particularly important to this category because there are also three freshmen. The young trio includes **Amy Goodwin** (2:09.86, 4:34.0) of Bellville (Tex.) High, **Robbyn Bryant** (4:29.3) of Hesperia (Calif.) High, and **Tracy Boudreau** (2:12.2) of Huron High in Ann Arbor, Mich. Goodwin is a four-time Texas state champion in the 800, Bryant ran the second fastest prep mile in the nation in 1987, and Boudreau was a three-time All-Michigan performer.

JUMPS — How do you replace perhaps the greatest long/triple jump duo ever in women's collegiate track? Bailey has no delusions of matching the exploits of the departed "B & B Girls," but he still has a solid 20-foot jumper in Guialdo (20-5¾). Junior **Yleana Carrasco**, a 6-0 high jumper as a prep, but hindered by injuries at Troy, is hoping to return to her former performance level.

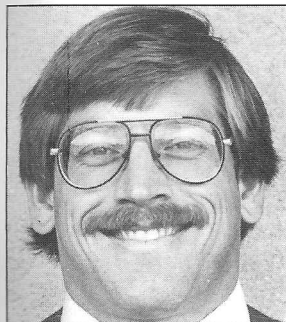
THROWS — Although a thin department, senior discus thrower **Claudia Paris** (176-11) returns. Paris, the USC record holder, was an NCAA finalist last year, but did not score. Freshman **Ashley Selman** (158-9) was the No. 5 prep javelin thrower in the U.S. last year while at Foothill High in Orange, Calif., even though the event is not included at California high school meets. Selman also has strong potential in the heptathlon and will help in the jumps.

MIKE BAILEY

Head Coach



It was fitting that Mike Bailey, Fred LaPlante's right-hand man the last two track seasons, was elevated to head coach when LaPlante decided to return to his alma mater, Eastern Michigan, as an assistant men's track coach. Although Bailey had been at USC only two years, his imprint on the women's track program at Troy is easy to see.

After coaching two Pac-10 champs in his first year at USC (Wendy Brown and Diana Clements), Bailey helped Brown to the 1988 NCAA heptathlon title and a place on the 1988 U.S. Olympic team. He helped Yvette Bates to two NCAA indoor triple jump titles and to the Olympic Trials, where Bates tied for second place, but settled for alternate's status on the basis of her second best jump.

Before coming to USC, Bailey coached at Idaho State for two years and at Judge Memorial High in Salt Lake City, Utah for four years.

A former decathlete himself, the 32-year-old Bailey has scored 7,621 points in the 10-eventer, even though he never competed in track in college. Instead, he started for four years at middle linebacker at Utah and continued for two years in the Canadian Football League with Calgary and Saskatchewan.

Mike and his wife, Cindy, have a 12-year-old son, Michael.

YVETTE BATES

Assistant Coach



One of the best female jumpers ever in college track, Bates will now lend her expertise in the jumps to the Women of Troy.

Bates, 23, was a two-time NCAA indoor triple jump champ (1987 and 1988) as a collegian and scored in the outdoor nationals three of her four years at Troy. Bates added a bit of drama to the long jump at last year's U.S. Olympic Trials when she leaped a wind-aided 22-7, more than a foot farther than she had ever jumped. Her effort put her

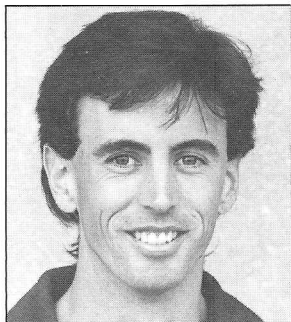
in a three-way tie for second place, but she lost out on an Olympic team berth on the basis of her second best jump.

A prep All-American while at Berkeley (Calif.) High, Bates was the nation's No. 2 high school triple jumper in 1984. She finished second at the Junior Nationals in 1982 and represented the United States at the Junior Pan-Am Games that year.

Born in Oakland, Calif., on Dec. 28, 1965, Yvette's first name is Dorothea, but prefers to be called by her middle name.

JERRY MARSH

Assistant Coach



Formerly a cross country and distance runner at UCLA, Jerry Marsh comes across town to assist with the women's distance runners at USC.

