Luena Daley (née Bellamy) by Gwen Cation



Luena Marion Bellamy was born on January 30, 1913 in Sunnidale Township to parents Albert and Florence Bellamy (née Culham) shortly before World War I started. Albert and Florence who were farmers, had four children, Luena, who was the eldest child followed by Lloyd, Edna and Ray. Luena spent her childhood years on the family farm ship. She attended the

Clearview Side Road Public School which was a one room school and attended the Stayner Continuation School for her high school years.

Luena loved music and took piano lessons during her childhood years. She even tried Conservatory exams in Toronto. Her musical talent was obvious as she stood 2nd and 5th in Ontario which led to beginning her education towards a degree in music.

One of Luena's first careers was looking after chickens. She saved money from her chicken business and bought her first ring at the age of 14, which she still wears to this day. Luena was a studious lass and did well in school, helping other students. Luena was also a mothers' helper on the farm.

Some of the best memories of her childhood include summer holidays when she spent time with her cousins; Les, Howard, Harold, and Merton Culham.

At the tender age of 16, Luena met a young man named Ivan Daley on a lively Saturday night in downtown Stayner. It was common practice in those days, to walk and meet with friends and neighbours on the main street in Stayner.

This was the time of the Great Depression when many people were struggling to feed their families. Even during this challenging time, love blossomed and after a few years of courting the couple married on the 15th of March, 1933 at her parents' farm. A couple of evenings later, a surprise chivaree was held for the newlyweds. Friends and family came into the house with food and gifts for the evening party.

The year after they were married, Luena contracted polio. A series of sauna treatments helped her gain some mobility, but left her with some muscular paralysis. This presented Luena with many challenges among them dealing with several broken legs.

In 1936, Ivan found employment in Sudbury with International Nickel Co. Marlene was 3 yrs old and Joyce only 5 weeks old, when Luena and Ivan moved to Sudbury where they lived for ten years. While in Sudbury, their other two daughters, Gwendolyn and Sharyn were born. Those years were fun as there were many young families there for the work in those depression years.

In 1946, the couple and their four daughters returned to Stayner where Ivan and his brother started their own successful excavating business.

Luena and Ivan settled into their new life, raising a family, taking care of the house and the business and visiting with friends. Luena's love for music returned her to teaching piano lessons which she did for many years. She was extremely active in the Stayner Centennial United Church where she sang in the choir, was often the soloist at weddings, the pianist for the junior choir and the assistant organist. Luena was a charter member of the Eastern Star.

Luena has four daughters, 14 grandchildren, 27 great-grandchildren and 5 great great-grandchildren. In addition to spending time with her family and her love of music, Luena has enjoyed other activities including gardening vegetables and flowers, quilting, tatting, crocheting (making afghans for all her grandchildren) and sewing. Luena is good at handwork! Today, Luena enjoys a wide variety of books on CD, and watching baseball and curling on television.

Ivan and Luena spent many winters in Florida near St. Petersburg. They travelled extensively throughout North America, North, South, East and West in their mini motor home. Luena also enjoys good food! She says, "If I can't eat, I am sick!"

The most important lesson in life that Luena has learned is that a positive attitude goes a long way. Life is about experiences, take advantage and learn from each one.

Luena's experience with polio has helped her keep a positive attitude about life. Dealing with the aftermath of polio and its deficit helped shape this outlook, making her a capable and independent woman. Luena's husband, Ivan, made the greatest impact on her because he was so supportive with his positive attitude.

The hard times in life have taught Luena to live day by day. To carry on and do the best you can.

Her favorite memories are when her family gets together for special occasions and holidays . "My "Big" 100th birthday was super - a chance for family members from here and afar to reconnect." Luena celebrated her birthday, January 26th, at Stayner Centennial United Church.

We are so fortunate to know this beautiful woman with a lovely smile and even happier outlook on life. Luena still volunteers her time playing piano at Bayhaven, where she is a resident.
