Dorothy-Anne Bewell Wheeler Millsap

Dorothy-Anne was born May 15, 1935 in Stayner, Ontario. To talk about Dorothy-Anne is to speak about a woman of many talents and many friends.

A private, pragmatic, resourceful person, who

enjoyed new ways of thinking and places of leadership to the end of her very full life.

She completed her education at the University of Toronto and taught languages in Collingwood and Stayner. She changed her career to become the Resource Librarian at Centennial United Church - a position she filled until her retirement.

As one of the originators of the Stayner Heritage Society, this gave her an outlet for her natural story telling

talents. She loved to listen, as well as learn, about how the past influences the present. She was a keeper of the keys of history and enjoyed remembering people and places that played a role in local life.

Dorothy-Anne found rich delight in a variety of simple things. The first birds of spring, a cardinal on the feeder, as well as a stunning flower poking through in first bloom. Her children and three grandchildren were her comfort and joy. Her passion was her wish to right the wrongs of the world's less fortunate; to give a voice to those the world wasn't hearing. She was instrumental in using her writing, vocal and organizational skills to make a difference where she could. The world of baseball, especially the Blue-Jays, was a sport she watched with relish. Gardening was her

hobby in which her reputation stretched before her. Her long term association with the Toronto Jazz Society will feel her absence.

Stayner was the centre of her universe. Her church brought her comfort and opportunities for growth. It was a natural place to use her

benevolent leadership skills.

Dorothy-Anne gave as she received, with kindness and equality for all.

She died on Monday March 7, 2016 after a brief illness. Predeceased by her mother Dorothy Wheeler, father Goldie Wheeler, and husband Glenn Millsap. Sadly missed by her

THE WHEELER STORY

This story begins with Thomas Wheeler who was born in 1820 west of Toronto in what now is called Etobicoke. He met and married Elizabeth McGill who had recently immigrated from Northumberland in the UK.

Thomas and Elizabeth raised five children the oldest of which was George born in 1844 in Weston Ontario

(now Etobicoke).

George married Jessie Schell who was born in Glencairn. They settled in this small community and raised a very large family. Some records suggest fifteen children but we know of twelve for certain. George ran a public house and General Store in Glencairn. Some suggest they may have been of Mennonite persuasion but that isn't definite.

The family moved to Stayner after retirement about 1900. George died in 1926.

Their third born son, Benjamin, was born in 1876. He married Bertha Madill who was raised in rural Glencairn by her parents who has immigrated from Ireland in the mid century leaving behind the terrible potato famine. Ben died in 1935 after raising five natural children and one adopted son. The second son Harold sadly died at 8 months.

Ben was the first of the family to enter the insurance business in Stayer - He shared a brokerage with a partner. However the partnership didn't last and Ben took it on himself naming the business B. Wheeler and Sons. He passed the business to his children upon his passing in 1935.

Ben and Bertha's oldest son William moved to Collingwood and continued his career in insurance. Priscilla, Ben & Bertha's second born, and Goldwyn carried on the business in Stayner, when Ben died. Younger adopted brother James joined them for a short while. Edna (known as Teddy) married Clarence (Parry) Parrington and lived in Toronto for the duration of her life. It is interesting to note that George, Jessie, Ben, Bertha and all the children, except Harold, are buried in the Stayner Cemetery.

Goldwyn (Goldie as he was called by all who knew him) married Dorothy Bewell who moved to Stayner to teach languages at the local high school.

They raised three children before Dorothy's untimely

death at the age of 46 from cancer.

Goldie continued on in the insurance business bringing in his son in law Glenn Millsap, husband of his oldest daughter Dorothy Anne, as well as his son Ben to assist in the growing business located on main street Stavner.

Dorothy Anne, following graduation from Victoria College, University of Toronto and Ontario College of Education, taught languages in Collingwood Collegiate and Stayner before changing careers to Resource Librarian at Stayner Centennial Church. Their two sons, Andrew and Peter, were very active in the Stayner Sports scene.

Ben subsequently left the business and moved north to Thunder Bay where he met and married Audrey Korkola finally settling in Winnipeg Manitoba. Their three children Carla, Jonathan, and Michael continue in successful enterprises across the country.

Their middle daughter Barbara, married Paul Elliott moving north to Thunder Bay to continue a career in Early Childhood Education until retirement and relocation to Courtenay BC. They raised two children Chris (Toronto) and Marny (Courtenay BC)

After Goldie's death in 1978, Glenn brought his son Andrew Millsap into the business. Glenn & Andrew continued until Glenn's death in 2003.

The industry was changing and as a result the business was sold to Spriggs Insurance in 2003.

Andrew continues in the family interests and Peter is assistant head of the Math Department in Collingwood Collegiate Institute.

As you can see, the Wheeler Family have played a close and active role in the continuing progress of Stayner for a very long time.