Marsh was at UCLA from 1983-87, competing in cross country in the fall and track in the spring. He finished 9th at the 1984 Pac-10 Cross Country Championships and 21st at the 1985 Championships, but his promising career was curtailed by knee problems which slowed him down late in his career.

Still, his 11th place finish at the 1985 NCAA District VIII Cross Country Championships helped the Bruins qualify for the national meet.

In the winter of 1985, Jerry won the Mission Bay Marathon. He prepped at La Jolla (Calif.) Country Day School.

HELAINE CLAYMAN

Trainer



A 1980 graduate of USC, Clayman serves as the trainer for the Women of Troy track squad.

In her ninth year on USC's training staff, the 30-year-old Clayman also works with all other women's sports at Troy, as well as men's volleyball. She earned her bachelor's degree in sports medicine and is currently working on her doctorate in exercise physiology.

Clayman was a swimmer as a prep and graduated from Venice (Calif.) High in 1976.

She was No. 4 in the nation in 1986 with a best of 42.58 in the 300 hurdles . . . Won the San Francisco/Oakland regional title in the 300 hurdles in 1986 (43.84) . . . The versatile Brooks has also long jumped 19-7 and clocked 53.8 on a leg of the 1600-meter relay . . . Named Oakland Tribune Female Athlete of the Year in 1986.

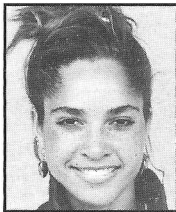
**YLEANA CARRASCO — 5-9, 130, Jr.,

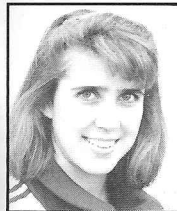
has also clocked 25.2 for 200 meters.

Mid-Distances**

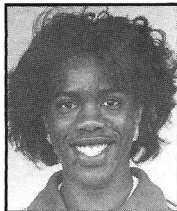

SAC Relays . . . Finished fourth at last year's Pac-10 Championships in the 1500 (4:31.94) . . . At the 1988 UCLA dual, Clark

notched third place in the 3000 (9:58.17), the only time she ran that distance a year ago . . . Shannon burst onto the collegiate track scene as a freshman in 1987 and set two USC records in the process (4:22.06 in the 1500, since broken by USC teammate Lesley Noll, and 9:41.41 in the 3000) . . . In her first race as a collegian, Clark ran an impressive 4:23.8 at UC Irvine . . . Finished seventh in the 1500 at the 1987 Pac-10 meet.

HIGH SCHOOL: A two-time California state champ in the 1600 as a prep at Mountain View (Calif.) High, Clark was one of the nation's top milers for three years while in high school . . . Clark ran her 4:47.20 personal best while winning the state 1600 as a sophomore in 1984 . . . She repeated as state champ in 1985 (4:49.14) and finished third in 1986 (4:48.54) . . . Also won the Central Coast Section 1600 title in 1984 as a soph . . . A solid cross-country performer during her prep career, Clark took second in the Northern California championships for three straight years (1983-84-85) and was third in 1986 . . . She won the CCS cross-country title in 1983 and 1984 . . . At the end of her sophomore year, Shannon finished third at the U.S. Junior Championships in the 1500 (4:31.00) at the Los Angeles Coliseum.

COLLEGE: Ran a hand-timed 13.7 last year at the Occidental Invitational and clocked automatic times of 14.16 or better on five occasions . . . Effie's season best auto time of 14.08 placed her seventh at last year's Pac-10 Championships . . . Also clocked 12.56 for 100 meters in 1988.

