

# 2 PARTIES WITHOUT CANDIDATES

Unusual Situation is Precipitated at the State Capital Through Court Decision

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 27.—(U.P.)—A chaotic situation existed in Indianapolis' politics today with a mayoralty election scheduled for Nov. 5 and both parties still without candidates.

The situation was precipitated through action of the state supreme court in declaring the city manager law unconstitutional. Both parties suddenly found themselves without organization and unprepared for the fight.

The democrats will hold a convention next Tuesday night and it is believed the candidacy will go to Reginald H. Sullivan.

The job of selecting a republican candidate has kept party leaders in conference for several days. It was expected that an announcement would be made some time today or tomorrow. Indications point to selection of Charles W. Jewett, prominent attorney and former mayor. As founder of the present precinct organization that exists under George E. Coffin, republican leader, Jewett is well known in city politics.

Meanwhile the G. O. P. under-leaders were organizing their precincts in preparation for an intense battle over the election.

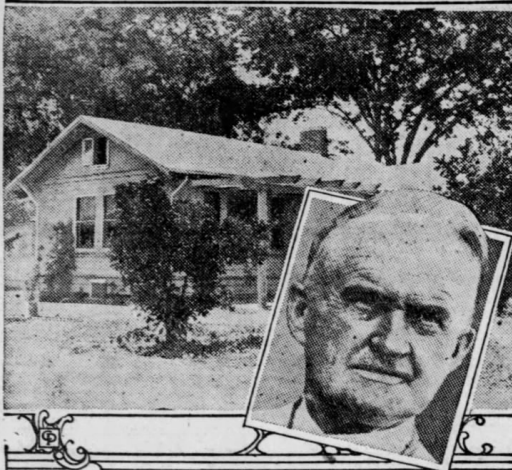
## BREAKSTONES IN ANNUAL MEETING

NORTH WHITE LAKE, N. Y.—About 120 years ago Napoleon Bonaparte publicly acknowledged that he owned his life to the daring and sagacity of a humble Jewish peasant, named Breakstone, who lived near the Neman river in Russia. Later the "Little Corporal" rewarded the peasant by giving him a duchy.

In North White Lake, recently, more than 300 descendants of that Breakstone gathered in annual reunion to pay homage to the memory of that daring peasant and to keep alive the spirit that made it possible for him to save the life of the emperor of France.

## PROBE DEATH OF COAST HEIRESS



Convinced that she was the victim of foul play, authorities at Fairfield, Cal., are investigating the death of Edith Irene Wolfskill, 57-year-old eccentric heiress to an \$800,000 estate. Family association record that Napoleon, hard pressed by the Russians on his famous retreat, stopped at the Breakstone cottage and asked for succor. He was taken in, hidden in safety until the pursuing force swept on and then was led to a more friendly region from where he was able to escape to his own lines.

Breakstones are spread all over the globe with about 1,300 on the association roles. The name was adopted more than 200 years ago in

Lithuania and today there are many variations in the spelling of the name, but all are Breakstones.

Breakstones from 14 states and three countries were registered at the 1929 reunion. Among those registered were Etienne Bregstein, Amsterdam, Holland, the Hoover of Holland during the World war, and his wife; Abraham Breakstone, prominent New York attorney; Sam Brackstone, alderman of Corinth, Miss.; Jerome S. Breakstone, assistant prosecuting attorney, Chicago;

Isaac Breakstone, cheese manufacturer, New York; Dr. Benjamin Breakstone, chief surgeon of the West End hospital, Chicago; Joe Browning, well known comedian of the stage; Nathan Brickstein, U. S. customs officer, New York, and Dr. David M. Levy, chief of the Institute for Child Guidance, New York.
