

Death Penalty Recommended for McDowell

Last week, a
Nassau County jury
has recommended the
death penalty for Patrick
McDowell for the murder
of 29-year-old Nassau
County Deputy Joshua
Moyers. In March of
2023, McDowell plead
guilty to First-Degree
Murder; Injuring a Police

Dog; and eight counts of Aggravated Assault on a Law Enforcement Officer. The Honorable James H. Daniel will formally sentence McDowell at a later date.


Around midnight on September 23, 2021, Deputy Josh Moyers was patrolling in Nassau County when he saw a red van with a stolen tag. He followed the van, driven by McDowell, out of a gas station and turned on his emergency lights. McDowell and the passenger in the van, Noelle Gale, had been smoking methamphetamine throughout the night. McDowell pulled over and Moyers asked for identification. McDowell provided a fake name and Gale showed a photo of her driver's license. Moyers radioed for backup as he continued the traffic stop. When Moyers reached for the driver's door handle as he asked McDowell to step out of the vehicle, McDowell grabbed his loaded gun and shot Moyers in the face. Moyers immediately fell to the ground, and McDowell leaned out of the van and shot Moyers twice in the back. McDowell told Gale that "it was me or him" and he was not going back to jail; McDowell had an outstanding arrest warrant for Violation of Probation at the time he was pulled over. He sped down Sandy Ford Road and left Moyers to die. Only a minute or so later, a deputy responded to assist Moyers with the traffic stop and found Moyers lying unresponsive with multiple gunshot wounds. Moyers was



pronounced deceased days later.

Gale turned herself in to the police shortly after while McDowell abandoned the van, armed himself, and hid in the woods at the end of Sandy Ford Road. Officers from across Northeast Florida and Southeast Georgia

responded to assist in the manhunt. In the early morning hours of September 24. 2021. the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office SWAT Team along with NCSO deputies utilized JSO K9 Chaos to track McDowell. The K9 handler released Chaos, and McDowell fired two shots, injuring K9 Chaos. Officers returned fire. It wouldn't be until September 28 that McDowell was finally captured with the help of numerous agencies and JSO K9 Huk. During the penalty phase prior to closing arguments, McDowell took the stand and confirmed the State's case admitting weeks before he planned to kill any law enforcement member who attempted to arrest him. On the night he killed Moyers, McDowell admitted he lured him to a dark,



secluded area to carry this out.

Tragedy Strikes West Nassau High School Warrior Tribe

On the eve of one of the special nights of your high school experience, the Junior-Senior Prom, a junior from West Nassau High School, was in a tragic accident on US 301 on Saturday, April 27. The tragedy doesn't end there, on Sunday evening, April 28, a WNHS senior was fatally injured in another automobile accident.

According to reports, Hannah McKelvy, 16, received life-threatening injuries in an accident that occurred Saturday, April 27 on US 301 near Bryceville. Hannah remains in UF Health with serious injuries. Continue to pray for her and her family.

Sunday, April 28, West Nassau senior, Sydney Weiscopf, 17, was fatally injured in an accident off of CR 121. According to Florida Highway Patrol reports, around 9:50 p.m. Sunday, the 16-year-old driver of a pickup truck was traveling southbound on CR 121 at Batten Road. Sydney, 17, of Bryceville, driving a SUV, was traveling northbound on CR 121 at Batten Road. The driver of the pickup truck failed to keep a single lane and entered into the northbound lane, directly into the path of Sydney's vehicle. The left front portion of the truck collided with the left front portion of the SUV. The driver of the truck was transported to the hospital with minor injuries. Sydney

was pronounced deceased at the scene by Nassau County Fire Rescue. No criminal charges have been filed at this time, pending completion of the accident investigation.

Sydney was an excellent student, graduating a year early. She attended West Nassau High School until January. She then switched to Nassau Virtual School to complete her education. She will be awarded her diploma for her many achievements. She left her mark on those she came in contact with. Following is a post from Sydney's mother Sherry: There are no words but then there are many. You (Sydney) drove me crazy because you were so head-strong and did things your way. Your Dad and I are not sure what to do now. Our baby girl is gone. We love you! 17 years wasn't enough but we are so glad we had you those years. Sydney left our house to go pick up a friend. She was less than 2 miles from our house when the truck heading toward her crossed into her lane and hit the left side of her vehicle. She was wearing her seatbelt. Please pray for the boy that hit her. He has to live with this the rest of his life. Yes, we will live the rest of ours without Sydney, but she is not in any physical or mental pain.

