BREAKSTONE DESCENDANTS PLAN REUNION

Historic Family to Gather at Put-in-Bay.

PUT-IN-Bay, O., Aug. 22.—The long finger of historical research will point to this resort colony with unusual directness next week when the Breakstone family reunion is held here.

Just as historic incidents cling about this little Lake Erie island, so events interesting in history cluster around the traditions of the name of Breakstone. Historic peoples like historic backgrounds, and perhaps, observers say, this is why the descendants of Lord Breakstone have designated this spot as the scene of their eighth annual reunion. Incidents in the history of Put-in-Bay and of the celebrated family have a similarity.

Both the Breakstones and this island have served as shelters to victors before their hour of triumph. Put-in-Bay was a kindly refuge to the ships of Commodore Perry in September 1813 during the second war with the British. During a battle on Lake Erie in September, 1813, Perry brought his fleet of sturdy frigates to anchor in the peaceful waters of this bay—and the name of the island was determined because of this event. The brass cannon were oiled, the wounded treated, the shattered masts repaired, while the swift English men-of-war tacked and wore up and down Lake Erie in search of the Yankees, who had disappeared as though touched by magic.

A few years before, in another hemisphere, where wars were fought on a more colossal scale, the Breakstone family castle, near the borders of Russia, served as a refuge for a disgruntled and all but defeated Napoleon Bonaparte, who had found the guns of the Russians too numerous, and the weather of the north too rigorous.

Bonaparte tethered his horse at the gates of Breakstone castle 120 years ago—and found safety inside. The Russians were in hot pursuit of his troops in the vicinity of the Nemen river. With the memories of Ulm and Austerlitz to sustain him, the "Little Corporal" plotted new triumphs.

Outside the wind from the steppes, not many miles distant, whined and snorted like an angry sergeant-major. When the Russians had been thrown off the trail, the legions of Napoleon were reassembled, and with Marshal Nye on his right, Bonaparte rode to new triumphs. However, he never forgot the Breakstones, their roaring fireplaces, and their hospitality. The Breakstones, in turn, never forgot the impressive little man in the blue coat, who sometimes mumbled excitedly to himself as he stared into the embers of their castle.

More than a century has seen the Breakstones multiply and spread to all parts of the world. There are 1,800 of them. About 400 of the American Breakstones will meet here next week. They will represent 14 states of the United States.

The conclave of the Breakstones will be held from August 24 to August 31 inclusive.

Some of the celebrities of the modern Breakstones are Etienne Bregstein of Amsterdam, Holland, who was the Herbert Hoover of Holland during the World war; Abraham Breakstone, a noted criminologist of New York City; Dr. Benjamin Breakstone, chief surgeon of the West End hospital of Chicago; Joe Brown, the famous comedian and Dr. David Levy,

chief of the Institute For Child Guidance, New York City.

Mrs. Sarah A. Levy of Scranton, Pa., is the president of the Breakstones of America.