HIGH SCHOOL: One of the best prep hurdlers in the nation in 1987 while at Leigh High in Los

Gatos, Calif., Daetz ran personal bests of 13.76 in the 100-meter hurdles and 41.86 in the 300-meter hurdles . . . Also ran a windy 13.63 while winning the 100 hurdles at the Central Coast Section championships . . . Effie's legal PRs came at the 1987 State meet, taking third in the 100 hurdles and second in the 300 hurdles (also second best performer in the nation) . . . Ran the fourth fastest prep time over 33-inch hurdles (international height) at the TAC Junior Championships in Tucson and took second in the process (13.89) . . . LOUAN GUALDO — 5-7, 117, Jr., Jumps, Sprints, Hurdles

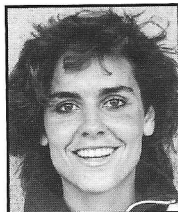

Took sixth at the 1987 Pac-10 meet in the 400 hurdles . . . Karen has run the 800 in 2:11.34 (she did it while finishing third during USC's 69-67 win against UCLA in 1986) . . . At the 1986 Pac West Championships, Karen took third in the 400 (56.82) and 400 hurdles (1:01.02), and ran a leg on the winning 1600-meter relay.

HIGH SCHOOL: Koellner was the Iowa state champion in the 400 hurdles while at Ames High in 1985 . . . Had a best of 1:01.5 in the 400 hurdles . . . CAREER BESTS: 58.14, 400-meter hurdles; 55.02, 400 meters; 2:11.34, 800 meters.



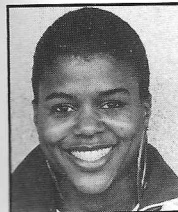

Maxie competed in Seoul, but did not get past the first round . . . Also finished second at the 1988 TAC Championships . . . As a sophomore in 1987, Leslie finished second in the 400 hurdles (55.79, the USC record) at the

NCAA Championships and anchored USC's national champion 1600-meter relay . . . She was also the 1987 Pac-10 titlist in the 400 hurdles . . . Maxie became the USC record holder the first time she ran the race for Troy in 1986 and finished the year with a best of 56.72 against UCLA . . . She also anchored the USC 1600-meter relay (3:32.58, fifth best collegiate time in 1986) to a dramatic win against the Bruins in 1986, giving the Trojans a 69-67 victory (Maxie was timed in 52.8 on her leg) . . . In addition to being the school 400 hurdle record holder, Maxie is No. 3 in the 400 (53.90) and sixth in the 200 (24.08) on USC's all-time lists . . . Leslie was ranked 10th in the U.S. in 1986 by *Track and Field News* and her season best made her the 48th fastest performer in the world (10th in the nation) . . . Leslie ran the leadoff leg on the Pac West-champion 400 relay, but a pulled hamstring suffered during the meet kept her out of her specialty in the NCAA meet.

HIGH SCHOOL: The 1984 Female High School Athlete of the Year in *Track and Field News*, Maxie finished fifth in the U.S. Olympic Trials that year in the 400-meter hurdles . . . The national record holder in the 300-meter hurdles (40.18), set in 1984 . . . Although slowed by injury as a senior in 1985 at Mills High in Millbrae, she was still the nation's top-ranked long hurdler and ran 57.73 and 40.51 . . . She had the No. 3 time at 200 meters in the nation (23.44), too . . . Also won the state and TAC junior championship in her specialty in 1985 . . . Her 55.20 clocking is also a world junior record, and gave her second place at the 1984 TAC meet . . . Lesley was the Pac-10 champion in

the 800 last year (2:04.60) . . . Ran 2:06.02 at the 1988 NCAA meet and narrowly missed qualifying for the finals . . . She competed at the Olympic Trials last summer . . . Her improved speed was evident in last year's first meet when Noll ran a personal-best 55.6 for 400

meters . . . Noll was unbeaten in 9 races before the NCAA meet . . . Ran a 1987 best of 2:06.81 while placing fourth at the Pac-10 meet . . . She has won the 800 against UCLA three years in a row . . . Lesley won the Pac West title in the 800 (2:07.59) as a freshman in 1986.

HIGH SCHOOL: One of San Diego's top prep runners at 400 and 800 meters, Noll ran the fourth fastest 800 in the nation in 1985 (2:08.00) . . . CAREER BESTS: 55.6, 400 meters; 2:03.30, 800 meters; 4:17.25, 1500 meters.



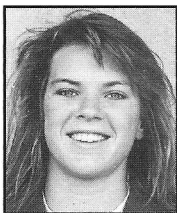
CLAUDIA PARIS — 5-11, 180, Sr., Discus