We ask your prayers for these families, friends, students and administration during this difficult time.

Recently, his was in Walmart in Kingsland and a young lady yelled, "Hey Coach Stearn!" He quickly turned around and she was coming to get a hug from him. She asked if she could take a selfie with him and post it on her Facebook. She said my friends are going to be mad they didn't see you. It is random for us to go anywhere with my parents and someone not come up and speak to them. They have quite a

In the Kitchen... 2 (16 oz.) jars prepared salsa

1 lb. ground beef

1 (15.5 oz.) jar prepared salsa con queso

Easy Enchiladas

20 (8 inch) flour tortillas 1 (8 oz.) package shredded Cheddar-Monterey Jack cheese blend

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease a 9x13 inch baking dish, and pour the salsa into the bottom of the dish. Set aside. Cook and stir the ground beef in a skillet over medium heat for about 10 minutes, until meat is browned and crumbly. Drain the grease from the beef, and add the salsa con queso to the skillet, stirring to mix well. Place about 2 tablespoons of the beef mixture down the center of each tortilla, roll the tortillas, and place them seam side down on top of the salsa in the baking dish. Sprinkle the shredded cheese on top of the enchiladas. Bake for 15 to 20 minutes, until the cheese is browned and the enchiladas are hot and bubbling.



In the first half of 1 Timothy 6, Paul warns Timothy of false teachers. He says they are unteachable, argumentative, envious, dissenting, slanderous, suspicious, and constantly bringing friction. Then starting in verse 11, Paul gives Timothy a better way. He says: "But as for you, O man of God, flee these things. Pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, steadfastness, gentleness. Fight the good fight of the faith. Take hold of the eternal life to which you were called and about which you made

the good confession in the presence of many witnesses" (1 Timothy 6:11-12, ESV).

In opposition to the false teachers, Timothy is charged to flee these things. He is not instructed to figure out these evils or to come up with a plan to counter-act them. He is given one instruction: FLEE. Hot foot it out of there, cut and run, dip, duck out, hit the road, split, beat feet, book it, vamoose, bolt, clear out. This is our call as well. When the enemy comes around tempting us to do the wrong thing, we are to get out of there.



nose into the family's business," Hurley said. "A wedding that may or may not happen is just the beginning."





One Family's Mission

A whole new world opened for Thomas "TJ" Jackson when he joined the Sons of Confederate Veterans Kirby-Smith Camp 1209. TJ, his wife Mandi and their son Tommy moved from Tennessee to Green Cove Springs in December 2021 due to job transfers. TJ joined the SCV in February 2023 and soon after took a course from Camp Adjutant Rick Roberts showing the safe and effective method to clean old grave markers which, over time and due to the elements, can become unreadable.

TJ asked Roberts about Confederate Veterans buried in Clay County cemeteries and soon had a list with 101 names. Old Hickory Grove Cemetery is known to have 21 Veterans interred in that location. That is where the Jackson "Family mission" began. In May 2023, the family (TJ, Mandi and Tommy) pitched in and started a clean-up effort that included mowing of terribly high grass and trimming back overgrown shrubbery. TJ then enlisted the help of his Kirby-Smith 1209 brothers. More workdays followed with grass cutting, cutting back shrubs, removing fallen trees and limbs and reset three markers that had fallen.

In November 2023, five Southern Crosses of Honor were placed at gravesites. The veterans here all survived the war and made northeast Florida their home postwar. In service, they had come from Florida, Georgia, North Carolina and Virginia. One grave is that of Charles T. Burford. After the


war, he served as the commander of the Charles Seton Fleming Camp 1616, United Confederate Veterans.

