Pastor's Note

This is so Boring!

I like to think Christians know the Bible better than non-Christians, but I realize that's not always the case. I know Christians who know very little Bible and non-Christians who have spent years studying the Bible.

Taking this idea a step further, among Christians, most know the New Testament better than the Old. If for no other reason, there is less of it to know. The New Testament has twenty-seven books, the Old Testament has thirty-nine. Most of us have been raised hearing about Jesus, the apostles, and Paul, and most of our Sunday School lessons are from the New Testament.

I also think people are intimidated by the Old Testament. All those hard-to-pronounce names, places, kings—and all those dates! Add in the sacrifices and worship rituals in the temple, and you are left wondering what to make of it. But when it comes to Jesus' parables or Paul's letters, they feel like letters from home.

But for this issue of the Bell Tower, I want to draw your attention to an Old Testament book. The final book in the Old Testament. And it is perhaps one of the least familiar books of the Bible, the book of the prophet Malachi.

Without unpacking all the details, I want to turn your attention to Malachi's opening chapter. In these first fourteen verses, Malachi reveals a concern on the mind of God. His concern is twofold: (1) He is being taken for granted, not respected, and (2) He is being endured, not enjoyed. Let's consider each point.

1. God is being taken for granted, not respected.

"A son honors his father, and a servant his master. Then if I am a father, where is my honor? And if I am a master, where is My respect?' Says the Lord of hosts to you, O priests who despise My name." Malachi 1:6.

God uses a situation we can all relate to. He says, "Look at the way you treat the people around you. Consider how you treat your parents or those you work for. For the most part, you treat them with respect. You do what they ask, even more so if you genuinely love them."



Then God simply asks, "Where is My respect?" In other words, respect is evident in behavior. The abusive spouse and negligent parent are contradictory terms. Spouses are not supposed to abuse and parents are not to neglect. So God asks his people, "How can you say I am your God when you don't do what I say?" To put it in words a bit more familiar, "You are my friends if you do what I command you" John 15:14.

2. God is being endured, not enjoyed.

"But you profane it [God's name] when you say that the Lord's table is polluted, and its fruit, that is, its food may be despised. But you say, 'What a weariness this is,' and you snort at it, says the LORD of hosts. You bring what you been taken by violence or is lame or sick, and this you bring as your offering! Shall I accept that from your hand? says the LORD." – Malachi 1:12-13

In the Old Testament economy, love and respect of God were evident in one's sacrifices. God had commanded His people to bring him the very best. To those who love God, this was an easy command since it is what they longed to do. But when love grows cold worship becomes a hassle.

Professor Robert Alden sums up the lesson of Malachi 1:10 this way,

"[God] wished that the temple would just go out of business. As long it was not serving as a meeting place for God and man, why should any perfunctory and self-deceiving rituals go on in it? Not only were the sacrifices ineffective, but the people were lulled into thinking that their deeds were winning God's approval. So why not just shut the temple doors and be done with what was for the priests [and the people] just a nuisance?

"This thought may be applied to present-day churches that have ceased to be places where people worship in spirit and truth and are merely meeting places and nothing more. It would be better for them to just close down than to continue misleading those who think that what they are doing pleases God. God could hardly have spoken his mind more clearly than he did in this last part of verse 10, 'I am not pleased with you... and I will accept no offering from your hands.'"

As we begin a new year, lets decide to eliminate some of the routine distractions and focus more of our time and attention on respecting and enjoying our God.



No matter what disappointments or frustrations we face in life, we can either let it get us down or not, depending on how we handle it-which is our attitude.


If we have an attitude of self-pity and feel that it's 'not fair', then we won't rise above it, instead we will feel miserable.