In the closing days to Confederate Heritage Month, TJ organized a memorial service at the cemetery. Prayers were offered, a bagpiper played "Amazing Grace," TJ spoke about the honor of remembering the brave men of the South who defended their homes and families. As Kirby-Smith camp members rendered a three-volley rifle salute, TJ read the names of the 21 Confederate Veterans, their home state and the unit in which each served. "We do not honor war when we honor the peace that these men fought for, the freedoms they defended, and the hope that they offered to a world still in the process of learning how to resolve conflicts between individuals and between nations without using force. This is especially true when we pay tribute to those who answered the call of duty," said President Jimmy Carter, as he signed legislation in 1980 to approve the construction of the Vietnam Memorial.

During the Vietnam War, more than 58,000 men and women in the armed forces lost their lives. Over 5 million people have paid their respects to those heroes at the Wall in Washington, D.C. However, many are unable to travel to Washington to see The Wall. The tremendous sacrifices made during the Vietnam War are commemorated by this traveling memorial. It was created to help mend and revive friendships, as well as, give those who might not otherwise be able to travel

to Washington the chance to see loved ones back home.

The Vietnam Traveling Memorial Wall is a three-fifths scale model of the Washington, D.C. original wall. From end to end, it is approximately 300 feet long. On April 17-21, 2025, the Vietnam Traveling Memorial Wall will travel to Callahan, and be displayed at the NE FL Fairgrounds, whom graciously donated the facility for our use. The event, which goes by the name "Vietnam Voices," is genuinely one that is for the community, by the community. The name was chosen for this event because We the People now are the Voices of those whom boldly gave their lives for the freedoms we are blessed to have today.

The Town of Hilliard, the Hanging with Heroes Monthly Market, and the VFW Auxiliary Post 10095 have partnered together, alongside the community, to bring this traveling piece of history to Nassau County. We are no longer on "The Same Page"

The question has been asked of people, by their boss, party affiliations, friends and numerous organizations, none the least of which has been the nation as a whole. On many occasions, the coalescence of the country was never in question while at other times the split has been inevitable and, unfortunately, very predictable.

The Immigration Naturalization Act, Section 337, requires this oath for citizenship and those who take it assume they are aligning themselves with all other citizens, both naturalized and natural born. Of all those protestors out there, I wonder how many have been found to be citizens, which have taken that oath, and are now violating it. The law requires that information, but yet it is another aspect of the law that is being completely ignored and set aside, out of fear of appearing to be insensitive and non-inclusive.

So maybe it is time to once again begin to stand for America, land of the free and the brave, where we can once again turn on that shining light on the hill and stand up for the difference between right and wrong. So how about it folks? What's it going to take to get us all on the same page? Throwing away those pages we disagree with is not the answer!





FSCJ Receives Grant for Students with Unique Abilities

Florida State College at Jacksonville (FSCJ) was awarded a \$1,484,224 VERTICAL (Vocational Employment Readiness Training in Comprehensive Adult Learning) grant

to support students with unique abilities. As part of the Florida Postsecondary Comprehensive Transition Program (FPCTP), FSCJ's VERTICAL program will be an inclusive, vocational, technical and careerreadiness training program for adults with intellectual disabilities in Duval and Nassau counties. The

program offers students the opportunity to earn meaningful industry-recognized credentials that lead to relevant employment upon completion. VERTICAL students will be immersed in the FSCJ community, actively participating in on-campus classes. community-based organizations and student clubs and activities. Participants can complete the program in one to three years, depending on the chosen career path.

Currently, FSCJ is the only state/ technical college FPCTP in the region, with the demand for these services only growing. At this time, the College serves 55 students who have self-disclosed an intellectual disability as their primary disability. VERTICAL will allow an additional ten students to enroll for the

first fall cohort. The following year, and each subsequent year, another ten students will be accepted, with the expectation that up to 30 students will complete the program during the three-

year grant project period. "We are grateful for this grant and what it means for our students and this community," said College President John Avendano, Ph.D. "FSCJ is proud to serve as an educational partner for anyone and everyone who wishes to elevate themselves through higher education. Thanks

to this grant, we will be able to further our ability to do just that and help even more students pursue their goals."

The following career and technical education tracks will be offered through VERTICAL: Office Specialist College Credit Technical Certificate; Certified Nursing Assistant; and Welding Technology.

Participating students will select career preparation and job training options most appropriate for their success. Following completion, they will receive direct job placement and stabilization in competitive, gainful employment positions within the greater Jacksonville community. Positions will closely match the industry-recognized certificate attained or one that aligns with the student's preference.
